

From Our Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

Someone said there is traffic going to heaven. Why? Because the way to heaven is a narrow and winding stairway. On the other hand, there is no traffic going to hell. Why? Because the way to hell is an expressway, wide and open for so many.

Today is Palm Sunday, the beginning of Holy Week. This week let us take time to step back, look into our hearts and reflect on the lives we are living and where we are heading. In today's Gospel (Lk. 19, 28-40), we hear of Jesus' final entry to Jerusalem. It was a triumphant entry, that first Palm Sunday that led to His passion and death on Good Friday, and eventually ended victorious on Easter Sunday.

We, too, are in a journey, and there are three questions we might want to ask ourselves this Holy Week. The first is: "Am I living a good life?" This question is not so much about living a successful or a comfortable life as about living a meaningful and an involved life. Is the life I am living now going to bring me to heaven someday?

The second question we might want to ask this Holy Week is: "Am I afraid of suffering and death?" Naturally, we don't want to suffer, and we want to live long and "enjoy" life as long as we can. Is the life I am living all about being comfortable and pain-free? There will always be trials and even failures in life, and there is no complete happiness, or perfect relationships, in this life. May we find God in our sufferings, and may we find God in death itself.

The third question: "Do I believe in heaven?" Am I living my life as if there were no tomorrow and life after death? Am I enjoying as much as I can now, with no thought about my soul, or concern about the rights and welfare of other people? Our belief that there is heaven should lead us to live beautiful and meaningful lives.

Holy Week is a good time for us to listen, really listen, to God. Vocal prayer, practices, and devotions are fine, but more than these, let us allow the Lord to speak to us, and question us. Our observance of Holy Week take on a deeper meaning if, and only if, we have a real relationship with God. Otherwise, it is all just tradition, obligation, and show.

Take time to do some "housecleaning" this Holy Week starting with our own hearts. A good confession is a good start. Next, clean up relationships that need it. Reach out in humility and revive relationships that have died. Finally, do some sorting and give away what you don't need in your rooms, and in your homes, and share them joyfully and generously.

Let me end with this story: "In a street accident, a woman was trying to help the victim but suddenly, a nurse came and said, 'Miss, excuse me! Please step back! I'm a nurse. I've had a course in first aid and I'm trained in giving CPR.'" The woman stepped aside and watched the procedure, and said, "If you need a doctor ... I'm just at your back."

This Holy Week, let us step back. Let the Lord take over, and lead us on.

This week, we enter into the holiest of weeks within our liturgical year. Below are some answers to common questions regarding the Paschal Triduum.

When does the Triduum begin and end?

The Easter Triduum begins with the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, reaches its high point in the Easter Vigil, and closes with Evening Prayer on Easter Sunday.

How are the Holy Oils, consecrated and blessed at the Chrism Mass, to be received in the parish?

A reception of the oils may take place before the Mass of the Lord's Supper. The oils, in suitable vessels, can be carried in procession by members of the assembly.

Is the *Mandatum*, the washing of feet at the Mass of the Lord's Supper, required?

No. The *Roman Missal* only indicates, "After the Homily, where a pastoral reason suggests it [*ubi ratio pastoralis id suadeat*], the Washing of Feet follows."

When should the Good Friday Celebration of the Lord's Passion take place?

Normally it should take place in the afternoon, at about 3:00 PM, to enable people to assemble more easily. However, pastoral discretion may indicate a time shortly after midday, or in the late evening, though never later than 9:00 PM. Depending on the size or nature of a parish or other community, the local Ordinary may permit the service to be repeated.

Where is the paschal candle placed during Easter Time?

The paschal candle has its proper place either by the ambo or by the altar and should be lit at least in all the more solemn liturgical celebrations of the season until Pentecost Sunday, whether at Mass, or at Morning and Evening Prayer. After Easter Time the candle should be kept with honor in the baptistery, so that in the celebration of Baptism the candles of the baptized may be lit from it. In the celebration of funerals the paschal candle should be placed near the coffin to indicate Christ's undying presence, his victory over sin and death, and the promise of sharing in Christ's victory by virtue of being part of the Body of Christ (see *Order of Christian Funerals*, no. 35). The paschal candle should not otherwise be lit nor placed in the sanctuary outside Easter Time.


