



Three Vaccines Seniors Should Consider Getting This Season

here are three different types of vaccines seniors should consider getting this fall to protect against a repeat of last winter's "tripledemic" of respiratory illnesses, which included flu, RSV and coronavirus.

Here's a rundown of the different vaccines the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is recommending and how they are covered by Medicare.

Senior-Specific Flu Shots For people age 65 and older, there are three flu vaccines (you only need one) that the CDC recommends over traditional flu shots.

These FDA-approved vaccines provide extra protection beyond what a standard flu shot does, which is important for older adults who have weaker immune defenses and have a greater risk of developing dangerous flu complications compared with younger, healthy adults. The three senior-specific options include the:

- Fluzone High-Dose Quadrivalent vaccine, which contains four times the amount of antigen as a regular flu shot does, creating a stronger immune response for better protection.
- Fluad Quadrivalent vaccine, which contains an added ingredient called adjuvant MF59 that also helps create a stronger immune response.
- FluBlok Quadrivalent vaccine, is a recombinant protein (egg-free) flu vaccine that contains three times the amount of antigen as compared with a regular flu shot.

There isn't enough evidence yet to indicate whether one of these three vaccines provides superior protection over the other two for seniors.

As for side effects, you should know that the Fluzone High-Dose and Fluad vaccines can cause more of the mild side effects that can occur with standard-dose flu shot, like pain or tenderness where you got the shot, muscle aches, headache or fatigue. While the side effects of Flublok tend to be a little less frequent.

All flu vaccines are covered 100 percent by Medicare Part B as long as your doctor, health clinic or pharmacy agrees not to charge you more than Medicare pays.

New RSV Vaccines

especially if you have any heart or lung conditions, diabetes, kidney or liver disorders that make you vulnerable to the respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) should consider getting one of the new FDA approved RSV vaccines (either Arexvy or Abrysvo).

These vaccines, recommended by the CDC, will help protect older and immunocompromised adults from respiratory illness, which is responsible for 6,000 to 10,000 deaths and at least 60,000 hospitalizations each year in seniors 65 and older.

The new RSV vaccines are covered by Medicare (Part D) prescription drug plans.

Updated Covid Booster If you haven't had a Covid-19 booster shot lately, you should consider getting

one this fall. Even though the Covid public health emergency has ended and the number of cases has gone way down, it has been surging in recent months causing an increase in hospitalizations, especially among the elderly.

The updated Covid vaccine targets the XBB omicron subvariants that are some of the most dominant coronavirus variants circulating in the U.S. It will also provide protection against the EG.5 variant (Eris), which is closely related to the XBB.

Covid booster shots are covered 100 percent by Medicare Part B.

When and Where Most health officials agree that it's safe to receive the flu and Covid booster at the same time. But because the RSV vaccines are new this year, many doctors are recommending a two-week window

between an RSV shot and the

flu and/or the COVID shots.



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

Heated Exchange Result of Miscommunication Editor,

I read in the September 28th issue of San Leandro Times a letter to the editor submitted by Jennie Chang, and noticed the heat in the message regarding a verbal

exchange involving her friend, Vice Mayor Azevedo and Mr. Leo Sheridan.

I attended the 2-hour dinner meeting from beginning to end. The room was full of attendees, and it was a very good meeting with the mayor. Public safety was at the top of the agenda.

As for me, a rather small Asian woman, I am definitely concerned with public safety because I have been a victim of both property and physical crime in the past few years right here in San Leandro.

I think the verbal exchange was triggered by a miscommunication on who was invited to the meeting. I hope this writing can help clarify some of the facts and misunderstanding, so as to "cool the heat."

First of all, this meeting was organized by the Washington Square Neighborhood Watch group. While we held the meeting at the Halcyon Baptist Church, it was not a church event. Mr. Azevedo did not RSVP, probably wasn't informed of the need to do so. That is probably why Mr. Sheridan said Mr. Azevedo came to the meeting uninvited. This is all a miscommunication.

During the meeting, there was a short exchange of words between Mr. Azevedo and Mr. Sheridan, regarding Mr. Azevedo's vote against implementing the new set of 41 public safety cameras. The exchange lasted about a minute.

Please note that Mr. Sheridan's words were directed at Mr. Azevedo. Because Ms. Jennie Chang was sitting right next to Mr. Azevedo, she may have interpreted that Mr. Sheridan's words were also aimed

In my view, Mr. Sheridan did not express any hate nor discrimination against Ms. Chang. He expressed frustration with Mr. Azevedo for his vote against implementing the new set of 41 security

There seems to be a common **Leo Sheridan** here. We all seem to agree that San Leandro public safety is a major concern for all of us.

Garfield Traffic Issue Needs Fixing

Editor,

I'm a parent at Garfield Elementary School. School traffic has been a major issue for years. Garfield has the narrowest street of all SLUSD schools at 28 feet from sidewalk to sidewalk. When cars are waiting to pick up their children on both sides of the road that leaves 12 feet for two cars to squeeze through. A nightmare for parents and larger vehicles.

In July I brought attention to the issues on Nextdoor, the need for a crosswalk and the possibility of adjusting the bus routes. Trustee Leo Sheridan agreed that a crosswalk would be useful but then went on to downplay the other issues of traffic safety in several now deleted comments. I asked him if he had ever been there to observe the traffic issues. Leo said he had then blamed the parents rather than the unsafe infrastructure for the issues.
