The following comes from the Lay Ministers. It is a walk-through of what you can expect when we resume our Sunday morning worship schedule on May 31.

Worship time for the summer will be at 8:30 a.m.

As you approach the building you will notice the doors are open. You will not need to touch the handles as you enter. We plan to have greeters who will be encouraged to wear a mask. They will stand in a different spot than usual. They will be on your left as you enter, and will direct you through the open double doors into the sanctuary. At first there will be no bulletins to hand out or pick up from a pile.

In the sanctuary you will notice the pew cushions in every other row are flipped up. Please be seated in a row where the cushion is down.

When Pastor reads the readings he will announce the page number in the pew Bibles since there will be no bulletin from which to read. There will be no need to clean the Bibles or hymnals since no one will touch them again for a week.

The attendance sheets will be removed from the pews. The offering plate will be on a stand near the entrance.

The 31st is Pentecost and also a fifth Sunday so there will be communion. Pastor and the Lay Minister will sanitize their hands and put on a mask. They will station themselves in the center below the steps. Family groups will usher themselves forward up the side aisles maintaining the appropriate distance between groups, receive and eat/drink the elements, move back to their pew via the center aisle after depositing the cups in the basket on the stand. There will be one dismissal when all have communed.

At the end of the service, one usher will dismiss you. You are encouraged to move on outside where Pastor (masked) will greet people, and where you may greet one another.

If the parish hall, nursery, and kitchen are not used, no extra cleaning measures will be necessary.

For personal safety, and out of consideration for others, wearing masks is encouraged. You will not be turned away if you are not wearing one. Hand sanitizer will be available in several locations.

It will be good to gather again. The service will continue to be recorded. It will be available to view online approximately 4 hours after the service (1:30ish). We are not yet equipped to begin livestreaming.
