PROTECT YOUR HOME 365 DAYS A YEAR

CHERRY SAUCE

- 4 cups pitted and halved Bing Powdered sugar cherries
- 2-1/2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup light corn syrup 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 1 cup water
- (1-3/4 ounce) package powdered fruit pectin

Combine cherries, sugar, corn syrup and lemon juice. Let stand 30 minutes; stir occasionally. Combine water and pectin; bring to boil and boil hard 1 minute. Pour over cherry mixture; stir about 3 minutes. Pour into clean containers; cover with tight-fitting lids. Let stand at room temperature until cool. Freeze. Thaw and serve over ice cream, yogurt or pudding.

CHERRY CREPES

- quart fresh cherries
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/3 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- tablespoon water

For the Crepes:

1 cup Bisquick baking mix

Heat oven to 350°F.

- 1 egg
- 1 cup milk

Wash cherries and remove pits. Place in saucepan with sugar, water and salt. Cover; bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer 5-8 minutes. Blend cornstarch with water: utes or until sauce has thickened

and is clear. Keep warm. For the Crepes: Beat baking mix, egg and milk with rotary beater until smooth.

Spoon 2 tablespoons batter into hot lightly greased 6- or 7-inch skillet. Rotate pan until batter covers bottom. Bake until bubbles appear. Gently loosen edge; turn and bake other side. Makes about 12.

Spoon warm cherry mixture 1/4 cup balsamic vinegar onto crepes and roll or fold. Place crepes seam side down on oven proof platter. Bake about 5 min-

Sprinkle with powdered sugar and serve warm.

FRESH CHERRY SALAD WITH MELON & MINT

- 1/4 honeydew melon, seeds and skin removed, and cut into 1/2-inch cubes
- 1/4 cup minced fresh mint plus sprigs for garnish

2 tablespoons light honey 1-1/2 cups pitted fresh cherries Lemon juice Juice of 2 limes

Put the cantaloupe, honeydew 1/2 cup white sugar melon, and minced fresh mint in a 2 tablespoons cornstarch bowl and turn several times.

Put the honey into a small bowl with the lemon juice and stir until the honey dissolves, a minute or add to cherries and cook 2-3 min- two. Pour this over the melons and turn several times. Add the cherries, turning them in as well. Pour the lime juice over all, garnish with mint sprigs and serve. Serves 6.

CHERRY & RED ONION MARMALADE

1/4 cup chicken stock 8 cups very thinly sliced red onions (about 2 large)

2 cups pitted cherries

Freshly-ground black pepper

Bring stock to a boil in large pot and reduce by half over medium-high heat. Add onions, reduce heat to medium-low and cook, covered, until very soft, about 45 minutes. Uncover and continue to cook, stirring occasionally, another 30 minutes. Add vinegar and cherries and cook until carmelized, 45 minutes to an hour. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Makes 1/2 cup softened butter or

a good accompaniment to grilled meats.

CHERRIES JUBILEE

1/4 cup water

- 1/4 cup orange juice 1 pound Bing cherries, rinsed and pitted
- 1/2 teaspoon finely grated orange zest
- 1/4 teaspoon cherry extract 1/4 cup brandy
- 3 cups vanilla ice cream

Whisk together the sugar and cornstarch in a wide saucepan. Stir in the water and orange juice; bring to a boil over medium-high heat, whisking until thickened. Stir in the cherries and orange zest, return to a boil, then reduce heat, and simmer for 10 minutes. While the cherries are cooking, spoon the ice cream into serving bowls.

Remove the cherries from the heat, and stir in the cherry extract. Pour in the brandy, and ignite with a long lighter. Gently shake the pan until the blue flame has extinguished itself.

Spoon the cherries over the bowls of ice cream. Serves 6.

CHERRY MUFFINS

- margarine
- 1 cup sugar, plus extra 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 egg

- 2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1-1/2 cups fresh cherries, pitted and chopped
- 1 tablespoon lemon zest 1/2 cup chopped pecans

Preheat oven to 375°F. Grease 12-muffin tin or line with muffin

With electric mixer, cream butter with 1 cup sugar together until light and fluffy. Beat in vanilla, then egg. Sift 2 cups flour with baking powder and salt. Stir flour mixture into butter mixture in batches, alternating with milk. Fold in cherries, lemon zest and pecans. Batter will be thick. Spoon into muffin tins, filling each cup half-way. Sprinkle tops with a little sugar. Bake for 25 minutes or until toothpick inserted into center comes out clean. Cool.

NAR Settlement Mandates Changes to the Buyer Agent Compensation Process


ith the National Association of Realtors (NAR) class action lawsuit settlement close to final approval, it appears that implementation of the mandated changes will begin on August 17th, 2024. With this in mind, what is the lawsuit

actually about? To begin, it is important to understand some history. In the early 1990s, consumer advocates began lobbying for more effective buyer representation. Before then, there was no way to guarantee buyers would get their own, dedicated representation and that their agent would be guaranteed compensation. It was

agreed that local Multiple Listing Services (MLS) would not only list all local listings on one site but would also include offers of cooperative compensation from sellers clearly posted on each listing so a buyer's agent would know what their compensation would

paid a commission to the listing brokerage who, out to the buyer's agent. Conagents were "coupled" and paid by the seller. The system worked very well for years.

Recently, however, sellers in Missouri sued NAR, claiming the system kept commissions artificially high and prevented buyers In a class action lawsuit, the jury agreed that going forward, commissions will be decoupled and offers of



agent, if any, will no longer appear on any MLS.



WEEKEND GARDENER

Using Shade

Hot weather is on its way, so when transplanting, space seedlings so that the leaves of the mature plant will shade the soil between plants. This keep the soil cooler and cuts down on evaporation. When transplanting, gently loosen the rootballs of the seedlings before planting them so roots can quickly reach out into surrounding soil to establish

Vegetables

If your vegetable garden space is limited, try growing some varieties in hanging baskets. Bush-type cucumbers, zucchini, cherry tomatoes, and a variety of herbs works

For great yields, feed eggplants, peppers, squash and tomatoes when they blossom.

Everything that's in bloom at your garden center is a good buy this week. Look for annuals, including marigolds, petunias, impatiens (good for color is shady spots) and zinnias in jumbo packs.

For late-summer color from bulbs, plant tuberous begonias, cannas, gladioluses, montbretias and tigridias.

Summer Planting A-to-Z

Finish planting this big round of summer flowers and vegetables. Anything planted after July 4 should be to fill-in and replace the first big burst of annuals and vegetables.

The list of summer flowers is endless, starting the alyssum and ending with zinnias. This is really the last opportunity to plant summer flowering bulbs such as gladioluses, dahlias and lilies. Shrubs, vines, ground covers and herbs can be planted now.

This is the last weekend to plant tomatoes, squash, peppers, eggplant, melons and cucumbers from seedlings. Put in corn and beans from seed. These vegetables need constant hot weather to become prolific producers.

Veggie Feeding Time

For greater yields in the vegetable garden, feed eggplant, peppers, squashes and tomatoes when they bloom. You can hand-pollinate tomatoes by flicking blooms during the driest part of the day. Big plants can be taken care of with one or two shakes while holding onto their cages. The pollen is naturally sticky and this helps to spread it.

Keep adding to mulches throughout the summer to keep roots cool, foil weeds and help to coonserve water. Always water well before adding the mulch or you will insulate dry soil rather than moist. Pile mulch two to six inches deep under shrubs, trees, vines, flower and vegetable beds. Let grass clippings dry out a bit before piling them up or they will clump into a mat that is impervious to water.

Summer is the biggest growing season for houseplants. Feed them on a monthly basis. Some plants can come outdoors for a breather if they're protected from direct sun and wind.





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


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
