The regular meeting of the Bluegrass Amateur Radio Society, Inc., will be held the second Monday of the month, September 10, 2018, 6:00 PM. The change is due to the first Monday being Labor Day Holiday. Location of the meeting will be Picnic Shelter No. 2 in Shillito Park on the south side of Lexington.

The September meeting has become unique in various ways from the other monthly meetings each year. It is always held the second Monday: the meeting starts at 6:00 PM rather than 7:30 PM; and the location is Shillito Park rather than the Red Cross Building. Most importantly, it is the Club's annual family picnic meeting, all members are encouraged to bring your entire family or quests if you choose. And finally, the Club provides most of the food and drinks.

It has become tradition to make the September meeting our annual family picnic. It has also become a tradition to donate the September meeting to recognizing those persons who have given their time and efforts providing portable, mobile or some mode of communication during one activity or another, or volunteering to help make the Club's activities successful. Listed among these activities, but not necessarily limited to only these, are the hamfest, faithfully conducting an introduction to electronics workshop, or helping the instructor, almost every Saturday afternoon during the year, participating in and helping promote the KY-QRP activities and meetings, helping with Field Day or a licensing test session, serving as Net Control for one of the area nets (especially the longtime Sunday evening Amateur Television and Communications Net by Greg Cross/W8FJK), and checking into those nets, especially during severe weather, or helping with routine jobs around the Shack.

To show the Club's appreciation, we set a table with fried chicken and fixins, and since a picnic isn't a picnic without hot dogs, brats, and burgers, we furnish them too! And soft drinks to wash it all down. The dogs, brats, and burgers are a specialty of a couple of our Club chefs (notably Loretta Colvin) who labor over a very hot grill just to make sure your appetites are satisfied. By the way, their real speciality is blackened, if you prefer. . .just give them your special order instructions.

In addition to the fried chicken, brats, dogs, and burgers, you are encouraged to bring a covered dish of your choice. . either a longtime favorite or a new one you are experimenting with. It may be your favorite casserole, bean salad, desert, or whatever. Of course it is not mandatory that you bring a dish. Our primary purpose is to have a **BIG** crowd, and we want everyone to be well fed.

If you are not sure how to get to Shillito Park, it is located on the south side of Lexington, behind and across the railroad tracks from Fayette Mall. Access is gained by turning off Nicholasville Road onto West Reynolds Road (between Arby's and Fayette Mall). After passing under the railroad overpass, turn left onto Shillito Park Road (it passes in front of a fire station). Stay on Shillito Park Road, past the swimming pool (it will be on your right), and then PAST Brunswick Road (also on your right), which leads to the tennis courts and softball diamonds, and then turn right into the parking area in front of Shelter #2, adjacent to the kids playground fort. From the road you'll be able to see people you recognize grouped around the pavilion. If you are unsure about the location, talk-in will be available on the 146.760 repeater. You may also get to Shillito Park by taking Clays Mill Road to Wellington Way. Be careful at the traffic circle! Wellington Way becomes West Reynolds Road at the traffic circle. Turn right off West Reynolds at the traffic signal just before the railroad overpass, onto

Shillito Park Road. . .then follow the instructions above.

Join us for the picnic and bring your family or friend. We always have a lot of fun, a lot of food, meet old friends and new people too, and have a very enjoyable evening. Come out and stay as long as you like.

I wanted to pass along a resource you might want to mention in the newsletter. WOIS.com. That's W-zero-I-S. He has a lot of old callbook resources.

As an example, I was able to finally find government acknowledgment of my father's ticket as 1ALB in 1925, located in my grandparents' house on Russell Ave in Newport,

RI. I have a picture of that station, and have attached it to this email.

Ι hope you'll pass along the WOIS.com info. and feel free to use the picture if you need filler. I was surprised that tickets seem to have been for only one year, be-

cause other ops had 1ALB, two before my father and one after.

The pictured station is all homebrew except for the microphone, liberated from an early telephone, and the earphones. The station is listed in the callbook as 40 Watts, but 5 Watts was more typical and managed a CW QSO with Iowa while using a bedspring antenna. Not shown in the picture, power came from a chemical rectifier with 60 glass baby food jars with hand mixed electrolyte and anodes and cathodes cut from metal cans. 2 Watts of loop modulation was sometimes fed with the family windup Victrola (remember, these are the early days!) to broadcast music, probably illegally. The sailors stationed with the Atlantic Fleet in Newport Harbor appreciated the music and rewarded my father with souvenirs including stamps, coins, and currency from their

> world travels, which started my father on lifelong collecting hobbies. About the same time, mu mother-to-be was a 19 year old lass who came to Newport for nurse's training. They met, and ham radio ended for 1ALB.

The neatest part of the

whole story to me is that, since my son Rob is licensed with my old call of N4CBR, in just a few years we'll be able to claim that ham radio's been in our family for 100 years (even if I kick the bucket before that, hi hi).

Greg, try to find Farnsworth's "By the Word Method" which is like sitting in a classroom. Also, try to see the code in your mind and not "decipher" it. Hearing the characters and words as a complete series of sounds will take you to higher speeds. Also, concentrate on the smaller words first as a series of sounds and not as a series of letters. Words like THE, IT. RADIO, RIG, and others like them should be heard and recognized as words and not iust a series of letters and sounds.


The biggest gain in CW is with practice. The idea of a slow speed CW net is an excellent beginning. Also, try to get into QRP.

FEMA ICS Training for Ham Radio Operators

As we discussed, the ARRL and FEMA are desirous to revamp ARES/RACES training requirements. There is now a need

for amateur radio operators to obtain certificates for FEMA ICS 100, 200, 700 and 800 courses if they desire to participate as Tier II level responders. These 4 classes

can be completed on-line. However, if there are a group of at least 20 interested ham operators desirous to obtain class-room instruction the Fayette County Emergency Operation Center (EOC) is willing to create a free-of-charge class taught by FEMA certified instructors. Classroom instruction offers the advantage of students being able to ask questions of the experienced instructors and the material put into a context most relevant to amateur radio operators.

ARES/RACES members desirous to become Tier III responders will be required to complete FEMA ICS 300 and 400 courses which are only available as through classroom instruction. These classes are currently offered at various Kentucky EOC locations during the work week. The ICS 300 course runs 2 days and the ICS 400 course runs 3 days. You are required to complete ICS 100, 200, 700, and 800 prior to taking ICS 300. ICS 400 course requirement is to complete the other modules prior to registering. The weekday courses are not an option for many ham operators due to work responsibilities so we have an alternative solution.

The Fayette County EOC is willing to create classes for the aforementioned ICS courses that meet either in the evening or possibly weekends to accommodate ham radio operators work schedules.

This was in preparation for the "fox" hunt to be held during the annual club picnic on September 10, at Shillito Park. This and other activities are planned in the future, in-



The pictures displayed on this page clearly show the vendors at their tables, and many of the attendees at various times of the Day.


Much of the success of the hamfest was due to a number of hard working people who volunteered for the work crews. We thank each of them for their efforts.

Federal Budget Puts WWV and WWVH at Risk

Time itself may seem to go on forever, but the U.S. government's budget for the fiscal year 2019 may actually be killing time, or at the very least putting a vital timekeeper at a dead stop. For that report, we turn to the newest member of the Amateur Radio Newsline family Dave Parks WB8ODF.

DAVE: If you have come to rely on the services of WWV and WWVH for time, frequency and other calibrations in your weather, marine, propagation, and related radio activities, you may already know that all of this is earmarked to come to an end in the coming year's

proposed budget for United States National Institute of Standards and Technology. Hams have been petitioning Congress to retain funding for WWV which received its call sign in 1919, assigned to the National Bureau of Standards. It is considered the oldest continuously operating radio station in the U.S. Likewise WWVB, broadcasting from Fort Collins, Colorado, is also imperiled as is its critical role in keeping tens of millions of radiocontrolled clocks and other devices in sync as it has since 1963. As reported by a number of news outlets, the petition has until September 15 to collect the

needed 100,000 signatures. News sources have noted that defunding both stations would reduce the federal budget by \$6.3 million, a very small fraction of the proposed \$4.1 trillion budget.


