# A Different Way of Looking at Generosity



When we are generous, it reminds us of who we are and who we were created to be: creatures who are made in God's image, and God is a generous God. <u>Click here to see the video</u>. (Time: 4:15.)

This is Bishop Carlye Hughes from the Episcopal Diocese of Newark, and I want to talk with you today about generosity. If you are an Episcopalian, it is not unusual to hear people talk about generosity in the months of October and November, because we are kneedeep in pledge campaigns in parishes across the diocese – well across the entire United States – this is the time of year that Episcopalians think about what people are going to give, the commitments they make and then vestries turn around and make decisions with the help of treasurers about just what ministries the church will be able to be committed to based on what their membership has made a decision about giving to the church.

I want to talk with you about that generosity but in a completely different way. In part it's what I've heard from other people – some from you some from churches I've served years ago – about what they think in terms of being generous and what had the impact they have felt in their lives. And the one that

### Preparing to Prepare by The Rev. Scott Gunn, Episcopal Priest & Executive Director of Forward Movement



#### Dear friends in Christ,

The All Saints' celebrations are behind us now, and that means it's almost Advent. I don't know about you, but it's hard to believe it's almost that time again. Ironic isn't it? Advent sneaks up us - the season of preparation can leave us unprepared.

I encourage you to take a few moments to think about your own Advent. What will your Advent be like this year? Will you try to find some quiet time every day? What needs to happen in your schedule to make that happen? Will you read a book or a set of devotions? Time to get that book ordered! Will you pray differently, or perhaps serve those in need in a particular way? This all requires just a bit of planning

The scriptures exhort us to keep our lamps trimmed and burning, ready to greet our Savior at a moment's notice. It's a lovely image, but it means we have to get a lamp, trim the wick, and have some oil ready. In other words, we have to prepare to prepare. Now is the time to do that for our Advent season, whether we're thinking of our church or our home.

While Forward Movement has lots of <u>Advent resources</u>, there are plenty of ways to observe Advent without spending any money. And of course, lots of other publishers and organizations offer resources too. My point is not to sell you things, but to encourage you to prepare to prepare.

As for me, I have some extra praying to do. And I'll probably find myself in church a bit more often this season. What will Advent look like for you? Are you ready?

resonates with me to this very day is a 14-year-old boy who was volunteering, serving food at a soup kitchen, and I remember him coming up to me afterwards saying, "I really enjoyed doing this but I don't quite understand why I feel so warm inside every time I do it." And I'll tell you when he said that to me I couldn't help but chuckle with a sense of glee and hopefulness about the future. He so loved feeling warm inside that he wanted to continue volunteering. He couldn't quite name what that is and I want to name it for him and name it for all of us: it is remembering who we are, that we are creatures who are made in God's image and God is a generous God. And when we are generous whether it's with our time or with our finances or with the skills and intelligence and education that we have – when we are generous with God and with God's people, we will indeed feel warm inside and in some way connect it to God in a

way that reminds us of who we are and who we were created to be.

I had another person say to me that one of the things they loved about giving to their church was the sense of joy it gave them every single Sunday when they saw children headed off to Sunday school, when they knew that the young adults were going to meet with someone who would help them deepen their faith, when they saw the choir get up and they could enjoy the singing much more because of what the choir was doing – that all of those things gave them an incredible sense of peace, an incredible sense of gratitude, an incredible sense of joy. For that person too, this sense of being generous connected them to who we are meant to be as people who are created in God's image.

The easiest thing at this time of year is to focus so much on pledging that we think it's all about pledging and all about the budget and not anything else. There is something true about that – it's important to know what our finances are so we can make plans for the coming year. But the most important thing is to remember that we are created by a loving and generous God, and that when we decide to be generous with our church, and when we decide to be generous with God's people, that we are then connected to that loving and generous God, and we are like God when we do those things. So as you give – whether it's to your church in time, whether it's to your church in finances, whether it's to your church in the energy with which you bring – when you make that decision to give, I hope you feel warm inside too.

## **Outreach: Calling All Secret Santas!**

The Giving Tree Offers Opportunities for Generosity this Holiday Season



Look for the Giving Tree in the parish hall this holiday season! It's an opportunity once again to be Secret Santas to some **very special** special needs children in the care of Youth Consultation Services (YCS) in Hackensack, many in group homes.

YCS tells us: "While the holidays are a joyous and happy time for so many of us, they can be extremely difficult for children who are separated from their families. We need YOU – plus your friends, relatives and colleagues – to make the holiday season bright for the children in our care." We are in touch with the YCS Foundation "elves" and they are putting together a list for us. On the Giving Tree will be angels with a child's name and their three gift wishes. So take an angel and grant a wish. YCS asks us to remember the following:

\* You only need to purchase ONE of the gift wishes. (YCS lists three to ease the burden of those hardto-find items.)

\* The YCS children are asked to keep their requests in the \$40 range. Maybe you can ask a friend or family member to chip in and work together to make a holiday wish come true!

\* Most popular gifts are gift cards. They may seem boring but they are actually the most sought-after gift. They give the children the opportunity to shop, to choose and – most importantly – to be independent!

Gifts must be UNWRAPPED. Place the gift in a holiday gift bag with the child's name and program on a tag. Be sure to attach the tag securely. YCS are targeting the week of December 9 for delivery of all gifts to their office, so deadline to deliver to St. Luke's is Sunday December 8. 


