

Cast Your Net – Again

Simon answered, “Master, we’ve worked hard all night and haven’t caught anything. But because you say so, I will let down the nets.” ... Then Jesus said to Simon, “Don’t be afraid; from now on you will catch men” (Luke 5:5, 10).

The call to discipleship did not end with the Twelve. Each one of us blessed by faith through the gift of the Spirit is also both called and enabled by God to follow our leader, Jesus. Will you trust Him to make you one of His “fishermen”?

Jesus’ request to fish in the morning, of all times, was unusual. Everyone knew you fished at night! Peter, however, was willing, even though as a pro he “knew” it wouldn’t work. When have you responded like that to a “nudge” from the Spirit to speak to someone about Jesus’ love?” I already tried, Lord, and got nothing.” Add: “But, I’m willing to try again.” It is good to remember God’s timing is perfect! Many times a day of fishing, like a day you have planned to speak to a friend, turns out to be just “a nice day on the water.” Other times it is cold and windy and seems fruitless. Try not to let these setbacks deter you from the desire to share the best news ever with one you love.

What else can we learn from this passage? Jesus told Peter to go out to “the deep water” and to “use the nets.” A good fisherman knows – make that learns – what kind of bait or lure to use, how deep to set the line, what time of day or night is best, etc. As a “fisher of men” we must learn from the Master who, what, when, and where we are to “fish.” Think about what method you have tried in the past to share the life-giving message of God’s amazing grace. Why did or didn’t it work? What can you try next? Pray for God’s idea, His plan of action, and His timing. Peter later wrote: *But in your hearts set apart Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect ... (1 Peter 3:15, 16).*

Prayer: Dear Jesus, enable me to faithfully and joyfully express my love for You and the sure hope only You can give. May I continue my preparation so that I will be ready to cast my line to tell others that they, too, can cast all their anxiety on him because he cares for them. Amen.

True Freedom

“For freedom Christ has set us free; stand firm therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery” (Gal. 5:1).

We celebrate this month because of the freedoms and liberties our country has afforded us. We are right to do this. We should be thankful for these liberties: the freedom to gather together to worship and to live out what we believe in our daily lives.

But freedom and liberty in our age has devolved. It has become a freedom from duty instead of a freedom for it. Indeed, freedom and liberty in our age has turned into licentiousness: a license to do what we want, when we want.

This license is a submission, again, to a yoke of slavery. For freedom as license to do what we desire when we desire it means we are slaves to our desires, slaves to our passions.

Christ died to set us free from our sinful desires. In Holy Baptism, our Old Adam is drowned and put to death along with all sin and evil desires so that a new man may arise and live before God in righteousness and purity.

In Christ, we are a new creation. We are set free from the passions of the flesh so that we are free to do our duty and bear fruits of the Spirit.

Our duty is what God calls us to do as members of a family, society, and the church.

God calls us to believe in His Word and gladly hear and learn it. He calls us to pray for all people. He calls us to live in faith toward Him and in fervent love for our neighbor. He calls us to put the gifts He gives to us in His service. God calls parents to provide for their children and raise them in the fear and admonition of the Lord. And God calls children to honor their parents and provide and care for them when they are no longer able to do so themselves.

God calls the government to punish those who do evil and to reward those who do good. He calls citizens to pay their taxes and honor the governing officials as God’s servants. He calls pastors to preach and teach the Gospel as well as repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And He calls hearers to support those who teach them with every good thing.

Astigmatism

A common imperfection in the eye's curvature, astigmatism is seen in about 3 million U.S. cases per year. With astigmatism, the front surface of the eye or the lens, inside the eye, is curved differently in one direction than the other.

This irregular shaped cornea or lens prevents light from focusing properly on the retina, the light sensitive surface at the back of the eye. As a result, vision becomes blurred at any distance. This can lead to discomfort and headaches.

This specific cause of astigmatism is unknown. It can be heredity and is usually present from birth. It can decrease or increase over time. Astigmatism frequently occurs with nearsightedness and farsightedness.

A comprehensive optometric exam will include test for astigmatism. If necessary, eye glasses or contact lenses correct the condition by altering the way light enters the eyes. Another treatment option is a painless, noninvasive corneal procedure called orthokeratology. In this the person wears a series of specially designed rigid contact lenses to gradually reshape the curvature of the cornea. Laser surgery is another treatment whereby the laser changes the shape of the cornea by removing a small amount of eye tissue.

When the curvature of the lens inside the eye changes there can be an increase or decrease in astigmatism. This change frequently occurs at adulthood and can come before the development of cataracts.

In an eye injury or eye surgery, astigmatism can develop. Keratoconus is a rare condition causing astigmatism. This is when the cornea becomes progressively thinner and cone-shaped, resulting in a large amount of astigmatism. Poor vision occurs that cannot be corrected with eye glasses. In this condition contact lenses are needed for clear vision and eventually a corneal transplant.

Astigmatism is diagnosed through a comprehensive eye exam. This includes:

- 1) Visual activity – this is reading letters on a distance chart.
- 2) Keratometry/Topography – this is a primary instrument used to measure the cornea curvature.
- 3) Refraction – using an instrument called a phoropter, the optometrist places a series of lenses in front of your eyes and measures how they focus light.

Once testing is complete, your optometrist can discuss treatment options – eyeglasses, contact lenses, orthkeratology, laser and other refractory surgery procedures. You and the optometrist can select the treatment that best meets your visual and lifestyle needs.
