#### As We Head Into FALL...

This summer GBB has provided several exciting opportunities and we hope to continue to gather in person and on Zoom so you can participate in the future.

Leading us off in early summer was the willow workshops with Margaret Mathewson in Karen Olson's spacious garden. You saw the pictures in the previous newsletter. Although it was hot, those that attended had a fruitful and creative learning experience--lots of laughter and comradely.

Thanks to Sue Ann Monteleone for arranging for a full day of museum hopping in Carson City. We started the trip by visiting the Stewart Indian School Cultural Center & Museum in the morning and the Marjorie Russell Clothing and Textile Research Center in the afternoon.

We learned about the Stewart school, it's tragic history for indigenous children and the building of life-long friendships. The school campus contains the many stone buildings that the students build as part of their education. The native stone was gathered from the area by the students. The historical museum display has been organized by the local native tribe. The feature in the Artist Gallery was bead work from Great Basin artists that included baskets, wall hanging and garments. All were beautiful and unusual in design. We enjoyed our bag lunches at Stewart while Karen Olson showed photos of willow patches she took on a trip to Oregon with Sue Ann. You will see these at future meetings.

At the clothing and textile center, Jan Loverin gave a short history of the research center and its collection of historical fashion garments as well as quilt, flags & other textile items. All items have been researched and catalogued by date from eighteenth century to the present. Jan showed us some special garments--dresses, hats, shoes, and a "Cootie" uniform worn by military veterans.

Class limit - 12

Description – We will create an attractive insulating cover for a mason jar or water bottle. Beginners can do a basic plain twined cover, and more advanced can try their hand at different weaves for textural effect.

Tools needed – <u>Mason jar or water bottle of your choice</u>. Medium pruners, scissors or rose pruners, blunt awl (bone or wood is easier on the tule), spray bottle, hand towel, large towel.

Optional - small soaking pan, long wallpaper tray (the materials will be soaked and a tub and hose will be available.

Bring a small work table and your favorite folding chair.

Also bring – Masks (we should be okay outside, but if we go in or get close...) Lunch, drinks, hat, sunscreen

\*\*\* If you bring your own tule you will need:

12 spokes 3/8 to  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch thick and 24 inches long 4 spokes 3/8 to  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch thick and 12 inches long At least 20 weavers  $\frac{1}{4}$  to 3/8 thick

Soak the tule a few hours or overnight until pliable, wrap in a towel or sheet.



### November 3, 2021 #1 Apple in the Pine (Material fee—\$85)

Level: Intermediate / Advanced (8 hours)

The base begins with a vintage spigot handle, threaded with Cedar bark. Twine the base with waxed cotton cord and iris leaves to upright. Using thinner Cedar and wider Willow bark learn the fun and challenging Japanese knot weave. A basic braid track border completes the piece. (4" x 4")





#### November 4, 2021 #2 Fluted Constellation (Material fee—\$75)


Level: Intermediate / Advanced (8 hours)

Beginning with a unique threaded base of Willow and Cedar barks; weave this sweet and functional basket with an interesting twist. The fluted sides and rim are resultant of a weave change to the basket. The braided Cedar rim enhances the overall flow. (6" x 6" x 2")

#### November 5, 2021 #3 Double Helix (Material fee—\$85)

Level: Intermediate (8 hours)

Students will heat fold and stitch a hexagonal Birch bowl with split Spruce roots. Next a spiraling liner of hexagonal to bias woven Willow or Cedar bark (or a combination) will be added. The braided rim of Cedar bark was taught to me by Dawn Walden. (6" x 3")





#### November 6, 2021 #4 Barks on the Bias (Material fee-\$100)


Level: Intermediate (6 hours)

Students will learn to weave this non-traditional basket with thin Birch bark. Overlays of Poplar and Hemlock barks will be added for color and textural notes. The faux braided rim was taught to me by master basketmaker Dawn Walden and is executed with Cedar bark. A hanger handle is sewn and installed with fine brass washers to secure the stitching. (7" x 6" x 5")

## PRUNING METHODS FOR WILLOW

Pollarding versus Coppicing





Pollarding is done on top of a straight trunk (height depends on pruner's preference.)

Both methods are considered hard pruning in order to get the plant to produce an abundance of young shoots for harvesting.

Six members went to Sierra Valley to cut tule and brought back beautiful tule some of which we used to make little tule baskets during our meeting. Karen and Bonnie also went a week later and gathered more tule. The area is open to the public for cutting and is not sprayed. Contact Karen for directions if you need tule.

Reno open Studio is August 20-22. Brochures are available. Silver State Art Festival is Sept. 10-12. Some members from GBB will be doing some demonstrations outside. There are still a few spaces available for Karen Tembreull's classes in November. Sign up soon. Betty visited the new art gallery at 200 S. Virginia in the Chase Bank building. She stated it was nicely set up and recommended visiting it.

Sue Ann has coordinated a tour of the Stewart Indian Museum and Cultural Center in Carson for August 18. This will be in conjunction with a tour of the Marjorie Russell Textile center. Carpooling will be encouraged from Reno meeting at the south Winco parking lot at 9:30. Tour to begin at 10:30 followed by lunch under the trees and then 1:30 for tour of the textile museum.

Sue Ann will be offering a tule workshop in September. This will be weaving over a mason jar. Date and location yet to be announced.
