





Q: I have a Living Trust, prepared some time ago. I recently heard that it was a good idea to also have a Will. However, I thought the Trust took the place of a Will. Can you clarify this?

A: Sure. Attorneys who prepare trusts generally also prepare a backup Will to coordinate with the Trust. The companion Will is designed to "catch" assets that were inadvertently left out of the Trust. The Will then typically directs that these omitted assets be "poured back" into the Trust and be distributed according to the terms of the Trust. Attorneys often refer to these wills as "Pour Over" Wills, which accurately describes their purpose.

Ideally, you would never need to use the "Pour Over" Will, because all assets would be part of your trust. However, in the real world, we find that clients often neglect to take proper steps to retitle assets into their Trust. Remember, in order to transfer assets into your Trust, you generally have to sign a formal document, such as a deed in the case of real property, which formally re-titles assets into the name of the trustee of the Trust. By the way, in most cases the trustee is the same person who created the trust (the trustor), but the trustor must still observe the formality of re-taking title in his own name "as

The assets omitted from the trust and "captured" by the Pour-Over Will may still

have to go through probate. However, the advantage of having a Pour-Over Will is that the omitted assets will ultimately go to your designated Trust beneficiaries as part of a coordinated plan. Without the Pour-Over Will, the omitted assets would be distributed to your heirs-atlaw as identified by statute, which could be different persons from those beneficiaries named in your Trust.

A related topic arises where a trustor has clearly listed assets on a schedule attached to his Trust, but neglects to formally retitle the assets into his name "as trustee". This happens fairly frequently. In this situation, the trustor clearly intended to put the described assets into the Trust, but for whatever reason failed to take formal steps to do so. Here, the law provides a quicker remedy, which attorneys often refer to as a "Heggstad Petition", so named because of the 1993 court decision which

approved this remedy. Thus, where the trustor's intent to include an asset in his Trust is clear, it is then possible to petition the court for an order immediately transferring the assets into the Trust, so that they are not subject to a full probate and the possibility that they may go to unintended individuals.

For the above reasons, we always recommend that a trust contain a detailed Schedule of Assets, that upon creation of the trust the client take immediate steps to retitle those assets into the trust, and that the trust be accompanied by a companion "Pour-Over Will". Caution: some assets, such as retirement accounts, should never be re-titled into the name of the trust, as that could trigger an adverse tax

Be Safe After You Move In

Transition of Seasons


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Out of Control Wisteria

I have a wisteria climbing up the front of my porch. By the fall, it's always out of control. Can I trim it back now without jeopardizing next spring's blooms? Also, how

might I help increase the flowers, as it doesn't tend to put out an abundance of blossoms?

There is a reluctance of gardeners to prune plants, especially vines, fruit trees, and roses, once the primary pruning season is completed.

When quizzed why not, the most common answers are "It may die" or it will stop blooming.

The reality is plants never die from such pruning practices; however, flowering issues may develop related to off-season pruning. These issues are easily overcome with some basic plant knowledge about the plants in question.

Wisteria vines are traditionally pruned the heaviest in the spring after flowering. This is the time to establish or re-establish the basic shape of the plant.

During the growing season, it's okay to prune off any of the

shoots that are growing in the wrong direction. Wisteria blooms on the second year and older growth.

You improve flowering by lowering the soil pH. The pH scale is from 1 to 14, with seven being neutral. Any soil reading above 8.0 is said to be alkaline, while soils below 7.0 are said to be acidic. Wisterias like a soil pH around 6.0 to 6.5. You determine your soil pH with a simple pH kit available at your favorite garden

center.

The soil pH is modified or lowered by applying an acidifier such as Soil Sulphur, Aluminum Sulfate, or GreenAll pH Adjuster. The pH test determines the amount. With the beginning of the rainy season, now is an excellent time to apply these products to your soil. Besides wisterias, an acidifier is particularly beneficial to blueberries, azaleas, camellias, rhododendrons, gardenias, and other shade-loving plants.



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



Disciplinary Actions Brought Against Two Council Members

cilmembers Fred Simon and Victor Aguilar are facing internal disciplinary action resulting from their actions prior to the firing of former San Leandro Police Chief Abdul the City Council held two Pridgen, according to a report closed-session meetings. Sireleased Wednesday afternoon mon and Aguilar were recused by the City Council.

Former City Manager Fran Robustelli filed a complaint to the City Council on May 8, 2024, days before she was to leave her position for a new job in Florida. The City Council hired an independent outside investigator, Carl A. Botterud, to look into the employment-related claims.

Robustelli claims she received "discriminatory and harassing behavior" towards her by Vice-Mayor Simon which she says created "an intolerable hostile work environment," according to an email sent to the City Council on November 4. Robustelli also alleges she experienced "threats to her employment and evaluation outcomes if decisions were made contrary to a desired decision."

Further investigation found Councilmember Aguilar also made threats to Robustelli's employment and job evaluation if she moved forward with removing Chief Pridgen from his position.

Both men were cited for violating City Charter Section 345, Interference in Ada censure.

That is, it will be disguised as a large pine tree, hopefully blending in with nearby real pine trees.

The tower is proposed for the northwest corner of the parking lot at San Leandro Electric, noted for its large American flag waving over San Leandro Boulevard.

The lower part of the structure will be surrounded by a fence that will hide ground-level equipment from public view.

TEP said that noise will be minimal, and the facility will not be visible or only minimally visible from the nearest residences, on Bixco Street across the railroad tracks and BART overpass in the Cherrywood neighborhood.


