



My dear friends of St. Luke's,

As you read this, it's likely to be perhaps the first week of January. Christmas Day will have been behind us, with all of its joy and laughter, and wonder, and awe – and perhaps some stress, too. Perhaps you "got through" it with less than whatever you expected it to be. Or maybe it was indeed as amazing as you had hoped. Because, after all, it's the day that we celebrate that Jesus became human, just like us, so that we could become divine, just like him. Plus, if it's before January 6, it's still Christmas, which is twelve days and nights, and we should rightly be celebrating every day. (Are your decorations still up?) After all, Jesus didn't stop being God when he was born, and he didn't stop being human when he joined the Father at the right hand of the heavenly throne. And so the mystery of Christmas is really two-fold: God became Human, which is awesome enough, right? But Christmas only really has meaning because of Easter, when God-as-Man completed his work of reconciling us back to God, who never really left us in the first place.

There's an excellent prayer in the Book of Common Prayer, appointed as the Collect for the 2nd Sunday after Christmas. We actually only get to pray it about four years out of eight, because not every Christmastide has a Second Sunday. And I always miss

it when, like this year, we skip it. To me, it encapsulates the Incarnation better than just about anything:

O God, who wonderfully created, and yet more wonderfully restored, the dignity of human nature: Grant that we may share the divine life of him who humbled himself to share our humanity, your Son Jesus Christ; who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Isn't that amazing? Because the truth about Christmas is, that which we pray for has already come to pass. We are *already* brought into the Body of Christ—the *divine* Body of Christ—by virtue of the sacrament of Baptism!

And so although we won't pray it together in our public worship



this year, I encourage you to pray it daily up until January 6, the Feast of the Epiphany.

And that brings up that second mystery of Christmas — it looks forward to the great triumph of Easter. Epiphany is both the end of the Twelve Days of Christmas, and the beginning of the rest of the church year. And there is actually a long tradition in the West regarding Christmas, Epiphany and Easter. It's called the Epiphany Proclamation, and it was originally proclaimed after the Gospel on Epiphany itself. Why? To look forward, of course, to Easter! Christmas is done (or soon will be), and now we turn our attention from the truth of God-as-Human to why God did that in the first place. And I invite you too to

reflect on that as well in the days and weeks of winter coming up.

This year's Epiphany Proclamation is included here on Page 3. I invite you to not only read it, but pray it. It's a traditional part of the liturgy for Epiphany, and we will include it in our worship, too. Perhaps even stick it up on your refrigerator to remind you, even just a little, of what he did on the Twelve Days of Christmas, and what we still look forward to.

May you and yours have a very blessed *Anno Domino* Two Thousand Nineteen!

ear brothers and sisters, the glory of the Lord has shone upon us, and shall ever be manifest among us, until the day of his return.

Through the rhythms of times and seasons let us celebrate the mysteries of salvation.

Let us recall the year's culmination,

the Easter Triduum of the Lord:

his last supper, his crucifixion, his burial, and his rising celebrated between the evening of the Eighteenth day of April and the evening of the Twenty-first day of April.

Each Easter -- as on each Sunday -the Holy Church makes present the great and saving deed by which Christ has for ever conquered sin and death. From Easter are reckoned all the days we keep holy.

Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, will occur on the Sixth day of March.

The Ascension of the Lord will be commemorated on the Thirtieth day of May.

Tentecost, joyful conclusion of the season of Easter, will be celebrated on the Ninth day of June.

And, this year the *First Sunday of Advent* will be on the First day of December.

Likewise the pilgrim Church proclaims the passover of Christ in the feasts of the holy Mother of God, in the feasts of the Apostles and Saints, and in the commemoration of the faithful departed.

To Jesus Christ, who was, who is, and who is to come, Lord of time and history, be endless praise, for ever and ever.

I offer this prayer for you and your families:



In the Third Chapter of John's Gospel, Jesus says at one point, "God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that all who believe in him should not perish but have everlasting life."

For years, I've often thought that that passage only referred to Jesus giving his life as a sacrifice on the cross. And to be sure, that is part of what it means. But some years ago

of these refugees, help all refugees."



Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem because he was a descendent from the House of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged, and who was expecting a child. While

And the glory of the Lord shone round about them, and they were terrified. The angel said unto them, "Do not be afraid, for behold, I am bringing you good news of great joy for all people. To you is born this day, in the City of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign. You will find the child wrapped in bands of cloth, lying in a manger."

And suddenly, there was with the angels a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest, and peace to all people on earth."

Thanks to the generosity of members of St. Luke's, 16 young people in two of Youth Consultation Services' programs received their dream gifts this Christmas. Some of us may have been a little surprised at the requests this year: not for games or the latest hot toy but for "beds in a bag" and fleece pajamas. Bed linens and sleepwear are not for most of us "dream gifts" but when one reads the scope of YCS's programs, many of which are residential, it is easier to understand why they are for some of the children in their care, so we are including here an extract from the YCS website.

Each day YCS provides services to thousands of New Jersey families who have children, birth – adulthood, with special needs. Some of the children at our group homes are separated from their loved ones and have been affected by trauma, others are affected by intellectual and developmental disabilities that adversely affect their behavior. Many families receive the intensive in-home and community support that enables their families to stay together. Whatever the need, the caring YCS staff is prepared to offer individualized educational, mental health and/or behavioral health programming. With your support, we can help every individual find hope, and cultivate strength and resilience for a brighter future.


