Jamboree-on-the-Air

Jamboree-on-the-Air, or JOTA, is the largest Scouting event in the world. It is held annually the third full weekend in October. JOTA uses amateur radio to link Scouts and hams around the world, around the nation, and in your own community. This jamboree requires no travel, other than to a nearby amateur radio operator's ham shack. Many times you can find the hams will come to you by setting up a station at your Scout camporee, at the park down the block, or perhaps at a ham shack already set up at your council's camp.

Tell Me More

Scouts of any age can participate, from Cub Scouts to Boy Scouts and Venturers, including girls.

Once at the ham radio station, the communication typically involves talking on a microphone and listening on the station speakers. However, many forms of specialized communication may also be taking place, such as video communication, digital communication (much like sending a message on your smartphone but transmitted by radio), or communication through a satellite relay or an earth-based relay (called a repeater). The exchanges include such information as name, location (called QTH in ham speak), Scout rank, age, and hobbies. The stations you'll be communicating with can be across town, across the country, or even around the world! The World Scout Bureau reported that the 2017 JOTA-JOTI had over 1.5 million Scout participants from more than 160 countries.

When Is It?

Jamboree-on-the-Air is held the third weekend in October. There are no official hours, so you have the whole weekend to make JOTA contacts. The event officially starts Friday evening during the JOTA Jump Start and runs through Sunday evening.



How Can I Participate as a Scout?

Contact your local Scout council and see what may already be planned in your area. You can also contact a local ham radio operator or a local amateur radio club. You can find a searchable database of clubs at www.arrl.org/find-a-club. This website is operated by the American Radio Relay League, the national association for amateur radio, which is cooperating closely with the BSA on JOTA and many other activities. Your local club may be able to direct you to its planned JOTA activities. These can include ham stations set up at camporees or other events. Or, if there are no planned activities, you can either work with them to get something set up or arrange to visit a local radio operator's ham shack at a scheduled time to participate in JOTA.

Contact your local Scout council and see what may already be planned in your area and how you can help. You can find your council using the Council locator.

If nothing is currently planned, or if current plans aren't reaching your area, you can work with the council or a local unit (pack, troop, crew) to set up a JOTA station or arrange for visits to your ham shack. You can also participate just by making QSOs with the many JOTA stations that will be on the air. A good resource to find a local Scout unit is the Be-A-Scout website at .

If you are you a Ham and a Scout, I have a question for you. Have you integrated Ham Radio into all of your Scouting events?

If you haven't, why not? If you have, I want to hear from you and what you are doing.

Ham radio is all about fun, safety, and learning new things, just like Scouting. You may have even gotten into Ham Radio or learned Morse Code through Scouting. As a Ham you have technical expertise in many fields that can help your Troops explore new Merit Badges with a Ham Radio twist, this is Radio Scouting.



Imagine this scenario; As you are gathering for your weekend hiking and camping trip, you hear several of your Scouts on the local repeater reporting that they are on the way to the rendezvous point and telling others, with excitement, about their upcoming weekend. As they arrive you can hear several of them telling their parents to listen on the linked repeater for a check-in at 2100 tonight and another says they will try to get a health and welfare message out at 2030. Everyone loads up in the cars but not before coordinating a simplex frequency for the convoy. On the highway one of the Scouts with his General ticket makes a few HF contacts on the Scoutmasters mobile HF rig. In one of the other cars, some of the designated APRS Scouts are trying out a miniature TNC to report the convoys' location by APRS. Another Scout checks his smart phone and confirms they are tracking on APRS via the Internet. Along the way several repeaters are

checked into and the weather forecast checked and weather alerts are turned on in their HTs.

At the trail head, the Scouts divide into two Patrols and confirm the primary repeater coverage and a backup secondary simplex channel and confirm the check-in schedule, of course with 2 deep leadership. At the last Troop meeting they had preprogrammed their HTs and planned activities, reviewed Long Tone Zero (LiTZ) procedures, the Wilderness Protocol, and RF exposure limits. As they hike, they chit chat on simplex and checked-in with the other Patrol. Along the way the Patrols stopped at a few high spots for some hill topping contacts, with great success.



As the Patrols arrived at their campsite, they divided up the tasks and put the tents up and got squared away. Of course they put up a twin lead VHF/UHF antenna they had learned how to build at the last JOTA. They also placed a homemade 20 M dipole in a couple of trees to try some CW and phone on their QRP rig. They had set up a schedule on a Radio Scouting blog with some Troops across the country to QSL with. Two Scouts are sent to get water from the spring 1/2 mile down a side trail and report back a good water source and that they are returning via their HTs. They make some great contacts on 20 M after dark and can't wait for tomorrow. Several Scouts sitting around the campfire talking about what it would take to do a moon bounce on the next campout as they can practically reach out and touch the full moon.



The next morning the Scouts are buzzing about the longest contact they made last night, over 5,062 miles on 10 watts wire to wire, can't do that with a cell phone. As they

reach the midpoint of the hike, they arrive at a clearing and break out their satellite Yagis and get set up for their Fun Cube Satellite pass and later in the afternoon, hopefully, the ISS (International Space Station) contact.

As the Scouts return home many are thinking about the upcoming QRP rig building class and the tour of the County Emergency Operations Center. Some are working on their Arduino and Raspberry Pi projects as part of their Programming and Robotics Merit Badges. They have discovered there are so many Merit Badges and Scout activities that have a connection to Amateur Radio, that it is hard to believe.



This may sound like a pipe dream but this could be a typical outing for your Scouts combining Scouting and Amateur Radio. Exploring all the Merit Badges that will be easier to complete with their new knowledge. Planning a high adventure canoeing trek for the fall with their radio gear with them. In fact they can plan every activity with Amateur Radio as an integral part of the event. Scouting leaders and parents will feel they run a safer and richer program for their Scouts. They also will know that they are building lifelong skills that will be used in future jobs and in service to their communities.

I can think of at least 14 Merit Badges that can be directly related to Amateur Radio (Aviation, Digital Technology, Electricity, Electronics, Emergency Preparedness, Energy, Engineering, Geocaching, Radio, Robotics, Search and Rescue, Signs, Signals and Codes, Space Exploration. Weather) and an additional 13 indirectly related (Astronomy, Backpacking, Climbing, Camping, Fire Safety, Kayaking, Lifesaving, Motorboating, Photography, Safety, Small-Boat Sailing, Whitewater, Wilderness Survival).

I believe our Scouts today represent our leaders of tomorrow. They will be our innovators, experimenters, entrepreneurs and explorers. Through



Radio Scouting we can help them develop the skills they need to meet the challenges of tomorrow. With greater exposure to Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) their opportunities of success will be increased.

Today we all use radio technology in our cell phones, Bluetooth headsets, WiFi, and high-resolution pictures from Pluto 3 billion miles away by radio.

We as Amateurs are using some of the most basic and sophisticated equipment on the market. We build our own antennas, use digital signal processing, build satellites and have one of the largest frequency spectrums allocated to us for emergency support and experimentation. We have had a vital function providing communications at every national disaster this country has ever had.



With the availability of inexpensive dual band HTs, no code testing, and online practice testing websites, there are few hurdles to keep your Scouts from earning their licenses.

So join me in sharing your skills, knowledge and expertise and mentor our Scouts by starting or expanding the role of Amateur Radio in your Troop and Council. I challenge you to take on this important job and I guarantee you won't be disappointed and will have fun along the way.

I hope to hear about all your great successes and how you are making Radio Scouting part your next Scout activity.

Boy Scouts Include Amateur Radio in Spring Camporee

The Riverside District in South Brevard County, Florida, recently incorporated amateur radio as a part of its camporee. The event was attended by 100 Boy Scouts from eight different troops. At these events scouts compete in various skills like map and compass, fire building, cooking, etc. This year Troop 314 from West Melbourne, the host troop, decided to include Amateur Radio as one of the events.

As a part of the camporee competition, scouts compete in patrols normally consisting of about five members. At the amateur radio event, scouts received points for listening to an overview of Amateur Radio and actually talking on the air. Jan Heise, K4QD, organized the event with the help of his grandson Aaron Ludwig, KJ4UQS, and members of the Platinum Coast Amateur Radio Society (PCARS). Both Jan and Aaron are members of T-314. Jan obtained special event station callsign K4R (for Riverside District). They set up an HF station capable of contacting amateurs (often called HAMS) around the world, and a VHF station used for local area contacts.

PCARS members John Gerstner, K4LRP, and Marty Grove, KJ4LQX, came to the camporee and performed most of the HF operating while Aaron did the majority of the VHF operating and provided the Amateur Radio overview. As a special treat, Chuck Green, AD4ES, flew his four passenger plane overhead while Eric Smitt, K9ES, operated both HF and VHF talking to scouts at the special event station.

Scouts at the camporee were very interested in the Amateur Radio station, and almost all of them wanted to talk on the radio. The group used primarily 20 meters on HF, and on VHF they used the PCARS 146.85 wide area repeater. It was great to hear scouts say, "Wow, I just talked to Germany." or "Hey, that guy is in Canada." Everyone agreed that the special event station was a success.



Thinking Day” Activity Gets Girl Scouts Thinking About Ham Radio

When Girl Scout leader Jill Galus, KB1SWV, was planning a “Thinking Day” activity last fall, she learned about Thinking Day On The Air (TDOTA). The World Association of Girl Scouts and Girl Guides designates February 22 as Thinking Day — to commemorate the birth of both Scouting founder Lord Robert Baden-Powell and his wife Olave, the first Chief Guide. On Thinking Day Girl Scouts and Guides to reflect upon the international nature of their movement. Akin to the Boy Scouts Jamboree On The Air (JOTA), Thinking Day on the Air is a global activity aimed at encouraging Girl Scouts and Guides to make friends via Amateur Radio. Both events were conceived by Les Mitchell, G3BHK (SK). Galus asked her dad, Skip Youngberg, K1NKR, if he and the Nashoba Valley Amateur Radio Club he belongs to would be willing to support a TDOTA station this year for her troop in Raymond, New Hampshire.

The Nashoba Valley Amateur Radio Club (NVARC) supported Galus — “and had a lot of fun doing it,” Youngberg told ARRL. The club agreed to let the girls use the club’s N1NC call sign and its tower trailer, while Youngberg offered equipment.

“By the time Thinking Day arrived on February 21, five local other troops had joined hers for the event,” Youngberg said. “[S]he soon found that she had the tiger by the tail.”

Stan Pozerski, KD1LE; Ralph Swick, KD1SM; Greg Cote, KB1WAQ, and his daughter Sarah, also a Girl Scout, and Youngberg traveled to New Hampshire and set up at a Masonic lodge. In addition to radios for HF and VHF, the NVARC team set up code practice oscillators for the girls to try. Eighty girls had signed up, split between morning and afternoon sessions, but because bad weather was forecast for later that day, all but 13 of them arrived in the morning.

“Needless to say, there was a lot of ‘audio QRM,’” Youngberg said. “Nevertheless, every activity succeeded in capturing the girls’ interest.”

The ham radio mentors demonstrated Morse code and taught the youngsters how to send their names on the code practice oscillators. Galus had maps and a globe on hand to teach world time concepts as well as a craft table to string beads to spell “GS” in Morse code, as a keepsake.

The girls did not succeed in making contact with other Girl Scouts or Girl Guide groups, but the hams were able to demonstrate how to get on the air, both on HF and VHF. Afterward, Youngberg and his daughter sent QSL cards to the stations they’d worked. “When the replies come back,” he said, “those budding scientists and potential new hobbyists will be reminded of a great experience and will have another thing to be excited about.”

What is JOTA?

When Scouts want to meet young people from another country, they usually think of attending a World Jamboree. But few people realize that each year more than a million Scouts and Guides "get together" over the airwaves for the annual Jamboree-on-the-Air (JOTA). During the 2014 event, worldwide Scouting participation included 1.1 million Boy Scouts and 200,000 Girl Guides/Girl Scouts, for a total participation of over 1.3 million--the largest Scouting event in the world.

Modern technology offers Scouts the exciting opportunity to make friends in other countries without leaving home. JOTA is an annual event in which Boy and Girl Scouts and Guides from all over the world speak to each other by means of Amateur (ham) Radio. Scouting experiences are exchanged and ideas are shared via radio waves. Since 1958 when the first Jamboree-on-the-Air was held, millions of Scouts have met each other through this event. Many contacts made during JOTA have resulted in pen pals and links between Scout troops that have lasted many years. With no restrictions on age or on the number of participants, and at little or no expense, JOTA allows Scouts to contact each other by ham radio. The radio stations are operated by licensed amateur radio operators. Many Scouts and leaders hold licenses and have their own stations, but the majority participate in JOTA through stations operated by local radio clubs and individual radio amateurs. Some operators use television or computer-linked communications.
