Where a child or staff is showing any symptoms	Staff room has been converted into a medical room - child will be taken to the room immediately to separate from the group - temperature will be recorded and parent will be contacted for immediate collection. If the child continues to have symptoms then the child and family must isolate in line with the current medical procedures in place. 	Adults will be covered to leave the setting and isolate straight away and will follow isolation protocols	
	If a child is awaiting collection, they should be moved, if possible, to a room where they can be isolated behind a closed door, depending on the age of the child and with appropriate adult supervision if required. Ideally, a window should be opened for ventilation. If it is not possible to isolate them, move them to an area which is at least 2 metres away from other people.	
	If they need to go to the bathroom while waiting to be collected, they should use a separate bathroom if possible. The bathroom should be cleaned and disinfected using standard cleaning	

	products before being used by anyone else. PPE should be worn by staff caring for the child while they await collection if a distance of 2 meters cannot be maintained (such as for a very young child or a child with complex needs)	
What happens if there is a confirmed case of coronavirus in a setting?	When a child or staff member develops symptoms compatible with coronavirus, they should be sent home and advised to self-isolate for 7 days. Their fellow household members should self-isolate for 14 days. All staff and children who are the setting will have access to a test if they display symptoms of coronavirus, and are encouraged to get tested in this scenario. Where the child or staff member tests negative, they can return to the setting and the fellow household members can end their self-isolation. Where the child, young person or staff member tests positive, the rest of their class or group within their childcare or education setting should be sent home and advised to self-isolate for 14 days. The other household members of that wider class or group do not need to self-isolate unless the child, young person or staff member they live with in that group subsequently develops symptoms. As part of the national test and trace programme, if other cases are detected within the cohort or in the wider setting, Public Health England's local health protection teams will conduct a rapid investigation and will advise schools and other settings on the most appropriate action to take. In some cases a larger number of other children, young people may be asked to self-isolate at home as a precautionary measure – perhaps the whole class, site or year group. Where settings are observing guidance on infection prevention and control, which will reduce risk of transmission, closure of the whole setting will not generally be necessary	Following current Government instructions and advice for best practice
