



Did You Know?

Merriam Webster defines a *democracy* as 'government by the people". The word itself comes from the Greek words *demos* (meaning 'common people') and *kratos* (meaning 'strength'). The United States of America's form of government is a *democratic republic*. This can best be explained as a system where some decisions are made by the people and others are made by elected leaders. 
