Adult volunteers join Optimist Clubs to conduct positive service projects in their communities aimed at providing a helping hand to youth. New Mexico / West Texas District is just one of approximately 50 Districts in the US, Canada and Jamaica. There are currently 27 clubs in the district and approximately 350 members.

There is also a Ronald McDonald House in El Paso to help families in the west Texas area. Generally if a family with a sick child goes to the nearest in-state hospital. There are cases where the nearest hospital is across the state line and because of the situation the child is taken to there first, later to be transferred in-state. The majority of families served in El Paso come from the surrounding areas including West Texas, Northern Mexico and Southern New Mexico.

How can your Club help? Like many other Optimists you can collect Pull Tabs (Pop Tops) for the House in your state. If you are close to one of the Houses you can volunteer. There is lots to be done. Help with Bingo one night a month. Help fix and serve meals. Prepare day snack kits. Clubs can help the House with fund raisers. Golf Tournaments and even a Girls Night Out! The in hospital RMH rooms are always in need of volunteers.
