

Dr. Bruce D. Cummons *(1924-2004)*

*Founder of: Massillon Baptist Temple
 Massillon Christian School

Pastor Bruce D. Cummons was born July 25, 1924, in Parkersburg, West Virginia, where he lived with his parents (Otis and Pearl Cummons), his sister (Edrie), and his brother (Wayne) during his school days. He was saved at eleven years of age during a revival meeting in a country church. He died in Massillon, Ohio, on January 24, 2004.

At nineteen he enlisted in the U.S. Navy where he served during World War II as a radio operator. After the war he returned to the Akron, Ohio, area where his parents were then residing. He continued with his radio career, graduated from McKim Tech, and worked with Goodyear Aircraft as a radio operator with their blimps.

He surrendered to the call to preach in 1946. On August 26, 1947, he married the former Wanda Straight, and they both joined the Akron Baptist Temple by baptism. In August 1948 they traveled to Fort Worth, Texas, to attend Bible Baptist Seminary. He was a graduate of the Seminary with a Bachelor of Divinity degree and an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree.



Dr. Cummons began the Massillon Baptist Temple on November 19, 1950, and served as pastor until November 19, 1995, when he retired after forty-five years of ministry.

During his years as pastor he conducted 564 weddings, 926 funerals, and over 400 revival meetings and conferences. He was Administrator of the Massillon Christian School and President of Massillon Baptist College. He served as President of the World Baptist Fellowship and Chairman of Baptist Bible Fellowship of Ohio. He authored many books and pamphlets and was the editor of the *Baptist Reporter* for 42 years. His voice was heard from the earliest days of his ministry on local radio stations and reached a network of 42 stations at one time, carrying the "Grace And Peace Broadcast" on daily and weekly broadcasts that covered 80% of the land area of



the world. On October 7, 1992, Pastor Cummons was inducted into the Broadcasters' Hall of Fame.

He continued with his evangelistic work and writing as well as pursuing his hobbies of music, photography, travel, and amateur radio until the time of his death.

Pastor Cummons' **salvation text** was: *All that the Father giveth me shall come to me; and him that cometh to me I will in no wise cast out.* (John 6:37)

His life's text: *Therefore I say unto you, What things soever ye desire, when ye pray, believe that ye receive them, and ye shall have them.* (Mark 11:24)

He also longed to live the verse as spoken of Barnabas: *For he was a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost and of faith: and much people was added unto the Lord.* (Acts 11:24)

Penned in the front of Dr. Cummons' Bible:

HISTORY OF MASSILLON BAPTIST COLLEGE

The ministry of Massillon Baptist College was started in September of 1973 as an outreach ministry of Massillon Baptist Temple. This ministry came from the heart and vision of Dr. Bruce D. Cummons (1924-2004), our Founder, as a natural development of Temple Bible Institute, its predecessor, which began in 1953.

The college has focused its efforts on the education of men and women who were called of God into Christian service, and, therefore, is not in competition with other colleges. It is a faith-supported ministry providing a high-quality Bible education for those who may otherwise not be able to obtain such an education.

MBC has graduates working in ministries around the world. Our graduates work as pastors, assistant pastors, music directors, youth directors, secretaries, etc., in over twenty-eight states. Our missionary graduates serve in approximately twenty countries of the world.

MBC stands firmly on the Authorized Version of the Bible (KJV 1611) and on all its principles and precepts. The college was started from a local New Testament Baptist church and teaches these distinctives to its students.



OUR PURPOSE

The purpose of Massillon Baptist College is to train God-called men and women for Christian service. Students may be trained as pastors, evangelists, missionaries, Christian education directors, youth leaders, or Sunday school teachers. Also, laymen may take courses to better equip themselves in their Christian lives.

The college is a local church ministry and places strong emphasis on the ministry and work of the local church. Believing that much can be learned by observation and participation, we require all students to attend the services of Massillon Baptist Temple, unless they currently reside in the area and are faithfully attending a fundamental, Bible-believing church. After the second year of study, students may work in other churches with permission of the college.

Our desire is to give students a thorough working knowledge of the Word of God. The only Bible we use is the Authorized Version (KJV 1611). Our purpose is to train people in the work of building soul-winning churches at home and on the foreign mission field. Regardless of the field of service a student plans to enter, he will be trained in evangelism and soul winning. Every student will be required to go on visitation each week.

We invite students to come to Massillon Baptist College to be well trained by preachers and teachers who are actively engaged in the Lord's work, and who are "getting the job done" for Christ. Students will receive blessing, instruction, and inspiration from the services and ministries of the Massillon Baptist Temple (known across the nation as "THE CHURCH THAT WAS BUILT ON BIBLE TEACHING!"). Massillon Baptist College is a place where pastors train pastors, teachers train teachers, and missionaries train missionaries. We believe all earnest students will leave MBC well equipped.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Location:

Massillon Baptist College is located in Massillon, Ohio, a city in northeastern Ohio with a population of 31,000 (as of 2000). The city of Massillon is nationally known as “Football Town U.S.A.” because of the prowess of its high school football team, the Massillon Tigers. The Pro Football Hall of Fame is located just eight miles east of Massillon, in Canton, Ohio.

Massillon, however, has also become known as the home of Massillon Baptist Temple, whose Sunday School has been listed among the top 50 in the United States. The church’s founding pastor, Dr. Bruce D. Cummons (1924-2004), served Massillon and surrounding communities for 50+ years.

Recent surveys reveal that Massillon is only one day’s drive from more than 60 percent of the population of the United States. Two major highways cross the city—U.S. Routes 21 and 30. In addition, Interstate 77 is just five miles to the east.

Massillon is a twenty-minute drive from the Akron-Canton Airport and a one-hour drive from Hopkins International Airport in Cleveland, Ohio. Although the college is situated in a metropolitan area, it is very close to the rolling hills of Amish country.

DIRECTIONS TO MASSILLON BAPTIST COLLEGE, MASSILLON, OHIO

From the North: Take I-77 South to State Rt. 21 South

From the South: Take I-77 North to State Rt. 21 North

From the East: Take State Rt. 30 to State Rt. 21 North

From the West: Take State Rt. 30 to State Rt. 21 North

Upon reaching Massillon on State Rt. 21, turn west onto Walnut Road and follow to 12th St., SW. Turn left onto 12th St. and follow to Overlook Avenue. Twelfth St. ends on Overlook in front of Massillon Baptist Temple and Massillon Baptist College.

Facilities

All classes are held at Cummons Hall, which was named in honor of our founder,

Dr. Bruce D. Cummons (1924-2004), and his wife, Wanda. Cummons Hall also houses the computer lab, memorial library, and the Student Center. In addition, the gymnasium and cafeteria of Massillon Christian School are utilized.

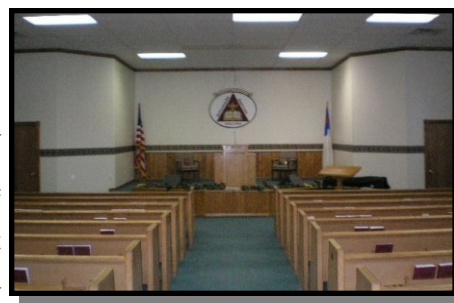

DR. BRUCE D. CUMMONS CHAPEL

Students will attend chapel services in the Dr. Bruce D. Cummons Chapel. This chapel was the original auditorium for Massillon Baptist Temple. The chapel was named in honor of Dr. Cummons at the 50th Anniversary service of Massillon Baptist Temple (Nov. 2000). This had also marked Dr. Cummons' 50th year in the ministry, serving Massillon and surrounding areas.

Dormitory

Dr. W. Jay Dolvin Hall was named in honor of the many years of service that Dr. Dolvin has willingly given to the ministries of Massillon Baptist Temple, Massillon Baptist College, and Massillon Christian School. This dormitory has a separate entrance for each floor and houses both men and ladies. Dorm supervisors reside in this building.



Dormitory housing is provided for all single students who do not reside within easy commuting distance. Meals and sack lunches are served at the campus cafeteria Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Room and board charges are nominal. If you are on a restricted diet, please notify the college office. The cafeteria will work with you in an effort to be sure that something suitable to your diet will be available each day. A copy of the dietary orders of



your doctor will be necessary. We will attempt not to serve you with any food from the cafeteria that is not permitted in your doctor's orders. However, as an adult, you are responsible to monitor yourself and your eating.

Single Students age 26 and over can not live in the dorms. No student having been married will be granted permission to live in the dormitory. Current costs and dormitory reservation information can be acquired from the college office by written request.

Applicants should be aware that the dormitories are not open for occupancy by new students until mid-August (Fall semester) and mid-December (Spring semester). Dormitory reservations must arrive in the college office ten (10) days prior to Registration/Orientation. Students will not be permitted to move into the dormitory in the middle of a semester unless they are currently enrolled as commuting students.

STUDENTS MAY NOT MOVE INTO THE DORMITORY UNTIL THEY HAVE BEEN OFFICIALLY ACCEPTED AT MBC. Any students arriving before acceptance or without a proper reservation may be asked to lodge at an area motel until meeting the aforementioned requirements.

Work Possibilities

Many students must supplement their income while attending MBC. The city of Massillon has welcomed the college, and students will feel this welcome as they seek employment. There are a number of small industrial plants and shopping malls in the area. Canton, with a population in excess of 80,000, is just eight miles east of Massillon; Akron is only twenty-five miles north. If the Lord has truly called a student to Massillon Baptist College, He will provide while the student is attending school.

We do urge students, married and single, to come to Massillon financially prepared to live for six or eight weeks while employment and housing are being secured.

College Liability

Massillon Baptist College will not be responsible for any injury or illness, which a student may receive in the dormitory, during any class, or at an extracurricular activity, whether such injury is received on or off the campus.

Church Attendance

All students of Massillon Baptist College are expected to maintain the highest Christian standards at all times. Therefore, they are required to attend all services of Massillon Baptist Temple or their own local church (if they were in attendance at that church six months prior to making application to the college). Second-year and third-year students may work in another church with special permission from the Administration. Student attendance will be checked weekly.

Students are expected to participate in Christian service at their local churches on a regular basis. Christian service includes working in a Sunday School class, on a bus route, in the choir, in junior church, at a nursing home, in Patch the Pirate Club, with the Sunshine Group, etc. Students must complete and turn in a Christian Work Report each week to the college office. Also, students must visit a minimum of two hours per week.

Class Sessions and Credits

College classes are held Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. until 12 noon, facilitating second or third shift employment. Classes are fifty minutes in duration. The regular class schedule includes three chapel services per week. Attendance at these services is required unless an excused absence is obtained. (NOTE: Student Observation and Field Experience may necessitate times other than these mentioned above.)

The college year consists of two 15/16-week semesters, extending from August to May. Credits are earned in semester hours. A semester hour is one fifty-minute period each week for one semester.

Student Marriages

Students should permit nothing to interfere with God's perfect plan for their lives. While part of the Lord's plan is for young men and women to form acquaintances that may result in marriage, students must guard against hasty courtships and unwise marriages. Because of this, no student may marry at any time during the regular school year, including breaks. Any infringement of this rule by a student will automatically result in the forfeiture of at least one semester.

Standards of Conduct and Dress

For the sake of Christian testimony, students must abstain from the use of alcoholic beverages, tobacco (in any form), and drugs (unless prescribed by a physician for medical reasons). Also, students are not permitted to play cards, attend movie theaters and dances, or participate in any form of gambling.

Students will be issued a dress code upon arrival at the college and will be expected to fulfill its standards. Massillon Baptist College prohibits modern fad styles of dress and hair which are unbecoming on a Christian. It is important for Christians to be in the world but not of the world. All male students are expected to wear a dress shirt and dress pants, as well as a tie to classes and church services. Jeans and/or athletic shoes are not permissible in class or in church, but may be worn in the gymnasium or for outside activities. Women are expected to dress modestly. Hemlines are to be at the bottom of the knee or below, and slits may be no higher than the middle of the knee. No slacks or jeans are permitted at any time. Skirts, and dresses made of denim are not to be worn in classes or in church; however, they are permissible as casual wear. Makeup and jewelry must be worn in moderation.

Social Media Policy

Guidelines: Social Media, such as Face Book, Twitter, YouTube, Instagram, Linkedin, personal texting and others, are powerful tools of communication that have significant impact on your personal reputation as well as the reputation of Massillon Baptist College. Please use the following guidelines when posting on Social Media sites.

1. Photos, videos, and / or comments posted on these sites that depict student life or college identifiable activities are to be positive in nature and support the purpose of the college and the Massillon Baptist Temple. No offensive or inappropriate pictures or comments are to be posted.
2. Always be authentic. Be honest about your identity. If you post personally, or as a student of MBC, make sure you are aware of the college Standard of Conduct, as you share your personal views about yourself, other students, college personnel or the college in general.
3. Never pretend to be someone else when you post personally. Tracking tools enable supposedly anonymous posts to be traced back to the authors. Always be honest about yourself and views without providing personal information that could be used against you.
4. Keep your posts positive. Don't post negative comments and share personal struggles in your college experience.
5. Think twice before posting. Privacy does not exist in the world of Social Media. Your personal as well as college reputation is at stake.
6. As it sees fit, the college reserves the right to request removal of any photos and/or comments involving college identifiable activities along with photos and/or comments involving staff or any other college personnel.
7. Colossians 3:17, "*And whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God and the Father by him.*"
8. If others post something on your page or a picture of you, simply ask them to take it down.
9. It is **STRONGLY ENCOURAGED** that you never post your home address, local address, phone number, birthdates or other personal information.
10. Student could face disciplinary actions and even dismissal for violations of college policies.
11. All students who have Social Media sites, **MUST** "friend" the faculty of Massillon Baptist College and Massillon Baptist Temple. These include the President, Dean of Students, Youth Director and Assistant Pastor.

APPEALS PROCEDURE

The appeals procedure is designed for the student desiring to appeal a decision of a Professor or administrative member in any of the following areas:

1. Clarification of a grade
2. Review of a disciplinary measure involving the student
3. Demerits issued

Although Massillon Baptist College is not a church and does not fall under the direct dictates of the Word of God, it is a ministry of the local church. This educational institution does, therefore, base its practices and rules of operation on the Word of God. The appeals procedure for the College follows the Scriptural principles found in Matthew 18:15-17 as applicable to a college setting:

Moreover if thy brother shall trespass against thee, go and tell him his fault between thee and him alone: if he shall hear thee, thou hast gained thy brother. But if he will not hear thee, then take with thee one or two more, that in the mouth of two or three witnesses every word may be established. And if he shall neglect to hear them, tell it unto the church: but if he neglect to hear the church, let him be unto thee as an heathen man and a publican.

Based on the above Scripture, the procedure for an appeal involves the following steps:

1. The student should make a verbal request for verification to the individual staff member(s) involved. This request must take place no later than fifteen (15) days after the incident in question.
2. If the student is not satisfied with the decision after verbal communication with the involved staff member(s), the student may request a personal appearance with the staff member(s) and the Academic Dean. This request must be made in writing, stating the reason for the meeting and giving relevant data concerning the situation. At such time, the Academic Dean will meet with the involved parties. This second step of the procedure must be requested no later than ten (10) days after the first step of the appeals procedure.
3. If after this meeting the student is still not satisfied with the decision, he or she may submit a second and final written request. This third step of the procedure must be requested no later than ten (10) days after the second meeting. This request must be directed to the President of the College. This written request must contain the reason for the meeting and all relevant data. **THE DECISION DERIVED FROM THIS MEETING IS FINAL.**

ADMISSIONS INFORMATION

Admissions Requirements

All prospective students should understand that attendance at Massillon Baptist College is a privilege and not a right, and that said privilege may be forfeited at any time by any student who does not conform to the standards and regulations of the college. The College Administration may request the withdrawal of any student at any time, who, in the opinion of the Administration, does not fit into the spirit of the institution, whether or not he/she conforms to the specific rules and regulations of the College.

Massillon Baptist College is dedicated to the training of men and women for a life of service to Christ. Along with his/her application form, a prospective student should include a written testimony of his/her salvation and call to Christian service. Three individuals familiar with the applicant (including the applicant's pastor) should complete reference forms. These individuals, rather than the applicant, should return the forms to the College for review.

Once accepted for enrollment at MBC, a student should purpose in his heart to be serious-minded, studious, and disciplined in his studies.

General Admission

To be enrolled in Massillon Baptist College, prospective students must have a high school diploma or General Equivalency Diploma (GED).

Special Admission

Because some worthy and spiritually qualified applicants may not have finished high school, MBC reserves the right to interview and admit some applicants on an individual basis. However, all applicants who do not hold a high school diploma or GED must be at least twenty (20) years of age before admission to the College.

Admissions Procedure

Prospective students should complete and return an application form, along with a

non-refundable \$35 application fee. A medical form, emergency form, written testimony, and recent photograph should also be enclosed. Personal reference forms should be mailed directly to the College from the persons acting as references.

Applicants must have high school and college transcripts sent to our college office. Only official college transcripts are acceptable for consideration of credit transfers.

All applicants must be officially accepted before they can enroll. No enrollment will be possible following the last specified enrollment date.

Rapid Enrollment

Rapid enrollment is intended for those who want to audit a class, or for those who do not intend to receive a degree, but only wish to become a better Christian or to have a better understanding of Scripture.

Rapid enrollment requires the following:

- a. Application form
- b. Non-refundable application fee of \$35
- c. Pastor's reference form
- d. Written testimony
- e. Recent photo

Auditing Classes

A prospective audit student must complete a rapid enrollment, or, must be a currently enrolled student at Massillon Baptist College. An audit student will receive no units of credit for the class. The audit student is not required to take tests or to do any of the class assignments, but may do so for self-evaluation.

An audit student must pay an audit fee as follows:

1 credit hour:	\$15.00
2 credit hours:	\$30.00
3 credit hours:	\$45.00

Because of auditing the class on campus, the audit student will be required to pay class dues, which are currently \$10 per semester. An audit student is not required to purchase a yearbook or school pictures, but is encouraged to do so.

Personal Enrichment

A prospective personal enrichment student must complete a Rapid Enrollment or must be a currently enrolled student at Massillon Baptist College, and may take no more than two (2) classes in a semester. If he successfully completes the class or classes taken, an enrichment student will receive credit for the class(es) taken.

An enrichment student is required to purchase textbooks, take all tests, complete all class assignments, and obtain appropriate class admission slips when absent/tardy.

Also, an enrichment student must pay the same fees as a part-time student.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Massillon Baptist College continues to provide training for students at minimal cost. This cost includes modest fees which are explained below. We are able to offer this high-quality education to students because of the unselfish attitude of the people of Massillon Baptist Temple and a number of other local churches who believe in the ministry of a Bible education. There are approximately thirty churches who support the college as a missionary endeavor.

All accounts (including library fines, etc.) must be current and/or paid in full before a student receives credit for mid-term or final exams, transfers credits, receives a report card or transcript, or graduates.

All fees must be paid at the time of registration, unless a deferred payment plan has been arranged with the Academic Dean prior to registration.

Application Fee: A non-refundable fee of \$35 MUST accompany each application for admission. An application will not be processed without this fee.

Tuition Fee: This fee helps to cover the cost of student enrollment and general college operating expenses. The fee is currently \$61 per credit hour. A full-time student (one carrying 12 or more credit hours) must pay \$730 for tuition per semester. Tuition fees are refunded on the following basis: 90% before the 1st day of classes, 50% during 1st through 5th days of classes, and non-refundable after the 5th day of classes.

Class Dues: All students must pay class dues in the amount of \$10 per semester, non-refundable.

Add/Drop/Change Class Fee: There is a \$5 fee per class to be paid at the time of a class change. This fee is non-refundable

Pictures: Student pictures are required each fall at the cost of \$35. This fee is non-refundable.

Yearbook: Students enrolled in five (5) credit hours or more must purchase the MBC Annual at a cost of \$25. This fee is non-refundable.

Graduation Fee: Each prospective graduate is charged a graduation fee to pay for such items as graduation picture, printing of diploma, and purchase of cap and gown. This fee (currently \$50 per semester) will be due on the date of enrollment both semesters of the student's senior year. This fee is non-refundable.

Certificate Fee: Each prospective one-year Bible Certificate recipient is charged a certificate fee to pay for such items as picture and processing of the certificate. The fee (currently \$10 per semester) will be due on the date of enrollment both semesters. This fee is non-refundable.

Transcripts: One copy of a student's transcript (complete or incomplete) will be given to a student upon written request. Each additional copy will cost the student \$5. All requests for transcripts must be made in writing and signed in cursive by the student making the request. NOTE: No third party may request a transcript without legal proof of his authority to make such a request.

Dormitory Reservation Fee: This \$25 non-refundable fee must accompany the dorm reservation request form and should be sent at the time of application. Prospective dorm students should contact the college office for additional information. A person must be accepted as a student, must have paid this reservation fee, and must be prepared to pay the first month's rent before moving onto campus.

Dormitory Fees: Dormitory fees amount to \$1,350.00 per semester and may be paid on a monthly basis (August & May, \$150.00; September-April, \$300). Dormitory fees include lunch and a sack lunch Monday, Wednesday and Friday, special days excepted. These fees are refundable on a prorated basis.

Cafeteria: Hot lunch is available at the cafeteria for non-dormitory students Monday, Wednesday and Friday at a cost of \$2.50 each.

Cleaning Fee: Each room must be thoroughly cleaned upon moving out of the dormitory. A cleaning fee of \$25 will be assessed if the room does not pass the inspection of the Dorm Supervisor. A student will also be billed for any damage to his/her room.

Refrigerator Fee: A dormitory student bringing a small refrigerator will be charged \$5 per month for the utility charge. This fee is refundable on a prorated basis.

Textbooks: All textbooks must be paid for upon selection, as students are not permitted to charge books. All full-time students should plan to pay approximately \$280 per semester for books and lecture notes. All of MBC's currently enrolled students receive a discount at the college bookstore on most items.

Miscellaneous Fees: Other miscellaneous fees that may apply to a student at MBC include Locksmith, Lost Keys, NSF/Returned checks, Air Conditioner Fee, Student Handbook (replacement), and Damage.

Lap Top: Each student will be assigned their own laptop that they will rent for four semesters for \$150. After the four semesters, the lap top is their property. The internet fee is included into the laptop fee as the students will be using the internet to connect to their laptops. This is mandatory as each laptop comes with certain programs on the laptops.

Lab Fee: Each student wanting their Church Office Management degree, will be charged a lab fee of \$12.50 per year to cover the cost of the Microsoft Office suite added to their laptop.



REFUND POLICIES

Massillon Baptist College

1. The \$35 Application Fee is not refundable.
2. Picture Moneys, Yearbook Payments, Class Dues, Change Class Fees, Late Registration Fees, and Graduation Fees are not refundable.
3. The \$25 Dormitory Reservation Fee is not refundable.
4. Dormitory Fees and Refrigerator Fees are refundable on a prorated basis. This proration is dependent upon the date of withdrawal and the date on which the student has completely moved out and returned all keys (dormitory, room, and mailbox keys) to the College Office or Dormitory Supervisor (not a fellow student), and removed all his/her belongings and possessions. If a student physically moves out of a dormitory but fails to take all his/her belongings and possessions, a daily storage fee will be charged for the interim between the student=s moving out and the removal of his/her personal effects. Also, there will be a \$5 charge for each key that is not returned to the College Office by the student upon moving out.
5. Tuition Fees are refunded on the following basis:
 - a. 90% - before the 1st day of classes
 - b. 50% - 1st through 5th days of classes
 - c. No Refund - after the 5th day of classes

Baptist Book Store

1. Textbooks
 - a. No cash refund, credit, or exchange is given on student textbooks after purchase, except as outlined in Ab.@ and Ac.@ below.
 - b. A full refund or exchange will be made if a new textbook was damaged in publication. Used textbooks are sold as is.
 - c. A full refund or exchange will be made on a textbook if there is an administrative error or administrative change of class.
 - d. All textbooks must be purchased at the beginning of each semester through the Baptist Bookstore on campus. These books will not be added to your school bill account. The Baptist Bookstore and the Massillon Baptist College are two different entities.
2. Other Books and Merchandise
 - a. A full refund or credit, to be used in the purchase of future merchandise, will be issued if the merchandise was damaged by the manufacturer.
 - b. A full refund or credit, to be used in the purchase of future merchandise, will be given if the original merchandise is returned in its original, salable condition, within five (5) days of purchase, and if it is accompanied by the original sales receipt.

ANNUAL SCHOLARSHIPS AND AWARDS

Pastor & Mrs. Richard K. Folger Scholarship

The *Richard K. Folger Scholarship* is awarded by Mansfield Baptist Temple in honor of Pastor & Mrs. Richard K. Folger. Brother Folger was the Pastor of Mansfield Baptist Temple for many years. This scholarship is presented to a male student who has been called to preach; who is entering his third year of classes; and who has demonstrated in previous school years a deep love for the Lord, His church, and the Word of God. Mansfield Baptist Temple has also requested that the student demonstrate traits of humility, integrity, and dedication.

Cummons-Norwood Academic Achievement Awards

For approximately 25 years, Dr. & Mrs. James D. Norwood of Wisconsin gave cash awards, formerly known as the *James Norwood Award*, to the two top academic graduates of the College. Since Dr. Norwood's homegoing, the board of Regents for Massillon Baptist College elected to continue issuing this award to the Valedictorian and the Salutatorian of each graduating class, renaming this gift as the *Cummons-Norwood Academic Achievement Award*, in memory of both Dr. Bruce D. Cummons, founder of Massillon Baptist College, and Dr. James D. Norwood, founder of this award.

Dolvin-Norwood Christian Character Award

For approximately 25 years, Dr. & Mrs. James D. Norwood of Wisconsin also gave cash awards, formerly known as the *Christian Character Award*, to graduates who exemplified the finest of Christian character. Again, because of Dr. Norwood's home going, the Board of Regents for Massillon Baptist College elected to continue issuing this award each year to one or two graduates who demonstrate Christ-like character, renaming this gift as the *Dolvin-Norwood Christian Character Award*, in honor of Dr. W. Jay Dolvin, Professor of Massillon Baptist College and former Associate Pastor of Massillon Baptist Temple, and in memory of Dr. James D. Norwood, founder of this award.

Grace and Glory Scholarship

This scholarship is given each year by the Amazing Grace Baptist Temple. The people of Amazing Grace Baptist Temple established this scholarship fund as a reminder of the blessings the Lord bestowed upon their church under the leadership of Pastor James Butler. The *Grace and Glory Scholarship* is awarded by Amazing Grace Baptist Temple in Millersburg, OH, Rev. James Butler, pastor. In memory of Mrs. Wanda Cummons and in honor of Mrs. Grace Dolvin. This scholarship is presented to a young Christian lady (single or married) who has shown grace in God's eyes showing determination, dedication, and diligence in her walk for the Lord; and gives God all the glory for her accomplishments. This young lady will be entering into her second or third year of Bible college with success and completion in mind for the future ministry endeavor that the Lord will lead her into.

W. Jay Dolvin Ministerial Scholarship

The *W. Jay Dolvin Ministerial Scholarship* is awarded by the Massillon Baptist College in memory of Dr. W. Jay Dolvin. Dr. Dolvin faithfully served as an associate pastor, professor, and a tremendous overall leader in the ministries of the Massillon Baptist Temple. He proved himself faithful in the position God placed him in for 48 years. This scholarship is presented to an upcoming third year male student who desires to serve the Lord in a position similar to that of Dr. Dolvin. A student who is willing to assist his pastor, lead in the areas allotted him, and faithfully serve in any capacity needed.

The Dr. Jack Haggerty Memorial Scholarship

The *Dr. Jack Haggerty Memorial Scholarship* is awarded by the Village Baptist Temple in North Canton, OH, Dr. Phil Clayton pastor, in memory of Dr. Jack Haggerty. Dr. Haggerty faithfully served in the ministry for 50 years and served as the pastor of Village Baptist Temple for 42 of those years. He was a professor at Massillon Baptist College for 15 years. This scholarship is presented to an upcoming third year student who has been called to preach and has fulfilled the requirements of preaching God's Word.

Pastoral Ministry

This degree is designed for those planning to do the work of a pastor, assistant pastor or evangelist. It requires a total of 96 semester hours at MBC and/or another approved college, plus a thesis on a Bible or theological topic approved by the Academic Dean and a passing grade on the Doctrinal Comprehension Exam. A candidate for this degree must have attended MBC at least part-time during his senior year, and must have completed at least 36 credit hours in residence at MBC.

This pastor's course attempts to fully equip a man to carry on the work of a pastor. A student will be taught how to build a church and Sunday school, how to perform the duties of a pastor, and how to resolve problems which will confront him. He is given a thorough knowledge of the Bible and is taught how to apply its precepts and principles.

Because I Timothy 3:2 states that a pastor must be ". . .the husband of one wife. . .," Massillon Baptist College does not award this degree to women or divorced men.

This basic course introduces the student to the science of interpreting the Scriptures. Various phases and methods of understanding interpretation are examined and discussed.		
DR 231	DANIEL / REVALATION	3
This course introduces the student to Daniel's prophetic discourse along with the prophetic utterance of John in the Book of the Revelation. These two books are closely tied and by studying them together the student will be able to see God's plan for our age.		
LCM 111, 112	FUNDAMENTALS OF LOCAL CHURCH MUSIC 1 & 2	2
This course deals with the basics of music that will help the pastor or other local church workers who are not music majors. The student will be taught the basics of notes, staffs, music terminology and other fundamentals of music. Students will learn basic conducting of a choir and congregational song leading. Emphasis will also be given to the Contemporary Christian Music phenomenon and its beginning.		

HE 232 **HEBREWS** **3**
The student will receive an in-depth study of this book and its strong tie to the Old Testament and key doctrinal issues. Hebrews will bring forth the Old Testament teachings and how they are applied in the New Testament.

HB 332 **HISTORICAL BOOKS** **3**
This course will lay a foundation concerning the history of the Hebrews as they enter and occupy the piece of land known as Israel. The objectives are to provide the student with the chronology of these books, to equip the student with the ability to profit personally from these books, and to prepare the student with knowledge to teach and share with others the content of these books.

EJ 322 **I,II,III JOHN** **2**
This course consists of an exposition of the John's epistles.

LC 121, 122 **LIFE OF CHRIST 1 & 2** **4**
The objective of this course is that the student may have a foundational knowledge of Christ and His ministry. We begin with Christ in the eternal past, down through creation, the Old Testament Age, and then, Christ in His earthly life.
Background material covers the geographical and sociological background of Palestine. We will also cover the political, religious, and intellectual world in which Jesus lived.
During the second semester, we will cover Christ in the four Gospels. We begin with a broad, overall view of the four Gospel writers and the Gospels which they wrote. The birth of Christ, His infancy, and early childhood are covered from the four Gospels. We continue our studies with the three and one-half years of public ministry and conclude with the resurrection, appearances, and ascension of Christ.

MP 321 **MAJOR PROPHETS** **3**
The backgrounds and functions of the prophets of God and their individual messages are covered in detail. Attention is given to future events with profitable applications being made to the Christian

MP 322 **MINOR PROPHETS** **3**
A thorough study will be made of the prophets Hosea through Malachi and their prophecies.

NT 132 **NEW TESTAMENT SURVEY** **3**
A foundational course of the New Testament books in outline form. The study consists of primary characters and events, along with the spiritual truths set forth in each book.

OT 131	OLD TESTAMENT SURVEY	3
A foundational course of the Old Testament books in outline form. The study consists of primary characters and events, along with the spiritual truths set forth in each book.		
LP 231, 232	PAULINE EPISTLES 1 & 2	4
The student will be given a working understanding of the Pauline Epistles that will enable the student to take biblical principles and make a practical application to every day life. Special emphasis will be given to the book of Romans in the first semester, and Galatians the second semester.		
PE 111, 112	PERSONAL EVANGELISM 1 & 2	2
This course is designed to enable the student to lead a person to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ. Class discussion will be in the “how to” areas. Scripture will be memorized and students will be shown how to locate certain scripture passages for various situations.		
PT 221, 222	PENTATEUCH 1 & 2	4
This study will center on the first five books of the Old Testament, the Books of Moses. The student will gain insight into Creation, the Patriarchs, the Priesthood, the Exodus and the Tabernacle.		
PB 331	POETICAL BOOKS	3
This course will reveal to the student the blessing and wisdom that lay within these precious books. They will see the comfort of the Hand of God in time of suffering with Job; the praise and worship within the Psalms; that all is vanity apart from God in Ecclesiastes; the fear of the Lord in Proverbs; and the love of the Lord in Song of Solomon.		
PB 331	POETICAL BOOKS	3
This course will reveal to the student the blessing and wisdom that lay within these precious books. They will see the comfort of the Hand of God in time of suffering with Job; the praise and worship within the Psalms; that all is vanity apart from God in Ecclesiastes; the fear of the Lord in Proverbs; and the love of the Lord in Song of Solomon.		
CP 122	CHURCH PLANTING	2
This course gives the student the basis of planting a Baptist Church. The study includes a brief look at the history of a Baptist Church along with the Biblical principles we find in Scripture which identifies us with the church that Jesus built. The practical application is then made to how this is done in these modern days.		

DEPARTMENT OF THEOLOGY

Course Number	Course Name	Semester Hours
BD 131, 132	BIBLE DOCTRINE 1 & 2	6
This course offers the student a basic foundational knowledge of the major themes of Scripture. It will serve as a survey and foundation to further theological studies. Emphasis is made on the study of the Word of God and contextualization.		
PT 311, 312	PRACTICAL THEOLOGY 1 & 2	2
This course covers many of the practical and basic studies regarding the Divine call, especially when establishing and organizing a local church. The “how to” in performing weddings, baptisms, and funerals will be presented. A systematic study of the cardinal doctrines of the faith is emphasized. (For men only) PREREQUISITES: Bible Doctrine 1 & 2 (BD 131, 132).		

DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS

Course Number	Course Name	Semester Hours
MS 121, 122	MISSIONS I-A & I-B	4
<p>The intent of Missions I is to gain practical insight into missions. This course will cover materials by those who personally received and accepted the call to missions, and insights from a pastor's heart concerning the "homeland" effort to support missions...both prayerfully and financially.</p> <p>The student will learn the biblical basis for missions and the motives and means behind it, as well as a history of missions, which has led to the continuation of missions in today's fundamental local churches. The student will gain insight as to the call, preparation, and sending of missionaries today through the local New Testament church.</p>		
MS 231, 232	MISSIONS II-A & II-B	4
<p>This course is designed for the missionary student and will establish a clear understanding of true missions in the heart and mind of every believer. Potential missionary students will learn from veteran missionaries. For those called to missions, it will be important training in spiritual and cultural survival.</p> <p>This course will help the future missionary to better relate to the needs and pressures of missionaries. The student will become familiar with the life of the called missionary from the examination of one's heart to the effective ministering on the field and learning the language. The student will be presented with practical experiences of missionaries in various types of missionary callings. The student will learn to deal with stress, language study, and many other practical lessons. PREREQUISITE: Missions I</p>		
MS 331, 332	MISSIONS III-A & III-B	6
<p>This course is designed for the student who knows the Lord is leading him or her to the mission field. The student will learn how to lead those to Christ who are in cultic religions. Vocabulary and customs of various religions will be studied. Much emphasis will be placed upon Islam, Hinduism, and Buddhism while Secularism and the New Age movement will also be studied. This course meets twice a week, but students will earn three credits due to extra class assignments. PREREQUISITE: Missions II</p>		

DEPARTMENT OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Course Number	Course Name	Semester Hours
BE 2221, 222	BIBLICAL ETHICS 1 & 2	4
This course will deal with alternatives and issues. Biblical thinking is examined and brought to the forefront in the decision-making process.		
CO 221, 222	CHURCH OUTREACH MINISTRIES 1 & 2	4
This course covers various local church ministries. The student will study the history of Sunday school as well of the operation and establishment of the Sunday School. The student will further study the operation and establishing of the junior church, Wednesday evening youth programs, bus ministry, and VBS. Students will be required to create and present materials for use in these local church ministries. This course replaces Sunday School Administration SS 221, 222 PREREQUISITE: None		
YM 321, 322	YOUTH MINISTRIES 1 & 2	4
This course will present its students with a workable “head knowledge” of youth ministry. Students will be taught the basics of a biblical youth ministry philosophy, leadership, and organization; as well as relational skills, preaching/teaching skills, and counseling skills. The greatest lessons, however, are taught by the “school of life”; therefore, there will be out-of-class assignments, which will increase the students’ confidence and facilitate their learning.		
CO 321, 322	CHURCH FINANCIAL & LEGAL POLICIES 1 & 2	4
This course is designed to help the pastor in various aspects of church and personal finances. Students will be taught in areas such as taxes, debt management, systems of financial tracking, laws governing the local church, and payroll in the ministry setting. Students will learn precepts of financial freedom and financial responsibility.		
LM 221	LADIES MINISTRY	2
Ladies Ministry in a local church is a place to see women grow in the Lord, using our gifts and talents, and to be equipped to serve the Lord. We will learn why it is important to lead a ladies ministry in a way that promotes all areas of a Christian life. Studying the women of the Bible, organizing small projects, and activities will be a part of this exciting class. (For women only)		
BC 331, 332	BIBLICAL COUNSELING 1 & 2	4
This course is designed to give students the tools for understanding temperament and its relationship to behavior, as well as how to use Scripture for counseling in such matters as childrearing, adolescent problems, drugs, marriage, guilt, depression, and other areas faced by Christian workers.		

DEPARTMENT OF LANGUAGE

Course Number	Course Name	Semester Hours
EN 121, 122	STUDYING SCRIPTURE WITH GRAMMAR 1 & 2	4
The first semester of this course deals with the basic principles of current grammar and usage. The second semester focuses on applying these language skills to college writing. It is our intent that each student will complete this course with a good, working knowledge of English grammar and punctuation usage.		
HO 321	HOMILETICS	2
This course is designed to aid the God-called preacher in the preparation and delivery of sermons. Methods of study and outlining are combined with practical and helpful lessons. (For men only)		
SL 321, 322	SIGN LANGUAGE 1 & 2	4
This course will be an introduction to the Deaf culture, alphabet, and American Sign Language. Students will learn interpreting skills and how to work with deaf children and adults. This is a practical course in the use of American Sign Language that will aid the student in a ministry at home or on the mission field.		
SN 231, 232	SPANISH	6
This class not only introduces the students to the Spanish language but sets forth the foundation and builds on it which includes: grammar and its structure, vocabulary, memorization of Bible verses in Spanish, and learning some hymns and choruses in Spanish. This class gives the student the opportunity now to prepare to communicate through reading, writing, speaking, and singing in Spanish.		
SP 221,222	SPEECH	4
By using a combination of written and oral assignments, the student will learn the proper way of both developing and presenting a speech. Areas that will be covered are: effective public speaking, analysis, supporting your topic, delivering your speech effectively, etc. All students will be expected to participate in class discussions, including positive critique of fellow students.

CD 321	CONDUCTING	2
This course outlines the responsibilities of the conductor to the entire ensemble, as well as individual members. The basics of conducting are presented along with exercises to develop a fluent conducting technique.		
CM 121, 122	CHURCH MUSIC 1-A & 1-B	4
This course presents the biblical foundation and philosophy of music in its practical use in the church, home, and devotional life. A study will be made of the "Language of Music," its rudiments, and how idioms and styles influence the church today.		
CM 221, 222	CHURCH MUSIC 2-A & 2-B	4
This course presents the scriptural, foundational truths about music and its use in worship. Consideration will be given to the importance of selecting appropriate music for the church choir. A study will be made of the choral experience, its historical influence, the role of the conductor, the principles of vocal production, classification of voices, diction, and rehearsal techniques. PREREQUISITES: Church Music 1-A & 1-B (CM 121, 122)		
ET 321, 322	SIGHT SINGING/EAR TRAINING 1 & 2	4
Students will learn techniques in hearing pitch and identifying sounds. They will also learn to read and interpret music scores without the use of a piano.		
HY 312	HYMNOLOGY	1
This is a study of the historical development of hymnology. Included in the course is the study of the backgrounds of many of the great hymns of faith and the contributions of significant individuals.		
KH 321, 322	KEYBOARD HARMONY 1 & 2	4
The student will learn to use the fundamental harmony studied in Music Theory and Music Harmony in a fluent and practical way. Melodies will be harmonized with a wide variety of accompaniment styles. Transposition, modulation, improvisation, and arranging will also be studied. PREREQUISITES: Music Theory 1 & 2 (MT 231, 232)		

Course Number	Course Name	Semester Hours
MH 331, 332	MUSIC HARMONY 1 & 2	6
This course continues to build on the foundation laid in Music Theory. The student will be able to use the knowledge gained to effectively write and arrange compositions. PREREQUISITES: Music Theory 1 & 2 (MT 231, 232)		
MT 231, 232	MUSIC THEORY 1 & 2	6
This course introduces the student to the principles and procedures upon which music composition is founded. The course begins with a review of the basic fundamentals and continues on to study chord constructions, chord successions, harmonic analysis, part-writing, melodic construction, and the characteristic elements of successful melodic writing. PREREQUISITES: Church Music 1-A & 1-B (CM 121, 122)		
VC 111	VOICE CLASS	1
The student will leave with a basic understanding of how to produce pleasing vocal tones with proper color, timbre, and interpretation, so as to effectively communicate the truth of the Word of God. (I Cor. 14:15b) ". . .I will sing with the spirit, and I will sing with the understanding also."

IC 121, 122	INTRTODUCTION TO COMPUTERS & KEYBOARDING 1 & 2	4
This course is designed for the student to enhance basic computer and keyboarding skills. Students will efficiently search and utilize the Internet for research, education, retail, ministry, etc. Students will create, edit, and format basic documents and spreadsheets. A laptop computer is required for every class period.		
TM 221, 222	MINISTRY TECHNOLOGY & SOCIAL MEDIA 1&2	4
This course is designed to help the student learn intermediate computer skills and Yearbook design. We will study biblical views of internet uses and social media. We will learn to edit and manage ministry websites. Students will create ministry-related papers, letters, flyers, cards, etc. Students will create ministry-related brochures & videos. A laptop computer is required for every class period.		
OP 231, 232	OFFICE PRACTICES & PROCEDURES 1&2	6
The students will learn instruction in the ethics, protocol, etiquette, and demeanor of a church secretary. Students are taught how to build an interface for the database from forms, complete with combo boxes; create reports for printing and sharing; and take steps to maintain your database.

- Explore the functions of the database Navigation pane.
- Recognize the fundamentals of entering data when using Access.
- Identify the necessary steps when importing a table when using Access.
- Break down the fundamentals of filtering and sorting table data in Access.
- Identify the method utilized when building queries in Design view.
- Determine the role of forms in Access.
- Examine all of the elements involved in maintaining a database in Access.
- Explore how to properly protect an Access database with a password.

During the student's second year, he/she will be required to complete 64-68 hours of field experience in one or more of the offices of the Massillon Baptist Temple ministries (or, occasionally, at the student's home church). This may be done two (2) hours per week for two semesters, or four (4) hours per week for one semester. This course will allow a student to participate in the actual day-to-day operations of a church and its various ministries, under the tutelage of experienced office workers.

While all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in His sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death.

OF THE LAST THINGS

We believe that the Lord Jesus Christ will return before His millennial reign to raise the dead in Christ and will change their vile bodies like unto His glorious body along with the living saints, and together all of the saved will be caught up to meet the Lord in the air; that He will pour out His wrath upon the earth, and will return to the earth in power and great glory to set up His kingdom; that after His millennial reign the lost will be raised and judged according to their works and cast into the Lake of Fire forever;³ that there will be new heavens and a new earth wherein dwelleth righteousness.⁴

OF THE DEVIL OR SATAN

We believe that Satan was once holy, and enjoyed heavenly honors, but through pride and ambition to be as the Almighty, fell and drew after him a host of angels; that he is now the malignant prince of the power of the air, and the unholy god of this world. We hold him to be man's great tempter, the enemy of God and His Christ, the accuser of the saints, the author of all false religions, the chief power back of the present apostasy; the lord of the anti-Christ and the author of all the powers of darkness—destined, however, to be finally defeated at the hands of God's Son, and to the judgment of an eternal justice in hell, a place prepared for him and his angels.

OF THE CREATION

We believe in the Genesis account of creation, and that it is to be accepted literally, and not allegorically or figuratively; that man was created directly in God's own image and after His own likeness; that man's creation was not a matter of evolution or evolutionary change of species, or development through interminable periods of time from lower to higher forms; that all animal and vegetable life was made directly, and God's established law was—they should bring forth only "after their kind."

OF THE VIRGIN BIRTH

We believe that Jesus Christ was begotten of the Holy Ghost in a miraculous manner; born of Mary, a virgin, as no other man was ever born or can ever be born of woman and that He is born the Son of God, and God the Son.

OF MISSIONS

The command to give the gospel to the world is clear and unmistakable, and this Commission was given to the churches.

Matthew 28:18-20: “And Jesus came and spake unto them, saying, All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth. Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world. Amen.”

Mark 16:15: “And he said unto them, Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature.”

John 20:21: “...As my Father hath sent me, even so send I you.”

Acts 1:8: “But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth.”

OF THE GRACE OF GIVING

Scriptural giving is one of the fundamentals of the faith.

II Corinthians 8:7: “Therefore as ye abound in every thing, in faith, and utterance, and knowledge, and in all diligence, and in your love to us, see that ye abound in this grace also.”

We are commanded to bring gifts into the storehouse (common treasury of the church) upon the first day of the week (Mal. 3:10).

I Corinthians 16:2: “Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store, as God hath prospered him, that there be no gatherings when I come.”

Under grace we give, and do not pay, the tithe—Abraham “gave [a tenth part] of all” (Gen. 14:20). “...Abraham GAVE a tenth [of the spoils]” (Heb. 7:2). And this was four hundred years before the law, and is confirmed in the New Testament. Jesus said concerning the tithe, “...These ought ye to have done...” (Matt. 23:23).

We are commanded to bring the tithe into the common treasury of the church.

Leviticus 27:30: “...The tithe...is the LORD’S....”

Malachi 3:10: “Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the LORD of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it.”

In the New Testament it was the common treasury of the church.

Acts 4:34-35,37: “...And brought the prices of the things that were sold, and laid them down at the apostles’ feet...Having land, sold it, and brought the money, and laid it at the apostles’ feet.”
