


I do hope you will visit us and see for yourself that Dayspring Bible College is indeed an environment in which you can actively seek the Lord and His will for your life.

Why Dayspring?

Because it's a Local Church with a Clear Gospel

Since its founding in 1982, Dayspring has been committed to producing quality Christian servant-leaders with a compassion for the lost and a willingness to be used by God. These servant-leaders' main desire is to share the clear gospel message as Christ commanded in Mark 16:15, *Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature.*

Dayspring is committed to the emphasis of two issues that we deem to be fundamental to a God-honoring, New Testament ministry:

1. Clear Gospel Message — The Quentin Road Baptist Church and Dayspring Bible College & Seminary believe that God saves souls by grace through faith in Christ, Who died and shed His blood for sinners. Faith alone, in Christ alone, is what God requires of man for salvation. We avoid terms that mix grace with works and cause confusion in the minds of the lost. Ephesians 2:8–9 *For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast.*
2. Local Church — Dayspring Bible College is unique in

that it works directly with the local church. This allows the students to see a model church in action, and it provides them with the hands-on ministry opportunities that cannot be learned by textbook only. Students gain valuable insights and personal experience on a daily basis as they are mentored in many different areas of ministry. By the time the student has completed his education at Dayspring, he has already seen and experienced the biblical principles of ministry in action.

Because we still teach Biblical Doctrine

Bible-believing... We stand for the historic fundamentals of biblical Christianity. We believe the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the verbally inspired Word of God, the final authority for faith and life.

Independent... We are self-governing, and therefore, have no synod, conference, presbytery, or other form of human organization exercising control over the college.

Evangelistic... We maintain a strong emphasis on the clear gospel and personal and public evangelism.

Because it's Affordable

Dayspring strives to keep tuition as low as possible. Most Dayspring students graduate debt free because of our low tuition and the many financial assistance opportunities. The average full-time student living and eating on campus can expect

to pay about \$5,000 per semester. The combination of low tuition, scholarship, and job availability allows single, as well as married students, to get a good education with minimal financial burden.

History

Grace — God's amazing grace. *Amazing Grace! How sweet the sound that saved a wretch like me. I once was lost, but now am found was blind but now I see.* This is the hymn which James Scudder has embraced over his 45 years of ministry. Its message shares the story of how the almighty God could save a sinner like James, and then use him to build an incredible ministry which would share the wonderful gospel message with a lost and dying world.

James Scudder, the son of a Methodist preacher, was born and raised in Kentucky. While attending the University of Kentucky, he trusted Christ as his Savior and immediately enrolled in Florida Bible College.

After graduating and being ordained as a minister in 1971, he and his wife, Linda, drove into the bustling metropolis of Chicago where they planned to start a church. As they persevered, God blessed them with a storefront, where they began holding church services and Youth Ranch Bible clubs for teens. God continued to bless their efforts, and they soon began meeting in a school. Then in 1973, just two years after they started their ministry,

God amazingly provided 3.5 acres on a busy corner of Quentin Road in Palatine, a northwest suburb of Chicago. They named the church Quentin Road Bible Church.

Full of faith and vision, the small congregation gave all they had and built their first building. As the people continued their soulwinning and visitation, they quickly outgrew this building and built a much larger auditorium in 1978. In the fall of 1979, a Christian school, grades K–12, was started in their old building.

Dr. Scudder saw a great need for young people to keep learning about how to work in a local church and discover more about the Bible. Too many students were graduating from the Christian school with nowhere to go to Bible college for further training. Many of the Bible colleges no longer emphasized a clear gospel, and many did not train their students in local church ministry. So in 1982, Dayspring Bible College, a four-year Bible training program, was started. Soon, the college was filled with students who gained a love for the clear gospel and a compassion for lost souls.

In 1984, due to steady and increasing growth of the church, school, and college, it became apparent that a bigger building was needed. Stepping out in faith, Dr. Scudder led the church to a 43-acre site, incredibly enough, located just 8 miles north on Quentin Road in the town of Lake Zurich. A 24,000-square-foot multipurpose

building was built almost entirely by the dedicated men and women of the church in less than a year.

Dr. Scudder began the Quentin Road Christian Preschool in 1985. This quickly became a successful ministry which allowed the church to reach the community through its children. Now, with over 1,600 children enrolled annually, it has become the nation's largest Christian preschool and has earned a first-rate reputation.

With so many activities going on in the church, the men and women of the church gave of their time to build a 13,000-square-foot full-size gymnasium in the summer of 1987.

Dr. Scudder, along with his dedicated church family, began to pursue the possibilities of spreading the clear gospel of grace through television and radio. On May 16, 1993, the *Quentin Road Bible Hour*, later named *Victory In Grace*, television broadcast aired for the first time.

God's grace continued to grow the congregation, and once again, the present facilities became too small. An 80,000-square-foot, 2,500-seat auditorium and multipurpose addition was completed in 1997. The faithful church family gave of their money, time, and the sweat of their brows to work all summer and into the winter to complete this incredible vision.

The many years since this undertaking have been years of spiritual growth in the thousands saved

through Dr. Scudder's ministry. His clear, expository, verse-by-verse preaching through the Bible has strengthened believers and grounded them in their spiritual walk. They, in turn, are reproducing Quentin Road's outreach.

Many Dayspring Bible College graduates are pastors in churches all across the country. Some are planting new churches to continue the vision and practice began by Dr. Scudder. Many international students have gone back to their homes and are reaching the lost with the clear gospel.

On June 19, 2012, Dayspring Bible College and Seminary, in partnership with the Quentin Road Baptist Church, purchased a 13 ½ acre campus, located less than 5 miles from the church's current 45 acre campus. This beautiful property has 7 furnished buildings including 2 large dormitories, a gymnasium, commercial kitchen and cafeteria, an academic building, and married student apartments. God has performed many miraculous acts that have allowed us to acquire this beautiful property which is completely surrounded by hundreds of acres of woods and trails. This miracle of God has advanced Dayspring to a new level as we train the next generation of servant-leaders for the Lord.

In the fall of 2016, Pastor Jim Scudder, Jr. was passed the sword of Senior Pastor of the Quentin Road Baptist Church by his dad, Dr. James A. Scudder, who retired after 45 years in the ministry.

Dayspring Doctrinal Distinctives

Dayspring has never had and will never have a staff member or professor who does not wholeheartedly hold to these truths.

The Bible — Each and every word of the original manuscripts of the Bible was given by inspiration of God. It is true and authoritative on every subject it speaks to. The KJV is the best translation of the best text and is the Bible that we use at Dayspring.

Creation — The Bible declares that the universe was created in six literal days just a few thousand years ago, rather than coming into existence through the Big Bang and the process of evolution over billions of years. We reject completely theistic evolution, the Gap Theory, the Day-Age Theory, and any other theory whereby professing Christians try to accommodate the Bible to "science."

Sin, Death, and Salvation — The biblical account of creation also describes how a literal Adam and Eve disobeyed God, thus becoming sinners. Their sin brought the judgment of God upon them; they died spiritually and began to die physically at the moment they sinned. Sin and death were passed on to their offspring. All humans are sinners by birth and deed and are in desperate need of a Savior.

The Gospel — Because God loves mankind, He determined to provide a way of redemption so that we could be delivered from the consequences of our sin and live with Him forever. Since there is nothing that sinners can do to make themselves acceptable to God, He sent His own Son, the God-man Jesus Christ, to pay the penalty for sin in our place. He shed His blood and gave His life to redeem us. Salvation is offered by God to us as a gift that is received by grace alone through faith alone in Christ alone. No work or merit of our own, either before or after salvation, has any part in our redemption. At Day-spring, we emphasize the necessity of distinguishing grace from works and using biblical, understandable terminology in proclaiming the gospel. The most important message in the world must be preached with clarity.

Evangelism — Christ died for all people. Every person can be saved if he or she will hear, understand, and believe the gospel; therefore, it is our great responsibility to carry the gospel to every person we can possibly reach. We reject the Five Points of Calvinism as unbiblical and as a great hindrance to evangelism.

Dispensationalism — We believe and teach that God has worked in different ways at different times to bring His divine plan to pass. Some of these different ways are obvious and beyond dispute: God treated Adam and Eve differently before and after the Fall; He gave the Law

to Moses but took it away when it was fulfilled on the cross. This makes it clear that Israel and the Church are not the same thing and that literal Israel has a future in the plan of God.

Eschatology — We believe in the pretribulational return of Christ to rapture His bride, the Church. This will be followed by seven years of tribulation on the earth which will end when Christ returns to Earth to establish His 1,000 year reign. When the Millennium is over, Christ will judge the lost at the Great White Throne and the redeemed will enter into eternity with the Lord.

Separation — We believe that Christians should live a life that is set apart unto God. In this separated life there are many things that we should do for God and also some things that, for the Lord's sake, we should not do. Mature Christians should be able to identify those things that are displeasing to God and avoid them.

Statement of Faith

The Holy Scriptures — The Bible, in its original documents, is the inspired Word of God, the written record of His supernatural revelation of Himself to man, absolute in its authority, complete in its revelation, final in its content and without any errors in its statements. Psalms 89:34, John 10:35, II Timothy 3:16, Hebrews 6:18, II Peter 3:16.

Although we do not believe the translators of the Authorized King James Bible were inspired, we do believe that the Authorized King James Version, based upon the Textus Receptus, is the best translation. Therefore, the Authorized King James Bible shall be the Bible used by Dayspring.

The Godhead — There is one God, eternally existent, Creator of Heaven and Earth. He is manifested in three persons — Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Genesis 1:2, Isaiah 7:14 & 9:6, John 14:9, I Timothy 3:16, I John 5:7.

The Person and Work of Christ — The Lord Jesus Christ is fully God who took on flesh and dwelt on Earth. He was without sin and gave Himself as a substitutionary sacrifice by shedding His blood and dying on the cross. He then came back from the dead. This was to pay for all of the sins of mankind. Acts 13:38–41, II Corinthians 5:21, Hebrews 9:2–28; 10:10–14, I Peter 2:24, I John 3:5.

Total Depravity of Man — God is absolutely sovereign, and in His sovereignty, He gave man a free will to accept or reject the salvation that He has provided. It is God's will that all would be saved and that none would perish. God permits man's destiny to depend upon man's choice. John 6:64–65, Acts 10:34, Romans 9:30–32, I Corinthians 1:21, Ephesians 1:5–14, II Thessalonians 2:13, I Timothy 2:4, I Peter 1:2, II Peter 3:9.

The Person and Work of the Holy Spirit

— Each member of the human race is fallen, sinful, and lost. Regeneration by the Holy Spirit is absolutely essential for the salvation of man. The moment a person receives Christ as Savior, immediately, the Holy Spirit indwells the believer, who is sealed until the day of redemption. Luke 24:49, John 7:39, Romans 3:23, I Corinthians 6:19, Ephesians 1:13, Titus 3:5.

Salvation — Man is saved by undeserved mercy through faith, and nothing of man enters into his salvation. It is a free gift. Man's efforts, regardless of how good or well-intended before or after salvation, have nothing to do with it. Salvation is by the finished work of Christ, and nothing can be added to it. Romans 11:6, Galatians 2:16, Ephesians 2:8–9, Colossians 2:13, Titus 3:5.

Water Baptism — The Church began with the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost and is composed of all true believers. By the Holy Spirit we are all baptized into one body of Christ. Water baptism is not essential for salvation but is a testimony to the world. Water baptism is to be done by immersion to show the death, burial, and resurrection. Acts 1:8, Acts 2:1–4, Acts 8:38, Acts 10:47, I Corinthians 2:14, I Corinthians 6:19–20, Ephesians 4:5.

Eternal Security — Every child of God possesses eternal life, being justified by faith, sanctified by God, sealed with the Holy Spirit, is safe and secure for all eternity, and he

cannot lose his salvation. However, a Christian can, through sin, lose his fellowship, joy, power, testimony, and reward, and incur the Father's chastisement. Relationship is eternal, being established by the new birth. Fellowship, however, is dependent upon obedience. I Corinthians 3:11–17, I Corinthians 5:1–5, I Corinthians 11:30–32, Hebrews 12:5–11.

The Two Natures of a Believer —

A child of God has two births; one of the flesh, the other of the Spirit, giving him a flesh nature and a Spirit nature. The flesh nature is neither good nor righteous. The Spiritual man does not commit any sin. This results in warfare between the Spirit and the flesh, which continues until physical death or the return of the Lord. The flesh nature of man does not change in any way with the new birth but can be controlled and kept subdued by the new man. John 3:3–7, Romans 7:15–25, Romans 8:8, Galatians 5:17, I Peter 1:23, I John 1:8, I John 3:9, I John 5:18.

Resurrection of the Saved and the Lost —

There will be a resurrection of the saved and the lost: of the saved unto eternal life and of the lost unto eternal conscious punishment. These two resurrections are separated by at least 1,000 years. Daniel 12:2, Matthew 25:41, I Thessalonians 4:13–18, Revelation 20:1–5.

Rapture of the Church — We believe in the personal, pretribulation, and premillennial return of

our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Isaiah 26:17–21 & 27:1, Luke 21:36, I Thessalonians 5:9–11, II Thessalonians 2:1–8, Titus 2:13, Revelation 3:10, Revelation 20:4.

Satan — Satan is a real person, the author of sin, and he and his angels will be eternally punished. Isaiah 14:12–15, Ezekiel 28:15 & 17, Matthew 25:41, Revelation 20:10.

Healing — God can heal, but physical healing is not in the atonement. God heals miraculously today when it is His perfect will to do so. Healing cannot be claimed through the guarantee of the atonement. At times, it is God's will for sickness not to be removed. II Corinthians 12:8–10, James 5:14–16.

Gift of Tongues — The gift of tongues (languages) was a manifestation of the Spirit's power solely for the demonstration of God's wisdom, purpose and power in the establishment of the early church and was always in a language that was in use. We believe that tongues fulfilled its purpose in the first century and ceased to be used before the completion of the New Testament. We further believe that the modern tongues movement is not of God. Acts 2:16–18, I Corinthians 14:22.

Grace — The true child of God is not under the law but under grace — saved by grace and disciplined by grace. Romans 6:14, Romans 11:6, II Corinthians 3:17.

Repentance — “Repent” (metanoeo) means a change of mind. Repentance in salvation means a change of mind from any idea of religion that man may have and acceptance of God’s way of salvation. Repentance does not in any sense include a demand for a change of conduct before or after salvation. Matthew 21:32, Acts 20:21, II Corinthians 7:8–10.

One of the counterfeits Satan is using today is the misuse of the word “repent.” To insist upon repentance that in any sense includes a demand for a change of conduct either toward God or man is to add an element of works or human merit to faith. Penance is payment for sin. Penitence is sorrow for sin. Works add something of self in turning from sin. But “repent” (metanoeo) means a change of mind. Nowhere does Scripture use the phrase, “repent of sin to be saved.”

Missions — It is every Christian’s privilege and duty to make clear God’s plan of salvation wherever and in whatever vocation he or she may be. Mark 16:15, I Thessalonians 2:4.

Plan of Salvation — The general plan of salvation from God’s Word in a brief outline that is believed and practiced by Dayspring is as follows:

(a) Establish the fact that all men are sinners. Isaiah 64:6, Jeremiah 17:9, Romans 3:10, Romans 3:23, James 2:10.

(b) Establish the fact that the penalty of sin is death. Ezekiel 18:20, Romans 6:23.

(c) Establish the fact that you must be perfect to enter Heaven. Habakkuk 1:13, Revelation 21:27.

(d) Establish the fact that man can do nothing to obtain this perfection. Romans 4:5, Galatians 2:16, Ephesians 2:8–9.

(e) Show how God provided a sin-bearer and imputes to man His righteousness. Isaiah 53:6, II Corinthians 5:21, Philippians 3:9, I Peter 3:18.

(f) Establish the fact that man needs only belief in the Lord Jesus Christ as his personal Savior for salvation. John 1:12, John 3:16, Acts 16:31, Romans 10:9.

(g) Establish the fact that man can be certain of his salvation now and that his salvation cannot be lost because eternal life is eternal. John 6:37 & 39, John 10:28, Hebrews 10:10–14, I Peter 1:5.

Creation — Dayspring believes:

(a) The first eleven chapters of Genesis are literally true and are the real history of the early Earth (Matthew 19:4, 24:37).

(b) The universe was created by God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit (Genesis 1:1–2; Colossians 1:16). In its original state, it was completely perfect

(Genesis 1:31). Because of the disobedience of the first humans, Adam and Eve (who were real, literal people created on the sixth day of Creation), all creation was sentenced by God to death and decay and eventual destruction (Genesis 1:27, 2:7–3:19). We reject all concepts of a pre-Adamic race as is taught by the Gap Theory.

(c) God created the universe by His spoken word (II Peter 3:5) in six literal twenty-four hour days (Exodus 20:11).

(d) In the young earth view supported by the genealogies and other references to time found in the Bible.

(e) That the biblical Flood of Noah's day (Genesis 6–8) was a real, global event which was the result of the judgment of God on sinful mankind (Genesis 6:5, 1 Peter 3:6).

(f) That the Flood caused much of the observable geology of the Earth, including most of the fossil graveyards of untold numbers of plants and animals that are found worldwide.

(g) That Noah and his family survived the Flood (Genesis 7:13, 8:18) and are the ancestors of all mankind now living. They spread over the face of the Earth after God confused their languages at the Tower of Babel (Genesis 11).

Baptist Distinctives — Dayspring Bible College holds to the doctrines

historically known as the Baptist Distinctives:

1. The sole authority of Scripture.
2. The autonomy of the local church.
3. A regenerated church membership.
4. The priesthood of all believers.
5. The separation of church and state.

Admission Policies

Dayspring is for serious minded students who desire to develop their skills for local church ministry. Every applicant will be reviewed and evaluated to assess whether he or she has a clear testimony of personal salvation by faith in Jesus Christ, is of good moral character and integrity, displays a willingness to learn, and has a sincere desire to know and do God's will for their life. Dayspring does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national or ethnic origin, sex, or age in the administration of its personnel and education policies. It admits qualified students of any race, color, national, or ethnic origin to all the rights, privileges, programs, and activities generally made available to students.

Application Process for U.S. Students

Application deadline for the first semester is August 1st and the second semester is December 1st.

1. Apply online at www.dbc.edu or print the paper copy and submit the forms. You may also call 224-677-7800 to request an application.
2. Pay \$60 non-refundable application fee.
3. Submit high school transcripts or GED and two character reference forms. If you are transferring from

another college, submit those transcripts.

4. Submit medical health form including shot records.
5. Upon receipt of the above mentioned items, the Admissions Office will process your application (which can take 4–6 weeks), notify you of your admission status, and send you further information.

Application Process for International Students

An international student applying to Dayspring follows the same procedures and would also need to meet the requirements of his or her own country and the requirements of the United States for approval to study in this country. International students should allow six months to a year in advance of the semester they are expecting to enroll. International students need to contact the Admissions Office at Dayspring to obtain the necessary I-20 form and must pay the I-901 fee online of approximately \$200 required by the United States government. You may contact the Admissions Office at admissions@dbc.edu for more information. International students must be able to establish their ability to pay tuition.

Early Arrival

Students living on campus may arrive when the dorms open as stated on the school calendar. Students must receive special permission from the Dean of Men or Dean of Women to arrive before the dorms open for the semester and may be charged \$30 a night.

Registration

All applicants for each semester must arrive on campus in time for registration. Missing registration is for emergencies only and must be approved by the Registrar.

General Standards

Dayspring Bible College & Seminary is dedicated to providing the finest Christian training possible. Our mission is to train and teach our students how to live by the principles of God's Word and how to serve Him in ministries all over the world. The learning experience is designed to help the student not only know the Scriptures but apply them. Students will be expected to abide cheerfully by the standards of Christian conduct as set forth by the administration and are to agree with the Statement of Faith. The administration wants to avoid legalistic living, but believes that those preparing for Christian service must live by God-honoring standards.

According to biblical principles, students of Dayspring are expected to maintain high standards. Students are expected to abide by these standards throughout their enrollment wherever they may be. Students found to be out of harmony with the school's ideals of work and life may be invited to withdraw if the administration determines necessary.

Students of Dayspring are expected to uphold the school's standards against cheating, swearing, smoking, gambling, dancing, attending movie theaters, abuse of drugs, use of tobacco and alcohol, tattoos, body piercing, pornography, premarital or extramarital sex, homosexuality or other sexual perversions and profanity, or ob-

scenity. They are expected to act in an orderly and respectful manner, maintaining Christian standards of courtesy, kindness, morality and honesty. They are to be of unquestionable character in dress, conduct, selection of music, and all other areas of life.

Living On Campus

Students will soon feel at home in our spacious and well-maintained dormitories. Both the men's and women's dormitories have common areas complete with a refrigerator, microwave, kitchen table, couches, iron and ironing board, and desks.

The dorm rooms come equipped with either twin beds or bunk beds. The students will need to supply their own mattress pad, twin bedding, and pillow. There is sufficient closet space and storage areas in each room. Each room also has its own air-conditioning unit so the student may control the temperature.

Free laundry facilities are available for the students in the lower level of the dormitory building. There is a men's and a women's laundry room.

Also located in the lower level of the dormitory building is the Student Center. The spacious Student Center is the perfect setting for fun and fellowship. Foosball, ping-pong, pool, air hockey, a pinball machine, Wii games, and DVDs are available for the students to use during their "down time."

Students may receive letters and packages at the DBC campus address: 27875 N. Fairfield Road, Mundelein, IL 60060. Summer mail and any mail received after graduation will not be forwarded. It is the responsibility of the student to change their address with the U.S. Post Office.

Filtered internet and free Wi-Fi are available on campus for the students. Students are encouraged to have a laptop, as it is needed for many of their classes. A computer lab is available in the Academic building for those who do not have access to a laptop. Students may not bring their own personal computer, screen, and printer, as space is limited in the dormitories.

Students living on campus will receive breakfast, lunch, and dinner as part of their room and board. Our chefs provide nutritional, well-balanced meals with a delicious variety of items. If a student has a special dietary need, they will need a note from their doctor, and the chefs will gladly accommodate their needs.

Students living on campus may have a vehicle and may park it on the campus. Students must have insurance and registration, a valid driver's license, and must register their vehicle with the administration office. The privilege to have a vehicle on campus may be revoked should a student be found driving recklessly on or off campus. There is a free shuttle that runs between the DBC campus and the QRBC campus.

Dress Guidelines

Dayspring strives to help young adults develop hearts for God that will want to glorify Him in their attire and their physical appearance. Both men and women are to avoid immodest and trendy clothes, hair styles, jewelry, etc. No body piercings of any kind will be allowed. Students need to be clean-cut and wholesome looking and should appreciate that his or her appearance must promote an image that is to glorify God.

Men are required to wear shirts, ties, and dress slacks to all day and evening classes. Dress shirt, tie, and dress pants are required for Sunday church services. Nice casual attire may be worn for Wednesday night Prayer Meeting or Talk Time. They are to maintain a neat, clean-cut, and conservative hairstyle. No facial hair.

Ladies are required to wear a dress or skirt to all day and evening classes and Sunday services. Ladies may wear nice dress pants for Wednesday Prayer Meeting or Talk Time. Ladies are to dress in modest apparel at all times. All dresses and skirts (including slits) may come no higher than the bottom of the knee. Earrings may be worn only by women in the earlobe and may not draw undue attention to themselves in doing so. All other body piercing is prohibited.

Church Home

As a student at Dayspring you will have the opportunity to attend the Quentin Road Baptist Church and sit under the verse-by-verse teaching of Pastor Jim Scudder. You will see for yourself the God-honoring example of a pastor and his staff who are committed to reaching the world with the clear Gospel message. It is required of students to attend all services.

Chapel

Chapel is often something we hear our graduates say they miss the most about college life. Not only is the Word of God taught, but also the practical experiences that happen in day-to-day ministry. The President, Pastor Jim Scudder, who has over 30 years of ministry experience, will often give his insights on various situations that have taken place in his ministry and enjoys teaching the students from God's Word incorporating many real-life experiences. Occasionally, a guest speaker will be invited to speak on certain Biblical topics or how an event happening in the news has affected Christians. Chapel meets Wednesday at 11:00AM and is an excellent opportunity for students to learn more about the Word of God. All students are required to attend Chapel unless arrangements have been made with the college administration.

Hands-on Ministry Training

While attending Dayspring, students will be encouraged to participate in many different ministry opportunities to help them develop leadership qualities. Dayspring Bible College is intertwined with the ministry of the Quentin Road Baptist Church, which is a multi-faceted ministry, including a large preschool, K-12th grade school, private tutoring for those with dyslexia, an addiction program, private music lessons, youth programs, a short-order kitchen open to the community, senior ministry, missions, radio and television ministry, and a one-on-one discipleship ministry.

Athletics & Activities

Dayspring encourages the students to stay physically fit and provides two separate fitness rooms for the men and the women in the Student Center. Each fitness room is equipped with cardiovascular machines and strength building equipment.

Surrounding the campus is 35 miles of gravel trails in the Lake County Forest Preserve. Hikers, runners, bicyclists, and cross-country skiers can enjoy the beauty from sunrise to sunset all year round.

Three gymnasiums are available for the different activities that take place throughout the year.

Dayspring offers volleyball for women and basketball for men at the intercollegiate level. Head-to-head competition is an opportunity to create excitement and school spirit. In addition to the fun, competitive sports develop leadership qualities and other character traits in the student. Volleyball season typically runs from August through October, and the basketball season is from October through February. Competition on the intramural level in mixed volleyball, basketball, soccer, and men's football provides a great time of fun and fellowship for the students.

An indoor swimming pool with locker room facilities is available to the students. Separate swim times are set aside for men and women. Modest swimming attire is required.

Married Students

Married students wanting to study at Dayspring will find the flexibility of the class hours to be the perfect situation for completing their studies yet still being able to have a job and provide for their family. Small efficiencies are available on campus for married students on a first come-first serve basis. Wives of married students may be given the opportunity to work in Quentin Road Christian Preschool and help support their husband through college. Married students enrolled in Dayspring full-time will be given a discounted rate for their children in Quentin Road's preschool and K through 12th grades.

Health Insurance

Dayspring Bible College & Seminary strongly suggests that students have some type of health insurance. Students who do not have health insurance will be asked to sign a waiver releasing the college of any liability. Any emergency room visit or any type of health or dental problem will be the responsibility of the student.

Accreditation

Dayspring Bible College and Seminary has never sought regional accreditation. The reason for this is to avoid the possibility of outside pressures changing Dayspring's theological and doctrinal positions. Dayspring has operated free of governmental oversight or governmentally recognized accreditation since its founding in 1982. This method of operation was a thoughtful and prayerful decision by the Board of Trustees.

The Board took note that accreditation is a voluntary process according to the United States Department of Education. Because Dayspring is a direct ministry of the Quentin Road Baptist Church, and the local church according to Scripture is to be autonomous, the leadership of DBC has elected at this time not to seek the approval of men, but only of God.

A so-called benefit of accreditation does make government money available through grants and loans. It is the practice of Dayspring to teach its students reliance on God to meet their needs. In ministry, the need for sacrifice, hard work, and prayer will be common, and is important to learn in ministry training. It is also a great benefit not to be burdened with debt from student loans upon graduation.

Dayspring operates legally in the State of Illinois as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization and outside the purview of the Illinois Department of

Higher Education (Title 23 IL Admin. Code Part 1030) as a religious, non-degree granting institution. Dayspring offers certificate (one year) and diploma (multiyear) programs. These certificates and diplomas are awarded to students who successfully complete their courses of study and are acceptable to most churches and ministries for employment and some colleges.

For Dayspring and other great schools, the best measurement of the success of the institution is the ministerial success of its graduates. Dayspring has provided excellence in education for over 30 years, and hundreds of our graduates are faithfully furthering the cause of Christ around the world because of their training at DBC.

Dayspring Bible College and Seminary makes no representation that its graduates will be accepted by specific institutions. It is the goal of the administration to meet and exceed the normative standards of recognized accrediting associations.

Dayspring Bible College and Seminary is accredited through Transworld Accrediting Commission International (231 E. Alessandro Blvd., Suite A-210, Riverside, CA 92508).



Student Classification

A student's classification is based on the number of semester hours earned.

Freshman: Completed less than 32 hours.

Sophomore: Completed between 32 and 63 hours.

Junior: Completed between 64 and 95 hours.

Senior: Completed at least 96 hours.

Attendance and Academic Year

Learning Center hours are from 8AM through 6PM, Monday through Friday, and night school is Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday from 6PM through 9PM. The Dean of Students will take the time to meet with each student and establish his or her weekly school hours. A full-time student must complete a minimum of 12 hours per semester which will require approximately 20 hours per week in the learning center. The academic year at Dayspring consists of two semesters of 16 weeks each.

Academics

The Administration, professors and faculty are the heartbeat of the Dayspring Bible College & Seminary and they consist of genuine, godly men and woman who have truly given of themselves to the cause of Christ.

Each one has proven themselves to be faithful, moral, and compassionate leaders who are dedicated to training the next generation. Students will experience first-hand their faithfulness and dedication to the Lord as they see these people of God selflessly give of themselves as they labor to train them.

The first building blocks of learning at Dayspring are laid by professors that have the qualifications to teach on as well as the life and ministry experience to ensure that the students will learn at the highest level both through academics and practical ministry experience. Dayspring is able to uniquely provide quality professors that are able to teach at the highest level and are experts in the fields that they are teaching. The professors that are teaching at Dayspring don't just offer academic knowledge but offer well over 1,000 years of combined practical ministry experience to go alongside the classroom academics they are imparting to the students.

There is another aspect that is incalculable: the genuine love and care the professors and faculty have for each student. They are not just teaching and guiding the student toward a degree or preparing them for a career path of their choosing, but ultimately, their desire is to mold a life and equip the student to have an eternal impact for Christ.

The dictionary's definition of

learning is *“to gain knowledge, skill, or understanding by study, instruction, or experience; knowledge, skill or practice derived from direct observation of or participation in the learning event.”*

Professors and faculty can be sure the student has successfully mastered the subject matter when we see the student has accomplished three levels of learning:

1. Retention —the ability to recall upon demand the factual material or content that has been learned.
2. Recitation — the ability to recite or communicate the material, content, or skills to others.
3. Replication — the ability to actually do, to apply and to practice what has been discovered in the experience of learning.

Learning is basically “change”.

Learning produces change in our knowledge, our attitudes, and our actions or habits. From the Biblical point of view, only the final level of learning — the ability to apply the Biblical principles set forth in the Word of God so they produce change in a life — is satisfactory achievement.

Statistics state that we retain 10% of what we have heard, 50% of what we have seen, 80% of what we have

done, and 90% of what we have passed on to others. These statistics make it obvious that the most productive learning must involve a method which includes hearing, seeing, and hands-on experience. Dayspring has been using this type of learning method since 1982.

Every course required for the student to accomplish on their road to graduation is based on credit hours. Every credit hour is either 15 contact hours (a professor lecturing in the class room) or 30 non-contact hours which include all or a combination of the following exercises: time the student is studying for the exams, required research, writing required papers and memorizing verses.

Example of course credit hours:

Number of credit hours — 4

22 Contact Hours (a teacher lecturing in front of a class room)

Dr. James Scudder — 2hrs.

Dr. Phil Stringer — 7hrs.

Pastor James Scudder, Jr. — 13hrs.

Required reading — “Evangelism Made Simple”

Required research — Assignments given throughout the course, including practicing sharing the gospel & using methods taught.

Studying for exams

Research for writing 5 papers

Learning at Dayspring involves listening to a professor in a classroom setting or via a

technology-driven Learning Management System that utilizes interactive video recording of the lectures a professor is teaching, enhanced visual aids on a screen, and textbooks given on the subject being taught. The student participates and responds with recitation, recall, and replication on a continual basis.

Because this method of learning is both effective and efficient, it is now recognized by many educators in colleges and universities all over the world as the most productive way to learn.

Any good training program needs to have balance. It must effectively combine the variety of experiences that make up learning. Those who train professionals, such as physicians, teachers, and engineers, have recognized three important needs in the training process:

1. The need to use variety in the form of cognitive learning.
2. The need to provide experience in the practical aspects of one's profession.
3. The need to integrate the practical experience and cognitive learning through class lectures.

This style of teaching and learning is very effective and that is exactly how students learn at Dayspring. When students have completed their studies at Dayspring Bible College & Seminary, they have

experienced learning in all three methods. Students graduating from Dayspring have learned in a variety of ways in the classroom and through text books, while also being provided with many practical ministry-related experiences. They are uniquely prepared to enter the ministry that God has planned for them because they have not only heard and seen what they were taught, but they have also had the hands-on experiences that are so vital to complete the learning process.

Grading System

Dayspring operates on a 4.0 grade point system. Students must earn a minimum of 2.0 GPA in each course of study. Failure to do so requires the student to repeat the course. The following chart gives the specific grades and equivalents:

Course Load

The normal load at Dayspring for a full-time student is 16 credit hours per semester with a minimum of 12 hours. Our programs are designed so that a student who takes 16 credit hours per semester will graduate in four years. The Academic Dean will determine the appropriate load for each student based on the student's academic performance.

Student Conferences

During the academic school year, students will have a formal, personal conference with the college administrator. At this interview, student records and grades will be reviewed, academic progress will be discussed, and any student problems or questions will be addressed.

Graduation Requirements

Dayspring wants to produce graduates who not only successfully complete the required hours of courses, but more importantly, have a zeal for sharing the clear Gospel message and desire to serve the Lord with all their heart, soul, and mind. This desire should be apparent in their everyday walk. A student desiring to earn a 4-year diploma must satisfactorily complete a minimum of 128 credits, and a student desiring a 2-year diploma must satisfactorily complete a minimum of 64 credits. Students must earn a minimum GPA of 2.0 to graduate with either a 2-year or a 4-year diploma. At least one-half of the hours in the program of study must be completed in residence at Dayspring. A student may only participate in the Commencement Ceremony if all program requirements and all financial obligations have been met.

Transcript of Records

All requests for academic transcripts must be made in writing to the Registrar's Office using a Transcript Request Form available on Dayspring's website. An unofficial transcript may be sent directly to the student, but official transcripts will only be sent to the requested institution or organization. There is a \$10 fee, and it may take up to ten business days to process. Express delivery is \$20. Transcripts will only be sent to students who have paid their account in full.

Tuition

A student taking 12 or more credit hours is considered full-time. Day-spring encourages most students to take at least 16 credit hours per semester if possible so they can finish in four years. The cost for each credit hour is \$200, so tuition will vary depending on the number of hours that are taken. The tuition amount does not include additional textbooks required for some courses. In the event a student withdraws from a course prior to taking the first test, a full refund will be given.

Room and Board

Room and board is charged by semester and includes housing and all meals. The cost is currently \$2,283.00 per semester. No credit is given for absences if a student must be off campus for a time. Laundry facilities are located on campus, and there is no extra charge for using the machines.

Additional Fees

Application Fee

A non-refundable application fee of \$60 is due with the application forms. Forms will not be processed for acceptance until this fee has been paid.

Re-enrollment Fee

There is no charge to re-enroll for the next consecutive semester if the

student turns in the re-enrollment form before the due date; otherwise, they will be subject to a non-refundable re-enrollment fee of \$60.

Graduation Fee

The \$40 graduation fee covers the expenses of a diploma, gown, tassel, cap, and other costs that are incurred for the graduation ceremony. If a student fails to graduate at the designated time, the graduation fee is not returned and another graduation fee is required when they do graduate.

Returned Checks

There will be a \$35 fee for all returned checks for non-sufficient funds.

Dorm Key Deposit

Students will not receive their dorm key until a \$25 cash deposit has been paid. The deposit is refunded when the key is returned. If the key is lost and a new key must be issued, another \$25 key deposit will be required.

International Students

International students will need to pay additional fees for the mailing of their I-20 form (approximately \$100). There is also a \$200 I-901 fee that is required by the United States government.

Lab Fees

Certain courses or programs of study require extra materials that are not included in the cost of the course fee.

Non-Dorm Students Lunch Fee

Students not living in the dormitory may purchase lunch for \$4 per meal.

Payments

Payments to a student’s account may be paid by cash, check, money order, Visa, or MasterCard. Students will need to complete an authorization form to have charges placed on their credit card. When a payment is made, it will first be applied to outstanding late fee(s), then past due invoices, and finally to their current invoices. A student’s expenses of tuition, room, board, and additional fees must be paid by the end of each semester. All student balances must be paid in full before graduation or the student will not be able to graduate. All accounts must be paid on time. Dayspring depends on the regular income to cover the cost of faculty, staff, building maintenance, and all operating expenses and does not receive any kind of financial assistance from the state or any type of government funding. If an account is past due, there will be a \$20 late fee applied to the student’s account. A check returned by the bank for insufficient funds will incur a \$35 charge on their account.

Scholarships

You can’t put a price tag on the biblical and academic education, the hands-on experiences, the character and leadership development,

and the lifelong friendships you will obtain at Dayspring, but we do understand the financial burden this can be to most families. Dayspring aims to keep tuition costs as low as possible and still provide a very strong biblical study program.

The approximate costs below will help you estimate what it will cost per year to attend Dayspring:

General Qualifications for Financial Assistance

The applicant must:

- Be in full agreement with Dayspring’s doctrinal statement.
- Complete an application showing proof of need.
- Provide any references or documentation requested.
- Declare a 2 or 4 year program.
- Sign a statement of intent to finish that major in 2 or 4 consecutive years at Dayspring.
- Maintain a minimum of 12 credit hours per semester.
- Understand that if he/she falls below a “C” average, or drops out of school before the end of the school year, the

scholarship for that year may be forfeited.

- Understand scholarships are credited to the student's school bill.
- Understand only one scholarship may be applied per student per semester.
- Understand scholarships do not cover any extra costs that may be needed for specific majors.

Internal Scholarships

Ministerial Scholarship: \$1,425 per semester

To qualify, one must meet the general qualifications for financial assistance, be enrolled in the Pastoral Studies, Chaplaincy, or Missions programs, be recommended by one's Pastor, and pass our selection process.

Parents in Service Scholarship: \$1,425 per semester

To qualify, one must meet the general qualifications for financial assistance, have at least one parent serving full-time in an approved Bible-believing ministry, and pass our selection process.

Academic Honors Scholarship: \$1,425 per semester

To qualify, one must meet the general qualifications for financial assistance, have graduated from high school as class valedictorian or salutatorian, and pass our selection process.

Teacher Education Scholarship: \$1,425 per semester

To qualify, one must meet the general qualifications for financial assistance, be enrolled in one of Dayspring's Christian Education programs, and pass our selection process.

Music Scholarship: \$1,425 per semester

To qualify, one must meet the general qualifications for financial assistance, be enrolled in one of Dayspring's music programs, pass our selection process which includes auditioning before the Dayspring Music Department representative, and be recommended by one's former music teacher(s).

**Matching Scholarship:
up to \$700 per semester**

Dayspring will give a discount that matches the amount paid by a student's home church to DBC for his/her school bill. To qualify, one must meet the general qualifications for financial assistance and be recommended by one's Pastor.

**Awana Scholarship:
Citation Award — \$11,400
Meritorious Award — \$5,700
Timothy Award — \$2,850
(over eight semesters)**

Dayspring will give scholarships in the following amounts to students who have been certified by Awana to have earned these awards. The scholarship will be credited in equal amounts over eight semesters. Only one award may be applied to a student's account.

Work Assistance Program

Dayspring students with financial needs may apply for our work assistance program, under which the student works in exchange for a discount applied to his/her school expenses. Jobs will be given based on financial need, applicant qualifications, and job availability.

The jobs are varied. Most of the female students would qualify for working with young children. The male students would be given jobs

ranging from data entry, order fulfillment, print shop duties, janitorial, maintenance, or working in a kitchen. There are two divisions in the work assistance program — full time and part time:

A. Full time (over \$43,000 value in 4 years) would include between 30–36 hours a week of duties. A student's dorm fees and meal plan will be covered. Tuition, with a maximum of 16 credit hours per semester, is included in the full time work assistance program.

B. Part time (over \$23,000 value in 4 years) would include between 15–18 hours a week of duties. Tuition only is covered under part time with a maximum of 16 credit hours per semester.

Any unused credit hours at the end of a semester expire, and they hold no monetary value. The Work Assistance Program cannot be combined with any other scholarship except the Matching Scholarship.

To qualify, one must meet the general qualifications for scholarships, fill out the *Work Assistance Program Application*, pass a criminal background check, and pass our selection process.

Certificate of Biblical Studies

(One Year Program)

This certificate program contains courses in Bible doctrine, theology, and Christian practice. It will prepare the student with an introduction into biblical studies that will help them achieve God's purpose in ministry or be a basis for further study.

In order to graduate from Dayspring with a Certificate of Biblical Studies, the student must satisfactorily complete the following requirements:

1. Complete 32 credit hours, fulfilling the necessary required courses and elective courses.
2. Actively participate in a Christian Service Assignment during every semester of enrollment.
3. Pay account in full.
4. Evidence whole-hearted agreement with the doctrinal statement of Dayspring.
5. Maintain a consistent Christian testimony.
6. Attend commencement exercises.

Emphasis in Bible Doctrine

Diploma of Biblical Ministry

(Post-Graduate)

The Diploma of Biblical Ministry is the post-graduate division of Dayspring Seminary. Dayspring realizes the need for advanced training for Christian workers. Serious minded students may choose an emphasis in Biblical Education, Chaplaincy, Church Music Education, or Theology. These challenging programs should take the diligent student approximately one or two years to complete and requires a Diploma of Biblical Education from Dayspring or an equivalent diploma from another like-minded institution.

Upon completion of the course of study in Biblical Studies, Chaplaincy, or Theology, the student is to write a 20,000 word thesis. The student is to work with the college administration to determine a subject for the thesis. The student is expected to research the subject thoroughly. Guidelines for the layout, footnotes, and bibliography are available at the school office. Careful attention must be given to Biblical accuracy as well as grammar and composition. Dayspring has carefully reviewed the books selected for the Biblical Studies and Theology courses of study. While these texts include much beneficial material, the Dayspring administration does not endorse all of the views expressed therein. Students are encouraged to compare these materials with Scripture and discuss any questions they may have with the administration to ensure a correct understanding of Biblical truths.

Students may choose electives from the DBM in Biblical Studies, Theology, or Chaplaincy programs.

Evangelism Made Simple is a prerequisite for all graduate students who have not taken the course as an undergraduate at Dayspring.

In order to graduate from Dayspring with a DBM, the student must satisfactorily complete the following requirements:

1. Fulfill the necessary required courses and elective courses.
2. Actively participate in a Christian Service Assignment during every semester of enrollment.
3. Pay account in full.
4. Evidence whole-hearted agreement with the doctrinal statement of Dayspring.
5. Maintain a consistent Christian testimony.
6. Attend commencement exercises.

This seminary program is designed to provide an intense study in doctrine, theology, and books of the Bible. The student will receive a well-rounded understanding of Scripture and will be equipped for effective service in ministry.



This course surveys the fundamental principles of personal finance from the consumer's point of view. The emphasis is on foundational skills that will prepare students to make intelligent and biblically-based consumer decisions in everyday life. Topics include: the time value of money, personal financial record keeping and budgeting with Quicken, cash flow management, consumer credit, auto and mortgage financing, insurance analysis, lifetime financial planning, and other related issues.

AD402 Economics & Biblical Truth

Credits: 3

A general study of economics and the impact of economics on the nations of the world. This course gives a general understanding of how economies work and how economic agents interact with each other. Students will also understand monetary issues that impact the economy, unemployment, inflation, and monetary and fiscal policies.

AD406 Ministry Accounting II

Credits: 6

This course is designed to refine the student's skills in relation to financial statements, underlying accounts, and transactions. It will also introduce new concepts relative to the application of accounting information, partnership and corporate accounting, budgeting, and financial statement analysis.

Apologetics

AP101 Evangelism Made Simple

Dr. Jim Scudder, Jr., Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 4

This is a detailed, thorough study of witnessing, not only to the "average" person, but also to people in cults. It also gives evidence for the validity of the Word of God.

AP102 Apologetics

Dr. Robert Vanden Bosch

Credits: 2

This is an examination of the case for biblical Christianity. It presents facts on the existence of God, internal and external proofs that the Bible is God's Word, and the history of the Sacred Canon.

AP104 Bibliology

Dr. Robert Lightner

Credits: 1

This is a detailed course on revelation, inspiration, canonization, and other subjects relating to the Bible.

AP105 Jewish Evangelism

Pastor Mark Robinson

Credits: 1

How to reach a Jewish person with the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

AP106 Manners & Customs

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 2

Teaches important customs of the Bible lands and shows how an understanding of these can aid our interpretation of Scripture.

AP201 History of the Received Text

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 3

This course is a thorough exploration of the issues surrounding the question of which Greek text and which English translation Christians should use today. The history of the Textus Receptus is studied, and the theories of Westcott, Hort, and others are refuted.

AP202 Complete Creation

Various Instructors

Credits: 4

This is a video series by eminent creation scientists: Ian Juby, Carl Kerby, Dr. Robert Carter, Dr. Bruce Malone, Dr. John Morris, and Laurence Tisdall. They discuss many aspects of the creation-evolution debate including the fossil record, the flood of Noah, "missing links," men and dinosaurs, and evidence for a young earth.

AP203 Apologetics II

Pastor Mark Julian

Credits: 1

A study of seemingly difficult passages regarding the Gospel, salvation, and eternal security.

AP204 Psychology & The Bible

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 3

This course contrasts the tenets of psychology with the truths of the Bible. It demonstrates the sufficiency of the Bible in dealing with man's problems.

AP205 Evangelism to Roman Catholics

Credits: 3

In this course, several tenets of Roman Catholicism are examined. The student is taught to answer these beliefs by examining what Scripture tells us, rather than by offering arguments against them.

BI102 Ephesians

Credits: 2

This course is a verse-by-verse study of Ephesians. It examines who Christians are in Christ and how they should live based upon that knowledge.

BI103 Galatians

Dr. Tom Cucuzza

Credits: 3

This course not only shows the necessity of preaching and maintaining the pure gospel of grace, but it also deals with the practical issue of Christian growth through the aid of the Holy Spirit.

BI104 1,2,3 John & Jude

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 2

A thorough study of the letters of John and Jude with special emphasis on refuting false views that result from misunderstanding John's teaching concerning the two natures.

BI105 Gospel of John

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 2

This course is a verse-by-verse study of the fourth gospel. Since John was written as an evangelistic tool, this course will emphasize issues pertaining to salvation by grace through faith.

BI108 I & II Peter

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 3

A verse-by-verse study of the letters of Peter with practical application. Emphasis is given to righteous living as a logical outcome of salvation by grace.

BI109 Bible Doctrine

Dr. Jim Scudder, Jr.

Credits: 3

A comprehensive study of the important doctrines of the Scriptures, including the doctrines of God, salvation, the Holy Spirit, angels, demons, and the end times.

BI110 Church History I

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 3

This course is a detailed study of the true Church of Jesus Christ, from its beginning at the day of Pentecost and down through history to present day. A broader study of the "church" so-called will be presented in Church History II.

BI201 Colossians

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 1

This is a verse-by-verse exposition of Paul's letter to the church at Colosse. Emphasis is given to the preeminence of Christ in creation, our salvation, and our Christian walk.

BI202 Corinthians

Pastor Neal Dearyan

Credits: 2

This is an expository study of I and II Corinthians. It gives careful attention to local church principles such as church discipline and authority. It also examines spiritual gifts, biblical separation, and practical daily living.

BI203 Genesis

Dr. Robert Vanden Bosch

Credits: 3

This is a study that concentrates on creation, the fall of man, the universal flood, and the patriarchs of Israel. Special emphasis is given to the practical application of these historical events.

BI204 Angels, Satan, & Demons

Dr. Robert Lightner

Credits: 2

Angels, Satan, and demons are becoming more popular in society. Religious and non-religious people are telling of encounters that they have had with such beings. This course is an in-depth study that clearly teaches what the Bible says about angels, Satan, and demons.

The Minor Prophets of the Bible are studied. Prophetic teachings are explained, and applications are made for today's living.

BI206 New Testament Survey

A survey of the entire New Testament. This course includes an overview and highlights the harmony of the Gospels, the beginning of the church in Acts, the epistles, and Revelation.

BI207 Old Testament Survey

Credits: 3

This course is intended to give the student a good understanding of the content, history, and customs of the Old Testament. Helpful background information is given which will enhance the student's ability to interpret the Bible.

BI209 Titus & Philemon

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 1

A verse-by-verse exposition of Titus and Philemon. Philemon is seen as both a touching personal letter and an illustration of the doctrine of imputation.

BI210 Church History II

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 3

This is a study of the history of the "church" so-called. Some attention will be given to the origins of the true church, and from there the study will progress into what came to be called "Christianity".

BI211 Hermeneutics

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 1

This is a detailed study of the principles of scriptural interpretation. Concepts such as context, dispensations, illumination, and figures of speech are taught in this course.

BI301 Acts

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 3

An analytical study of the book of Acts showing the biblical foundations of the early development of Christianity. Particular attention is paid to the transition from Israel to the Church and Paul's missionary journeys.

BI302 Bible Maps

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 2

An introduction to the geography of the lands of the Bible. The student will learn about many places mentioned in the Bible and the historical significance of each.

BI306 Philippians

Dr. Richard Keltner

Credits: 1

This is a thorough study of the epistle of the Apostle Paul to the church at Philippi. Emphasis is given to the practical application of devotional truths.

BI307 Proverbs

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 3

This is a verse-by-verse exposition of the book of Proverbs, which is a treasure-house of wisdom for everyday living.

BI308 I & II Timothy

Dr. Tom Cucuzza

Credits: 2

A verse-by-verse exposition of I & II Timothy. Practical teachings of conduct in the local church are developed.

BI309 Romans

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 3

A verse-by-verse exposition of Paul's letter to the church at Rome with attention given to such topics as justification by faith, predestination, election and foreknowledge, and God's continuing plan for Israel.

BI401 Daniel

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 3

This course is a verse-by-verse exposition of the book of Daniel, one of the most important prophetic books of the Bible. Special emphasis is given to the "70 weeks of Daniel."

BI402 Revelation

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 3

An in-depth study of the book of Revelation. This course expounds on the prophetic teachings of the Lord Jesus Christ as given to John.

BI403 Hebrews

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 3

A careful analysis depicting the value of Hebrews in understanding the Old Testament. Detailed examinations are made of difficult passages, types, and devotional features.

UNDER-GRADUATE COURSES

BI404 I & II Thessalonians

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 2

A thorough study of two of Paul's more prophetic books. The Rapture, the Day of the Lord, the Second Coming of Christ, and other subjects of Eschatology are discussed.

BI405 Joshua

Dr. Rod Holler

Credits: 2

This course is a detailed study of the conquest of the land of Canaan under the leadership of Joshua and the spiritual principles revealed therein. In addition, the study looks at the original promise given to Abraham and reviews the events leading up to the Book of Joshua.

BI406 James

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 2

A thorough, verse-by-verse study of the Epistle of James that deals with many practical issues of life.

BI407 Life of Christ

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 3

This course will harmonize the four gospels, examining the life of Christ in chronological order and reconciling apparent contradictions.

Christian Communications

CC301 Internship in Church Printing I

Various Instructors

Credits: 6

The student will learn hands-on use of computer software including Adobe Photoshop, InDesign, and Illustrator. The student will use learned skills to assist in a church design and printing ministry.

CC302 Internship in Church Radio & Video Studio I

Various Instructors

Credits: 6

The student will receive hands-on training in principles of camera operation, boom, jib, and field shooting for recording church services and ministry productions. The student will assist in production mixing and as a production technician.

CC401 Internship in Church Printing II

Various Instructors

Credits: 6

Senior students will be given hands-on experience in all aspects of an efficient, Christian publishing ministry. They will gain expertise in everything from computer layout to four-color printing, cutting, folding, collating, and binding.

CC402 Internship in Church Radio & Video Studio II

Various Instructors

Credits: 6

The student will join the production team and will be required to participate for a minimum of 6 hours each week for one semester.

Christian Education

CE101 English Grammar for Ministry

Karen Vacko

Credits: 1

A basic course in English grammar. This is an excellent review of the fundamentals of English Grammar and is a helpful primer for ESL students.

CE102 Introduction to Special Education/Observation

Lisa Stankus

Credits: 2

The student will be required to observe and participate 1 hour per week in the special education department. The student will then write a 500 word essay based on their observations. The topic question for the report will be given by the instructor.

CE103 Philosophy of Christian Education

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 1

This course will give the student a thorough understanding of the biblical basis of Christian education. Particular emphasis is given to those things that make Christian education distinct from other forms.

CE104 Church School Classroom Management

Cindy Stringer

Credits: 3

An in-depth course of instruction for the student called to teach. Topics covered include daily routines, planning, bulletin boards, procedures, behavior management, and classroom layout. The student will be required to develop and implement procedures and a philosophy of classroom management.

CE117 Church School Internship I

Various Instructors

Credits: 3

The student will receive hands-on training in the day-to-day operations of a Christian school.

CE118 Church Preschool Education Internship I

Various Instructors

Credits: 3

The student will receive hands-on training in the day-to-day operations of a Christian preschool.

UNDER-GRADUATE COURSES

CE201 English Composition for Ministry

Karen Vacko

Credits: 1

A basic course designed to improve the student's writing skills.

CE202 Church School Dyslexia: Symptoms & Solutions

Various Instructors

Credits: 3

The student will learn to teach an explicit, systematic, multisensory approach to reading, writing, and spelling. A minimum of 2 hours/week will be spent in using the skills learned in a tutoring environment.

CE203 Church School Reading I

Various Instructors

Credits: 1

This course is designed to acquaint students with a variety of reading programs and approaches used in a Christian school. Emphasis will be placed on the reading process and useful curriculum and products specific to the early stages of readiness through the school years. The students will be introduced to 3 different reading programs over the next three years.

CE217 Church School Internship II

Various Instructors

Credits: 3

The student will receive hands-on training in the day-to-day operations of a Christian school.

CE218 Church Preschool Education Internship II

Various Instructors

Credits: 3

The student will receive hands-on training in the day-to-day operations of a Christian preschool.

CE302 Church School Biology

Dr. Robert Tanney

Credits: 4

This course in biology presents facts and basic principles to provide an understanding of the complexity of living things. Areas of study include the scientific method, chemical principles, genetics, classification of living things, plant life, animal life, and human life.

CE303 Christian Perspective on Special Education

Lisa Stankus

Credits: 3

This course will include a study of the history, legal, and social foundations of special education. Some focus will be given to the identification of exceptionalities and creating appropriate teaching/learning strategies.

CE304 Church School Junior High Math

Various Instructors

Credits: 4

This course is an excellent review of the fundamentals of math. Starting with ratios and proportions, the course includes metric systems, angles, equations, prime factors, Pythagorean Theorem, banking, investments, taxes, insurance, and more.

CE305 Church School Physical Science

Various Instructors

Credits: 3

A course introducing the student to various areas of science from a thoroughly Christian viewpoint.

CE306 Developing Godly Children: Early Years

Julie Dearyan

Credits: 2

The development of a child is taught starting at birth through age 9. Areas covered are emotional health, cognitive development, family and peer relationships, personal growth, and character formation.

CE307 Developing Godly Children: Health & Nutrition

Meg Tanney, RN

Credits: 2

This study teaches health, safety and nutritional approaches as they pertain to children from birth through age 12. Health issues relating to physical growth and development are covered, including health risks and issues that are specific to certain age groups. Immunizations and communicable diseases are included in this study, along with safety concerns and hazards as they relate to children. Nutrition concepts include the basic food groups and the importance of a well-balanced diet.

CE308 Individualized Learning: How To Start & Maintain a Christian School

Dr. Dell Johnson

Credits: 2

This course gives reasons for Christian Education and the value of the method of individualized education used by ACE as well as important procedures to follow to start and maintain a Christian school.

CE309 Spiritual Creative Teaching

Various Instructors

Credits: 2

This course studies various methods for teaching children, starting with the Master Teacher Himself, Jesus Christ. The student learns how to make effective use of various teaching techniques and the different learning styles of children. This course helps the student discover how to use teaching gifts in the greatest possible way.

UNDER-GRADUATE COURSES

CE311 US History With A Biblical Perspective I

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 3

This course traces the development of American civilization, including key historical personalities and cultural distinctives. It includes a much-needed emphasis on the place of God and the Bible in U.S. History. The study involves United States history from the founding of the nation through the end of the 1840's.

CE312 World History With A Biblical Perspective I

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 3

This course is a fascinating look at world history from a Christian perspective. Recognizing the redemption of man as the focal point of everything, this study presents people and events as they influence or were influenced by God's plan for Messiah. Starting with the Christian philosophy of history, this course includes Origins, Satan and his influence, God's judgment, and the history of specific nations and empires extending through ancient history and the middle ages.

CE313 Church School Reading Practicum II

Various Instructors

Credits: 2

The Dayspring student will observe a minimum of 5 Quentin Road Christian School students. Readmaster, a required component of the curriculum at Quentin Road Christian School, is utilized by students grades 1–12. Readmaster is a computerized program that strives to build and develop silent reading fluency and comprehension.

CE314 Teaching Math: Mild Disabilities

Various Instructors

Credits: 2

The student will be trained in using the Touch Math method for students with mild learning disabilities.

CE315 Behavior Management

Lisa Stankus

Credits: 3

The student will learn ways to motivate and encourage students as well as gain and keep proper control within a classroom. The student will be required to develop and implement a classroom management tool and an individual management tool.

CE316 Language Arts: Just Write

Various Instructors

Credits: 2

A course on teaching written expression to students with mild learning disabilities. The students will become acquainted with various methods and materials for the teaching of functional and creative writing and handwriting.

CE317 Church School Internship III

Various Instructors

Credits: 3

The student will receive hands-on training in the day-to-day operations of a Christian school.

CE318 Church Preschool Education Internship III

Various Instructors

Credits: 3

The student will receive hands-on training in the day-to-day operations of a Christian preschool.

CE319 Church School Special Education Internship I

Various Instructors

Credits: 6

The student will receive hands-on training in working with special needs students.

CE402 Christian Preschool Administration

Various Instructors

Credits: 3

This course explains basic office skills, enrollment, record keeping, finances, plus promotion and advertising as they pertain to a preschool.

CE403 Church School Elementary Math

Various Instructors

Credits: 3

This course is an excellent review of the fundamentals of math. Starting with basic addition, the course includes metric systems, money, fractions and more.

CE405 Church School Algebra

Dr. Ron Tagliapietra

Credits: 3

This course covers linear and quadratic functions, trigonometric functions, and identities, radical and logarithmic functions, and statistics.

CE406 Church School Chemistry

Dr. Robert Tanney

Credits: 4

Chemistry is a foundational college-level course which will provide the student the fundamentals of this central science and allow for a deeper understanding of the Creator/Designer's hand in our physical world. The student will learn the composition of matter, the chemical and physical changes that matter undergoes, and the energy changes that accompany these processes. Building on these fundamentals of inorganic chemistry, the course ends with the basics of electro-chemistry, nuclear chemistry, and organic chemistry.

UNDER-GRADUATE COURSES

CE409 Church School World Geography

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 3

A basic course covering the factors and concepts of geography. The material covered comprises an examination of the basic elements in the earth's environment with emphasis on demographics and physical features.

CE410 Developing Godly Children: Physical Education

Julie Dearyan

Credits: 2

This course teaches the student how to develop small and large motor skills in children in the preschool setting.

CE411 US History With A Biblical Perspective II

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 3

This course traces the development of American civilization, including key historical personalities and cultural distinctives. It includes a much-needed emphasis on the place of God and the Bible in U.S. History. The course picks up on US history in the 1850's through present day.

CE412 World History With A Biblical Perspective II

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 3

This course is a fascinating look at world history from a Christian perspective. Recognizing the redemption of man as the focal point of everything, this study presents people and events as they influence or were influenced by God's plan for Messiah. This courses continues with the study of world history from the Renaissance and Reformation through present day.

CE417 Church School Internship IV

Various Instructors

Credits: 3

The student will receive hands-on training in the day-to-day operations of a Christian school.

CE418 Church Preschool Education Internship IV

Various Instructors

Credits: 3

The student will receive hands-on training in the day-to-day operations of a Christian preschool.

CE419 Church School Special Education Internship II

Various Instructors

Credits: 6

The student will receive hands-on training in working with special needs students.

Chaplaincy

CH501 Biblical Attitude Toward War

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

This course focuses on the Bible and the Christian's attitude toward war and the profession of arms. It centers on the Bible and how the professions of law enforcement and the military relate to it.

CH502 Christian Perspective on Counseling PTSD

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

Chaplains have a key ministry in the identification and treatment of Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). The natures of the units where Chaplains are found have the potential of exposing their professionals to traumatic events that impact them with depression, possible suicidal and homicidal thoughts, extreme panic, or disorganized thinking. The Chaplain can be a key counselor in developing an atmosphere of trust and open discussion to treat those suffering with PTSD.

CH503 Christian Positions on War

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

The course will consist of the four historical Christian positions regarding participation in war. Each view will be examined through the writings of well known authors of each position. The course will then examine the Biblical concepts of war. This is a practical presentation of issues with which every Pastor should be familiar.

CH504 Constitutionality of the Chaplaincy

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

This course deals with the legal and constitutional issues of the military, Veterans Administration Chaplains, and local police and fire Chaplains. It deals with the Constitutional mandate and basic concepts on which the Chaplaincy and ministry are based.

CH505 Ministering to the Military

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

The course teaches the basic ministry to the military in both peace and war. A specialized devotional and discipleship program, using the *Christian Life Handbook*, has been developed for the mobile military society. These materials will be taught with principles and applications that can be used in various church programs.

CH506 Religious Pluralism in Military/Federal Society

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

The course gives the student an overview of the major issues that cause the most religious concerns within military societies. Some conclusions are offered in the defense of religious pluralism to show that it can work in Chaplain ministry on a day-to-day basis. Additionally, military commands can fulfill their moral and legal obligation to their subordinates in providing religious support and guaranteeing religious freedom.

CH507 The Soldier's Biblical Right to Kill

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

The course is a study in the basic issues and beliefs held by the Christian community. It forms an overview of the classical beliefs as they impact the soldier and the military in which he serves. The study will acquaint the student with the issues involved and how Christian believers have historically resolved their inner conflicts regarding participating in war.

CH508 Effective Ministry in a Military Setting

Captain Dale Parker (Navy Retired)

Credits: 2

To be effective in a military chaplaincy setting, a person must learn the structure, chain of command, and protocol of all branches of the military, as well as how to interact and minister to men and women serving their country. This course will teach the student how to successfully utilize special ministry skills.

CH601 Biblical View of Military Decision Making

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

Understanding the decision-making process of the military and government is essential to anyone ministering in their society. The material studied here will enable the Chaplain to understand and function in government agencies.

CH602 Biblical View of the Literature of War

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

This course studies the literature written by soldiers in conflict. It is a look into the soldier's heart that is critical to any Chaplain who is serious about reaching them for Christ.

CH603 Christian Ethics & Morals in War

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

The complexities of modern warfare suggest the need for a basic knowledge of morality and war and the issues involved. The Chaplain should be a key professional in these matters.

CH604 Christian Ethics in Command

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

The military is a profession of arms and has ethical dimensions that directly connect to the moral issues associated with warfare. The Chaplain may be asked for guidance in these matters and should have a basic knowledge of the nature of the profession and issues involved in such decisions.

CH605 Christian Ethics in Strategy

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

Conducting war is a moral concern as well as a strategic one. Planning and conducting war is affected by traditional professional values that affect judgment and the outcome of plans and practice. There is a thin line between incompetence and immorality in the military profession. The Chaplain should be a competent advisor in these matters.

CH606 The Chaplain & Military Writing

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

The Chaplain must have the ability to read and write in the military formats in order to be effective. This is a practical course that will help all Chaplains and Pastors to write clear and decisive directives and instructions.

CH607 The Biblical Definition of the Transformation of War

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

The world is fast entering an era of changing warfare, where the familiar forms of armed conflict are giving way to radical new ones. This transformation is studied in the light of Revelation and a biblical description of the Last Days.

Christian Living

CL101 Biblical Separation

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 2

An in-depth study of the biblical teaching of separation, both ecclesiastical and personal.

CL102 Principles of Christian Music

Dr. Michael Floyd/ Dr. Jim Scudder, Jr./ Pastor Cary Schmidt

Credits: 1

This course is a study of both biblical and musical principles that speak to the issue of what type of music is appropriate for Christians. It also covers the appearance, attitude, and qualifications of Christian artists as well as the issue of leadership in the church.

UNDER-GRADUATE COURSES

CL103 Discipleship I

Pastor Paul Julian

Credits: 1

This course consists of lectures on discipleship and is an opportunity for the student to be plugged into the Talk Time discipleship program.

CL104 Bible Study Software

Dr. Tom Cucuzza

Credits: 1

An overview of using computer software in personal study and for preparing sermons.

CL105 Christian Manhood

Pastor Dan Reehoff

Credits: .5

A study of what the Bible expects from the Christian man.

CL106 Christian Womanhood

Aimee Reehoff

Credits: .5

A study of what the Bible expects from the Christian woman.

CL201 Bible Study Methods

Dr. Michael Floyd

Credits: 1

An excellent course teaching simple and effective methods of study to get the most from the Bible.

CL204 Foundations for the Biblical Family

Dr. James Scudder, Sr.

Credits: 1

An in-depth study from the Word of God on the family. This detailed study explains the biblical role of the father, the mother, and the children. Much emphasis is given to how parents are to train their children.

CL205 Wine in the Bible

Dr. Jim Scudder, Jr.

Credits: 1

This course covers the use of wine in the Bible, both intoxicating and non-intoxicating, and the use of alcohol and its impact on society today.

CL213 Discipleship II

Various Instructors

Credits: 1

After completing Discipleship I, the student will progress to become an instructor in the Talk Time program.

CL214 Spiritual Gifts

Dr. Robert Vanden Bosch

Credits: 3

This course covers what the Bible has to say about spiritual gifts. It defines each of the spiritual gifts and looks at its function in the body of Christ. The student will see the relationship of spiritual gifts in the work of the ministry today.

CL301 Christian Ethics in Ministry

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 1

A study of ethics in the Christian life as well as in the ministry. Topics covered include dealing with other ministries and people from those ministries. Practical insights are logically developed and presented to provide the student with an opportunity to grow spiritually in character and ethics.

Christian Political Science

CP101 Biblical Philosophy of Government

Dr. Robert Vanden Bosch

Credits: 3

This course is a historical study of government since creation with a biblical perspective. This course not only looks at the biblical basis of government, but also at the philosophical development of government in the major world governments from a biblical perspective.

CP201 US Constitution & Religious Freedom

Dr. Robert Vanden Bosch

Credits: 3

Understanding the U.S. Constitution is fundamental to understanding American government. Because it is the skeleton that holds together our republic, students will begin to understand the impact of the Constitution and the proper interpretation of it.

CP301 American Government & the Church

Dr. Robert Vanden Bosch

Credits: 3

This course looks at the basis and development of American government from the days of the founding fathers until today. This helps the student understand how the American government operates and its functions.

CP302 Christian Perspective on Lobbying

Dr. Robert Vanden Bosch

Credits: 3

This course gives a basic understanding of lobbying issues and ethics in government. It helps students understand how to influence the decisions of government, and shows how lobbying may be direct (to lawmakers) or indirect (influencing public opinion). It also demonstrates how to present white papers on various issues, persuade people to change their votes, and how to prepare testimony before legislative committees.

CP304 Founding Fathers & the Constitution

Dr. Robert Vanden Bosch

Credits: 2

This course identifies a number of the leading Founding Fathers and demonstrates that most of them were either believers or based their values on a biblical worldview, thus affecting the nature of our nation and Constitution.

UNDER-GRADUATE COURSES

CP309 Christian Lobbying Internship

Dr. Robert Vanden Bosch

Credits: 8

A practical internship that will take place in the Spring semester when the Illinois General Assembly is in session. Students will travel to the Illinois Capital and learn how to lobby the legislature effectively.

CP401 Biblical Analysis of Public Policy

Dr. Robert Vanden Bosch

Credits: 3

Every piece of legislation has a set of goals before it. This class will teach students how to analyze legislation and determine the best way to reach a policy goal in legislation. It will teach students to analyze not only the goals, but also the impact of legislation.

CP402 Christian Political Communications

Dr. Robert Vanden Bosch

Credits: 3

This course helps students to understand the relationship between media and politics. Will teach the proper methods of writing press releases, press conferences, and communications by radio and television. Students will be required to develop communications in radio, television, print, and internet communications.

CP403 Christian Impact on Policy

Dr. Robert Vanden Bosch

Credits: 3

Students will be required to understand the Blue Book of Politics and how to design and operate a political campaign that is effective.

CP404 Government: From Adam to Present Day

Dr. Robert Vanden Bosch

Credits: 3

This course looks at the variety of different governments, comparing them and noting their contrasts as well as comparisons. It helps students to understand different forms of governments and their mindsets which develop from different cultures.

CP409 Campaign Internship

Dr. Robert Vanden Bosch

Credits: 8

Interns will work with various candidates and campaigns, learning not only campaign strategy, but understanding the nuts and bolts of campaigns.

CP419 Governmental Internship

Dr. Robert Vanden Bosch

Credits: 8

These unpaid internships will take place in various public offices, varying from townships, county offices, and legislative offices.

MU101/102 Private Instruction Piano I & II

Various Instructors

Credits: 1/semester

MU212 Piano Accompanying Made Simple

Credits: 1

A 4-part course that includes: Modulating Made Simple—Techniques & chord patterns to use to get from one key to another; Accompanying Made Simple—Tools & tips to create accompaniments for soloists, vocalists, instrumentalists and the technique involved in transposing the accompaniment to various keys; Congregational Playing Made Simple—How to give your hymn playing more fullness and forward motion; and Exciting Congregational Playing—How to develop excitement in congregational playing that generates enthusiasm in congregational singing.

MU301 Christian Music Theory III

Joy Laegeler

Credits: 3

MU302 Church Choral Conducting I

Linda Scudder

Credits: 2

The fundamentals and technique of choral conducting are taught. The student will be instructed in the basic patterns for choral conducting, to train choral groups, and to conduct an effective rehearsal.

MU303 Church Music Internship I

Joy Laegeler

Credits: 1

The student will work with church staff in assisting with the church-school choirs, including special church music events.

MU305/306 Private Instruction Instrument V & VI

Various Instructors

Credits: 1/semester

Students will receive personalized weekly lessons with an instructor. The student will be required to practice a minimum of a teacher-specified number of hours each week and come prepared for the weekly lesson.

MU307 Survey of Sacred Music

Various Instructors

Credits: 2

This is the study of the placement and history of Sacred Music and how it applies to music in the church. This course studies the development of different styles of sacred music throughout the last three centuries which has influenced the church's music today.

MU308/309 Private Instruction Voice V & VI

Various Instructors

Credits: 1/semester

Students will receive personalized weekly lessons with an instructor. The student will be required to practice a minimum of a teacher-specified number of hours each week and come prepared for the weekly lesson.

MU311 Christian Music Theory IV

Joy Laegeler

Credits: 3

The four levels of Music Theory incorporate the technical aspects of creating music, from basic notation skills to advanced musical scores; all aspects of pitch and ear training; as well as melodic and harmonic construction techniques.

MU312 Church Choral Conducting II

Joy Laegeler

Credits: 2

Each student will have a 9-week rotation in QRCS children's choirs. The student will learn to prepare for and direct a children's choir. Each student will direct one performance.

MU313 Church Music Internship II

Joy Laegeler

Credits: 1

The student will work with church music staff in assisting with the church-school choirs, including special church music events.

MU314/315 Private Instruction Piano V & VI

Various Instructors

Credits: 1/semester

Students will receive personalized weekly lessons with an instructor. The student will be required to practice a minimum of a teacher-specified number of hours each week and come prepared for the weekly lesson.

MU316 Applied Keyboard Instruction (*Piano only*)

Joy Laegeler

Credits: 1

The exploration of keyboard technology will be used to aid the student in the use of electronic keyboards to further enhance music ministry.

MU317 Accompanying (*Piano only*)

Credits: 2

The student will be instructed in the technique of accompanying vocalists. This will include children's choirs, soloists, and groups. The student will be required to accompany 3 selections in church services.

MU323 Church Music Internship III

Joy Laegeler

Credits: 1

The student will work with church music staff in assisting with the church-school choirs, including special church music events.

MU333 Church Music Internship IV

Joy Laegeler

Credits: 1

The student will work with church school staff in assisting with the church-school choirs, including special church music events.

MU402 Church Engineering & Lighting

Pastor David Rende

Credits: 2

This is a 4-week course covering the basic fundamentals of building a sound system as well as basic lighting techniques.

MU403 Church Music Administration

Pastor David Rende

Credits: 2

This is a 4-week rotation with the music faculty to plan music for the church service. Each student will also learn the administration of the church choir.

MU404 Church Sound

Pastor David Rende

Credits: 2

This is a 4-week course given in the sound booth. Each student will learn to operate the board as well as the basics of the sound system. Each student will do a 4-week rotation in the sound booth for a church service.

MU405/406 Private Instruction Instrument VII & VIII

Various Instructors

Credits: 1/semester

Students will receive personalized weekly lessons with an instructor. The student will be required to practice a minimum of a teacher-specified number of hours each week and come prepared for the weekly lesson.

MU408/409 Private Instruction Voice VII & VIII

Various Instructors

Credits: 1/semester

Students will receive personalized weekly lessons with an instructor. The student will be required to practice a minimum of a teacher-specified number of hours each week and come prepared for the weekly lesson.

MU410/411 Private Instruction Piano VII & VIII

Various Instructors

Credits: 1/semester

Students will receive personalized weekly lessons with an instructor. The student will be required to practice a minimum of a teacher-specified number of hours each week and come prepared for the weekly lesson.

MU412 Teaching Techniques

Credits: 1

The student will be instructed in different methods of teaching music to varying age groups.

MU413 Directed Teaching

Credits: 1

The student will teach 2 hours a week based on their proficiency. This will be overseen by the music faculty.

MU414 Piano/Instrument Performance

Credits: 2

The student will be assigned a musical selection based on their proficiency. They will perform the selection in a church service.

MU415 Congregational Hymn Playing

Credits: 2/semester

The student will be instructed in the technique of accompanying a song leader in a church service as well as improvisational techniques. The student will have a 4-week rotation of hymn playing in church services.

MU416 Vocal Performance

Various Instructors

Credits: 2

The student will be assigned a musical selection based on their proficiency. They will perform the selection in a church service.

MI102 Introduction to Missions

Dr. Randy King

Credits: 1

An introduction to the requirements involved in following God's call to the foreign mission field. Topics include knowing the call, appointment setting, deputation, and how to handle and present yourself.

MI201 Biographies of Missionaries

Various Instructors

Credits: 3

This course is a study of the biographies of several famous Christians. The lives of these believers are studied, the Christian principles guiding their lives are outlined, and their significance is explained.

MI301 Spanish I

Online

Credits: 3

The student will learn to converse in a foreign language using Rosetta Stone software.

MI311 Foreign Language I

Online

Credits: 3

The student will learn to converse in a foreign language using Rosetta Stone software.

MI401 Spanish II

Online

Credits: 3

The student will learn to converse in a foreign language using Rosetta Stone software.

MI402 Anthropology

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 3

This course traces the origins, physical and cultural development, social customs, and beliefs of man with an emphasis on God and the Bible.

MI403 History of Modern Mission

Dr. Robert Vanden Bosch

Credits: 2

This is a study of missionary efforts in the church age with emphasis on the modern missions movement. Concepts and history are studied and evaluated by comparison to the Scriptures.

MI409 Short-Term Christian Missions

Various Instructors

Credits: 6

The student will earn credits by participating in a Dayspring-approved short-term mission trip.

MI411 Foreign Language II

Online

Credits: 3

The student will learn to converse in a foreign language using Rosetta Stone software.

MI419 Israel Trip

Various Instructors

Credits: 6

The student will earn credits by participating in a Dayspring-approved trip to Israel.

Theology

TH101 The Errors of Calvinism & Arminianism

Dr. Jim Scudder, Jr.

Credits: .5

This course involves a basic examination of two major theological systems — Calvinism (a group of doctrines purporting that God preselects some to save and by default, preselects others to damn) and Arminianism (a group of doctrines designed to refute Calvinism but go too far and teach that an individual can lose salvation) both of which have major errors and lead to much confusion in the church.

TH201 Eschatology

Dr. Bill Shade

Credits: 2

This course defines the two major views concerning prophecy and traces the ultimate triumph of God over the earth, the nation Israel, and the Church. Examines the precise and legal language of the great Covenants of God and His ability and intention to fulfill each of them in accordance with their specific terms. The student will be able to trace the distinctions between God's program for Israel, His program for the world, and His program for the Church.

TH301 Dispensationalism

Dr. Bill Shade

Credits: 2

A study of the Biblical doctrine of dispensationalism, with its principles and hermeneutics, answers to its opponents, and a survey of the dispensations.

TH302 Homiletics

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 3

This course covers the preparation and delivery of many different kinds of sermons. The student will be required to prepare (outline) and deliver an expository and a topical sermon.

TH303 Sovereignty of God

Dr. Rod Holler

Credits: 2

This is an intense study that focuses on the supreme authority of God. The student will gain understanding of the glorious wonders of God by learning about His sovereignty and His direction in the details of people's lives. A case study in the life of Joseph is included because it illustrates the principles of God's sovereignty and providence.

UNDER-GRADUATE COURSES

TH304 Old Testament Hebrew

Dr. Larry Bednar

Credits: 6

The student learns the fundamentals of Hebrew grammar and is adequately prepared to study the original Hebrew text.

TH305 New Testament Greek

Various Instructors

Credits: 6

The student learns the fundamentals of Greek grammar and is adequately prepared to study the original Greek text.

TH401 Systematic Theology

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 6

This course is a very detailed, highly organized study of Biblical theology. Unlike many theology courses, it is entirely based on the Bible and not the writings of men. It is specifically designed for men who intend to be pastors.

TH402 Person & Work of the Holy Spirit

Dr. Robert Lightner

Credits: 2

This course is a detailed exposition of the biblical doctrine of the Holy Spirit. Emphasis is given to His personality, His deity, and His works in both the Old and New Testament.

Post-Graduate Courses

Bible Doctrine

BI501 “Daniel”

Dr. John Walvoord

Credits: 3

This book by John Walvoord is regarded as a classic. The student will read the book and turn in notes that will be graded.

BI503 “Genesis”

Dr. John R. Rice

Credits: 3

This book by John R. Rice is an excellent exposition of the first book of the Bible. Rice pays special attention to the literal 6-day creation.

BI504 “Hebrews”

James T. Draper

Credits: 3

This book is an excellent exposition of the book of Hebrews. The author gives especial attention to the “difficult” passages of Hebrews.

BI505 “The Gospel of John”

Dr. Harry A. Ironside

Credits: 4

The eternal truth of God’s plan of salvation is explained in Ironside’s clear, concise manner.

BI506 “Revelation”

Dr. John Walvoord

Credits: 3

Walvoord’s book on Revelation is regarded as a classic by many dispensational scholars.

BI507 “Romans”

William R. Newell

Credits: 4

While Newell’s method is scholarly and analytical, his exposition of the text is practical and devotional. Helpful comments on both the Greek and English texts illuminate the flow of thought.

BI508 “Acts”

Dr. Harry A. Ironside

Credits: 4

This book on Acts is highly regarded as a verse-by-verse commentary in Ironside’s readable style.

BI550 Thesis

Credits: 6

Upon completion of the course of study in Biblical Studies, the student is to write a 20,000 word thesis. The student is to work with the college administration to determine a subject for the thesis. The student is expected to research his subject thoroughly. Guidelines for the layout, footnotes, and bibliography are available at the school office. Careful attention must be given to biblical accuracy as well as grammar and composition.

Chaplaincy

CH501 Biblical Attitude Toward War

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

This course focuses on the Bible and the Christian's attitude toward war and the profession of arms. It centers on the Bible and how the professions of law enforcement and the military relate to it.

CH502 Christian Perspective on Counseling PTSD

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

Chaplains have a key ministry in the identification and treatment of Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). The natures of the units where Chaplains are found have the potential of exposing their professionals to traumatic events that impact them with depression, possible suicidal and homicidal thoughts, extreme panic, or disorganized thinking. The Chaplain can be a key counselor in developing an atmosphere of trust and open discussion to treat those suffering with PTSD.

CH503 Christian Positions on War

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

The course will consist of the four historical Christian positions regarding participation in war. Each view will be examined through the writings of well known authors of each position. The course will then examine the biblical concepts of war. This is a practical presentation of issues with which every Pastor should be familiar.

CH504 Constitutionality of the Chaplaincy

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

This course deals with the legal and constitutional issues of the military, Veterans Administration Chaplains, and local police and fire Chaplains. It deals with the Constitutional mandate and basic concepts on which the Chaplaincy and ministry are based.

CH505 Ministering to the Military

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

The course teaches the basic ministry to the military in both peace and war. A specialized devotional and discipleship program, using the *Christian Life Handbook*, has been developed especially for the mobile military society. These materials will be taught with principles and applications that can be used in various church programs.

CH506 Religious Pluralism in Military/Federal Society

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

The course gives the student an overview of the major issues that cause the most religious concerns within military societies. Some conclusions are offered in the defense of religious pluralism to show that it can work in Chaplain ministry on a day-to-day basis. Additionally, military commands can fulfill their moral and legal obligation to their subordinates in providing religious support and guaranteeing religious freedom.

CH507 The Soldiers Biblical Right to Kill

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

The course is a study in the basic issues and beliefs held by the Christian community. It forms an overview of the classical beliefs as they impact the soldier and the military in which he serves. The study will acquaint the student with the issues involved and how Christian believers have historically resolved their inner conflicts regarding participating in war.

CH601 Biblical View of Military Decision Making

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

Understanding the decision-making process of the military and government is essential to anyone ministering in their society. The material studied here will enable the Chaplain to understand and function in government agencies.

CH602 Biblical View of the Literature of War

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

This course studies the literature written by soldiers in conflict. It is a look into the soldier's heart that is critical to any Chaplain who is serious about reaching them for Christ.

CH603 Christian Ethics & Morals in War

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

The complexities of modern warfare suggest the need for a basic knowledge of morality and war and the issues involved. The Chaplain should be a key professional in these matters.

CH604 Christian Ethics in Command

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

The military is a profession of arms and has ethical dimensions that directly connect to the moral issues associated with warfare. The Chaplain may be asked for guidance in these matters and should have a basic knowledge of the nature of the profession and issues involved in such decisions.

CH605 Christian Ethics in Strategy

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

Conducting war is a moral concern as well as a strategic one. Planning and conducting war is affected by traditional professional values that affect judgment and the outcome of plans and practice. There is a thin line between incompetence and immorality in the military profession. The Chaplain should be a competent advisor in these matters.

CH606 The Chaplain & Military Writing

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

The Chaplain must have the ability to read and write in the military formats in order to be effective. This is a practical course that will help all Chaplains and Pastors to write clear and decisive directives and instructions.

CH607 The Biblical Definition of the Transformation of War

Dr. Joseph Howe

Credits: 3

The world is fast entering an era of changing warfare, where the familiar forms of armed conflict are giving away to radical new ones. This transformation is studied in the light of Revelation and a biblical description of the Last Days.

CH550 Thesis

Credits: 6

Upon completion of the course of study in Chaplaincy, the student is to write a 20,000 word thesis. The student is to work with the college administration to determine a subject for the thesis. The student is expected to research his subject thoroughly. Guidelines for the layout, footnotes, and bibliography are available at the school office. Careful attention must be given to biblical accuracy as well as grammar and composition.

Christian Music Education

MU501/502/511/512 Conducting a Church-School Choir

Joy Laegeler

Credits: 1/semester

The student will direct the Quentin Road Baptist Church choir through the preparation and performance of one anthem. The student will work under the direction of the Music Department and will be graded accordingly.

MU503/504/513/514 Developing a Church-School Choir

Joy Laegeler

Credits: 1/semester

The student will participate in developing, training, and directing the children's choirs of the Quentin Road Christian School and Preschool. The student will work under the direction of the Music Department and will be graded accordingly.

MU505 "Geometry of Music: Harmony and Counterpoint in Extended Common Practice" Dimitri Tymoczko

Credits: 3

Tymoczko identifies five basic musical features that jointly contribute to the sense of tonality and shows how these features recur throughout the history of Western music. The book shows how to construct simple diagrams representing relationships among familiar chords and scales, giving readers the tools to translate between the musical and visual realms and revealing surprising degrees of structure in otherwise hard-to-understand pieces.

MU506/507/516/517 Piano Pedagogy

Joy Laegeler

Credits: 2/semester

The student should be qualified to teach and train in instrumental techniques. The student will work under the direction of the Music Department and will be graded accordingly.

MU508/509/518/519 Piano Proficiency

Joy Laegeler

Credits: 1/semester

The student should be qualified to teach and train in instrumental techniques. The student will work under the direction of the Music Department and will be graded accordingly.

MU510 Elementary Music Methods

Joy Laegeler

Credits: 3

The student will learn the best practices for teaching music to elementary age students.

MU520/521/522/523 Vocal Pedagogy

Joy Laegeler

Credits: 2/semester

The student should be qualified to teach and train in vocal techniques. The student will work under the direction of the Music Department and will be graded accordingly.

MU525 "How to Teach Piano Successfully"

James W. Bastien

Credits: 3

This book contains a myriad of helpful information and suggestions for piano teachers. Part One contains helpful hints on setting up your studio and making it more professional, an overview of different methods of teaching, and lists of piano methods and publishers of piano music.

MU526 Composition & Arranging

Joy Laegeler

Credits: 3

Guiding principles of composition and arranging are studied.

MU530/531/532/533 Vocal Proficiency

Joy Laegeler

Credits: 1/semester

The student should be qualified to teach and train in vocal techniques. The student will work under the direction of the Music Department and will be graded accordingly.

MU535 "How to Train Singers"

Laura Browning Henderson

Credits: 3

For choral directors, voice teachers, and singers, this practical handbook provides a step-by-step method to aid in building the voice. It shows how to train singers to use their voices with versatility, freedom, ease, endurance, and without damage or discomfort in the throat. The method is based on scientific principles and natural coordination of the human anatomy. It focuses on all parts of the voice and can be used daily to warm up the many muscles involved in singing.

MU545 "Introduction to Music Theory"

Catherine Schmidt-Jones

Credits: 3

This course includes a review of common notation and an introduction to the physics behind music theory, as well as the basic concepts of music theory and a few slightly advanced but very useful topics, such as transposition.

MU546 "Hymnproviser 1, 2, 3"

Shelly Hamilton

Credits: 3

The Hymnproviser series is acclaimed as one of the most comprehensive and effective hymnplaying tools for sacred pianists today. *The Art of Hymnprovising Text/Workbook* carries the prerequisite of the ability to play four parts out

of a hymnbook. Book 1 in the series covers basic music foundations, theory, developing improvisation/hymnplaying, and ear training.

MU550 Thesis

Credits: 6

The student will be required to arrange a hymn which will be selected together with the Music Department. In addition, the student must arrange one original composition, the content determined collectively with the Music Department. The arrangements must be submitted in hand notation or computer program. This extensive exercise will demonstrate the student's ability to perform and apply their musical knowledge. In fulfilling all requirements, this will be the equivalent of a Master's thesis.

Emphasis in Bible College Administration

BC501 Biblical Philosophy of a Bible College

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 3

This class will discuss the importance of Bible colleges, essentials of the curriculum, the Biblical basis for Christian education, and the Christian philosophy of education.

BC502 Organization and Operation of a Bible College

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 3

This course will deal with the structure and setup of a Bible college. It will discuss Administration, Officers, as well as staffing the positions and personnel.

BC503 Preparing and Teaching a Bible College Course

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 3

This course of study will examine the character of a Biblical teacher, knowledge and the fear of the Lord, how to develop a Bible college course, the seven laws of teaching, and testing and measurement.

BC504 Bible College Administration: Academic Affairs

Dr. Jim Lewis

Credits: 3

This course will deal with issues within the classroom such as proper record keeping and documentation.

BC505 Spiritual Leadership

Dr. Phil Stringer

Credits: 3

This course will focus on the spiritual characteristics that are required of a leader running a Bible College.

BC506 Bible College Administration: Student Affairs

Dr. Jim Lewis

Credits: 3

This course will focus on dealing with student issues outside of the classroom.

Theology

TH502 “Basic Theology”

Dr. Charles Ryrie

Credits: 3

Theology simply means thinking about God and expressing those thoughts in some way. But sloppy theology is a problem. As Christians, our thoughts about God need to coincide with what He has said about Himself in the Bible. With his clear understanding of the Scriptures and unpretentious writing style, Charles Ryrie has written *Basic Theology* for every student of God’s Word, from the devotional student to the seminary student.

TH503 “The Death Christ Died”

Dr. Robert Lightner

Credits: 3

The resurgence of covenant Reformed theology raises again the long-standing debate concerning the extent of the atonement—limited or unlimited? Lightner addresses the question, “Who did Christ die for?” Accepting the position of limited atonement affects the way in which the Gospel is presented.

TH505 “Dispensationalism”

Dr. Charles Ryrie

Credits: 3

Dr. Ryrie addresses this crucial issue from the perspective of classic dispensationalism. He confronts the views of covenant theology, historical premillennialism, ultradispensationalism, and, in this revised edition, the increasingly popular progressive dispensationalism.

TH506 “Handbook of Evangelical Theology”

Dr. Robert Lightner

Credits: 3

A survey of nine key Bible doctrines and the various positions within the evangelical church with respect to each doctrine.

TH507 “Neoevangelicalism”

Dr. Robert Lightner

Credits: 3

Dr. Lightner tackles the issues of fundamentalism, liberalism, and the fundamental doctrines of the faith.

TH508 “Notes on the Pentateuch”

C. H. Mackintosh

Credits: 5

For more than one hundred years, pastors, teachers, and students of the Bible have benefited from Mackintosh’s deeply devotional commentary on the first five books of the Bible. His reflections are borne out of prolonged reflection and pastoral sensitivity—not abstruse theological concepts or an abstract engagement of the text. Mackintosh coaxingly invites readers to place themselves within the stories of the Pentateuch and confront the issues faced by the characters.

TH509 “Prophecy for Today: An Exposition of Major Themes in Prophecy” J. Dwight Pentecost

Credits: 3

This study of biblical prophecy causes you to focus on God Himself, the planner and builder of every age. Biblical prophecy validates Scripture’s authority and reveals God’s purposes so you can live wisely now and anticipate the future with hope.

TH510 “Salvation Crystal Clear”

Dr. Curtis Hutson

Credits: 3

In a climate of differing opinions and personal ideas, Dr. Hutson takes us back to the source of all truth, the Bible. Here is plain talk about an eternal truth, God’s greatest plan and man’s greatest hope — salvation, crystal clear.

TH511 “So Great Salvation”

Dr. Charles Ryrie

Credits: 3

Confusion about the Gospel is a serious problem of tremendous magnitude. It’s not just semantics. It’s the eternal difference between Heaven and Hell. Dr. Ryrie carefully explains what the Bible has to say about salvation, discussing man’s hopeless state before meeting Jesus, God’s grace in saving us, and our call to obedience as we walk with Him. In *So Great Salvation*, Dr. Ryrie also addresses many questions raised by those who hold to the Lordship Salvation position.

TH512 “So Great Salvation”

J. F. Strombeck

Credits: 3

In this book, the author masterfully gathers into a concise volume the salient truths concerning salvation and presents them in the language of the layperson.

TH513 “What Love Is This?”

Dave Hunt

Credits: 5

Many sincere, Bible-believing Christians are Calvinists only by default. Thinking that the only choice is between Calvinism (with its presumed doctrine of eternal security) and Arminianism (with its teaching that salvation can be

lost), and confident of Christ's promise to keep eternally those who believe in Him, they therefore consider themselves to be Calvinists. This volume will enable readers to examine more carefully the vital issues involved and to follow God's Holy Word — not man's teachings.

TH518 "The Rapture Question"

Dr. John Walvoord

Credits: 3

The Rapture Question examines the four views of the church's role in the tribulation: Partial Rapture, Pretribulationism, Midtribulationism, and Post-tribulationism, with the revised edition particularly discussing the current debate between pretribulationism and posttribulationism. In updating his work, the author also added treatments on the Rapture in the Gospels, in 1 Thessalonians 4, in 1 Thessalonians 5, in 2 Thessalonians, in 1 Corinthians, and in Revelation.

TH519 "Commentary on the Book of James"

Dr. James A. Scudder

Credits: 2

Salvation and assurance are not of our own merit or doing, but by God's grace. In his commentary on the book of James, Dr. Scudder tackles an age-old question: Is salvation by grace, or is it by works? Does Paul teach grace, and James teach works? With a thorough examination of the text, you will see that James isn't insinuating that works are required for salvation, it is teaching how we as Christians should live in light of our salvation.

TH520 "Homiletics from the Heart"

John Goetsch

Credits: 3

Homiletics from the Heart is a textbook that addresses the importance of both the message and the messenger. This book will equip every preacher who desires to preach God's Word effectively, every leader who diligently prepares for a Bible lesson, and every Christian who seeks to study and memorize the Word of God.

TH521 "Lectures to My Students"

Charles H. Spurgeon

Credits: 3

Lectures to my Students were talks given to pastors studying in Spurgeon's College and are full of his passion, wit and wisdom. 

Campus Details

Location



Dayspring is nestled in the Northwest Suburbs of Chicago in Mundelein, Illinois. The campus is close enough to enjoy the sites of downtown Chicago, but far enough away to benefit from the serenity of the suburbs.

The beautiful 13 ½ acre campus is surrounded by hundreds of acres of forest preserve with the well-groomed Millennium Trails running through them that offer hiking, biking, cross-country skiing, sledding, and ice skating.

Walmart, Target, Bed Bath and Beyond, and many other well-known shops, restaurants, and grocery stores are all within several miles of the campus. Downtown Chicago, only a 60 minute drive, is known for its great restaurants, shopping, zoos, and museums.

Students staying for the summer can enjoy Six Flags Great America theme park, only 30 minutes from the campus, and Lake Michigan beaches, which are 20–30 minutes away.

Airports

Students wanting to fly home between semesters can choose from three major airports, all within 60 minutes of Dayspring. There is O'Hare International Airport, Midway Airport, and Mitchell International Airport in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Transportation can be provided by Dayspring if it is worked out in advance.

Facilities

Quentin Road Baptist Church



Located just 5 miles from our 13 ½ acre Mundelein campus is our 43 acre campus in Lake Zurich. This is our 80,000 square foot multi-purpose building. Included in this building is a 2,500 seat auditorium in which church services, chapel, and special functions are held. Also located in this building is the music department and practice rooms, Road to Learning Dyslexia department, gymnasium, swimming pool, *Victory In Grace* broadcast studio, cafeteria and large commercial kitchen, and study hall rooms for students.

Dormitory

This is the building which the students living on campus will call "home". There is a Men's wing and a Women's wing, and each wing features a common area with couches, desks, table



and chairs, microwave, and refrigerators. Most students will share a room with one or more other students and sleep on either bunk beds or twin beds. Each student will have their own dresser and closet. Located in each wing are several private bathrooms which will be assigned to students. Also located in this building are the Student Center, The Hair Shoppe, laundry facilities, DBC Café, men and women fitness centers, and practice rooms for those taking instrument lessons.

Academic Building

This building is where students will come to study during their class time and take their tests. There are two lecture rooms, two Learning Centers, a test room, computer lab, library, administrative offices, and a break room.



Cafeteria & Gymnasium



Located in this building is our campus cafeteria for students living in the dorms. A variety of delicious, healthy meals are prepared here all week in a well-equipped commercial kitchen. The lower section of this building has a nice gymnasium where students can shoot baskets or play volleyball.

Field House



The Eagles Home Court, at our Lake Zurich Field House, features a high quality wood floor, rims, and backboards along with modern, state-of-the-art home and away locker rooms. This building also houses our Media & Mail Department where all of our materials are printed and shipped.


Married Housing



Ten efficiency apartments are located in this building, each complete with a bathroom, kitchen, family room and bedroom and are available to married students on a first-come-first-serve basis.


Dayspring Bible College Campus Map
