In the first chapter of John's Gospel, sometimes referred to as the prologue to the Gospel, sometimes spoken of as the whole Gospel in miniature the Gospel writer says this. As he reflects on the coming of God into the world in the person of Jesus. As he reflects on Christmas. He says, the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it.

I don't think it's an accident that long

ago, followers of Jesus began to commemorate his coming into the world when the world seemed to be at Its darkest.

It's probably not an accident that we observe Christmas soon after December 21, the winter solstice. The winter solstice being in the Northern Hemisphere the darkest time of the year.

Undoubtedly, these ancient Christians who began to celebrate the coming of God into the world, they knew very well that this Jesus, his teachings, his message, his spirit, his example, his life points us to the way of life itself, a way of life, where we take care of each other. A way of life, where we care for God's world. A way of life, where we are in a loving relationship with our God, and with each other as children of the one God, who has created us all.

They also knew John's Gospel and John's Christmas story. Now there are no angels in John's Christmas story. There are no wise men coming from afar. There's no baby lying in a manger. There's no angel choir singing *Gloria in excelsis Deo* in the highest of the heavens. There are no shepherds tending their flocks by night. Matthew and Luke tell those stories. In John, it is the poetry of new possibility, born of the reality of God when God breaks into the world. It's not an accident that long ago, followers of Jesus began to commemorate his birth, his coming into the world. When the world seemed darkest. When hope seemed to be dashed on the altar of reality. It is not an accident that we too, commemorate his coming, when things do not always look right in this world.

But there is a God. And there is Jesus. And even in the darkest night. That light once shined and will shine still. His way of love is the way of life. It is the light of the world. And the light of that love shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not, cannot, and will not overcome it.

God love you. God bless you and may you have a Merry Christmas and may this world be blessed. Amen.

St. Luke's Annual Parish Meeting on Sunday, January 26 What YOU Need to Know — and DO

Following our 10:00 A.M. service on Sun., Jan. 26, St. Luke's will hold its Annual Parish Meeting and Potluck Luncheon. There will be a sign-up sheet in the Parish Hall so that we know what people plan to bring.

As is our custom, we need to elect two members of the Parish to replace outgoing vestrypersons Helen Shaw and Roberta Nobleman. The slate will also include those standing as delegates and alternates to the 2021 Diocesan Convention and representatives for the District 9 Council of 10 churches in our area. We will review reports from the various organizations that keep our parish running and vibrant; receive the Treasurer's report; and approve (or disapprove) recommendations on the annual budget for the parish. Parishioners are invited to actively participate and ask questions about anything that is presented.

Given the number of parishes now without permanent clergy right in our own area, it is extremely difficult for our wardens to find supply coverage for each of our Sunday worship services. Without a priest in charge, our lay leadership is more important than ever.

WHAT BP. CARLYE HAS SAID ABOUT VESTRIES (Vlog-Oct. 2019)

I want to talk with you about Vestries. And most importantly about their special role as elders of a congregation.

It's funny, I don't hear people refer to Vestries as elders - we tend to lean on them for those practical ways of being church together. The Vestry makes sure that the roof is solid and not leaking. The Vestry makes sure that we have rooms for all the classes that we're trying to teach on a Sunday morning. And if we're running short on people to serve as ushers or people to be on Altar Guild or to serve on Buildings & Grounds, we turn to the Vestry and we ask them for help with all of those things. All of that is stated in the duties of people who are on Vestry,

The unstated thing is that they are the elders of our church. They are the wise people. They are baptized, they are confirmed, they have spent time in the church. They know how the church works - and even more importantly, they know how God works. And that's the piece that I want us all to hold onto with Vestries.

In the letter from James to the church, James writes to churches that if there's someone who's suffering, we should pray. If there's someone who is full of good cheer, then we should celebrate with that person. And, if there are those in the church who are sick, we should turn to the elders of the church and ask the elders of the church to pray for them.

Every Sunday, I have the blessing of meeting with Vestries. And the first

thing that we talk about is their spiritual lives. We actually don't talk first about the needs of the church and the practical matters of being Vestry - we talk about their individual spiritual lives. I find it to be the most inspiring part of the day, the most inspiring part of the week for me, week in and week out. Hearing Vestry members talk about the way that they see God in their church, the way they see God in their lives, and the way they see God in the world.

I'm convinced in this time that we're in, whether we are sick in body or sick in spirit, that we can turn to our Vestries not only for help in running the church, but that we can turn to our Vestries for help with our own spiritual life.

If you need some inspiration, talk to a member of your Vestry. If you need someone to pray, talk to a member of your Vestry. If you're feeling that there's not enough hope in the world, talk to a member of your Vestry. Because these are people who are committed not only to running a church, but who are deeply committed to God.

There's one person in all of these meetings who has stayed with me when they talked about the way that they see God. And I remember him so clearly saying, "One of the things that has helped me so much in coming to church is I've become a better husband, I am a better father, I'm a better man for the people of faith that I walk in faith with."

That's who serves us in Vestry. We have much to learn from them.

Outreach: Thanks, Secret Santas!



Last month *New Visions* included Bishop Carlye Hughes' reflection on Generosity, telling of a young boy who didn't know why he felt "so warm inside" after serving in a soup kitchen.

Well, members of St. Luke's must have felt that inner warmth this Christmas when they gave so generously to the children in the care of Youth Consultation Services, to our food insecure neighbors helped by Center for Food Action, to Father Paul's Toy Drive for inner city children and to our animal friends in need supported by Animal Aid USA.

We looked for the angels on our Giving Tree and continued St. Luke's Christmas tradition of being Secret Santas to YCS's children. These children don't know our names and all we know of them are their first names, the first initial of their last names, their age and gender, but we know they are in need, many of them separated from family, and we give them our unconditional love by fulfilling their requests.

This year the requests came from adolescents who asked for hats and scarves, pjs and slippers, sweat pants and hoodies, art supplies, a bean bag chair, and, a very popular item, gift cards, which enable a child to exercise a little control over their troubled lives. With little time, but understanding the urgency, we responded.

A big "thank you" to all who contributed in any way to our Christmas drives, and a big "thank you" to those who help throughout the year with the food drives, the Walk-In Dinners and our weekend Snack Packs program, whether by purchasing, packing, transporting, cooking or serving. You are *all* serving and know that warm feeling inside.


