- 1. Retreat: following discussion with both the general membership at this day's Zoom meeting, and also the Board members, it was moved by Pam, and seconded by Margo, that we postpone the retreat for another year. 2021 Calendar Update



The wall hanging is made using closed coiling over a 1/8" hemp cord, and it measures about 25"W X 16"H. I call it *Interwoven Systems* (you usually have to have a title for exhibits!) I use various types of thread including waxed linen, cotton, and silk coiled over the hemp.

This piece was juried into the *Yarn, Rope, String* exhibit which appeared in the fall issue of the national magazine *Fiber Art Now.*

Spring Series

Since we are not able to meet in person this spring, we are developing a series of talks on how to design baskets.

So you want to make a basket and you may have some materials in your stash.

What to do with them and how do you know you have enough?

Question #A

What kind of basket do you need and what is it's purpose?


or maybe

Question #B

I have lots of 5/8" flat reed, what can I make with it?

It seems rather like the chicken and the egg, which came first. Probably need to answer both questions, before embarking on your project. The illustrations from Lyn Siler's book, give a good description of determining material measurements for making a flat reed basket. It really comes down to the math.

If you are carrying tools or books, you will want a sturdier basket, than if you are filling it with yarn.
Size of materials and utility are definitely linked.




How to Measure Your Own Staked Baskets

This is a simple mathematical process. Determine the size basket you want; for example, let's make a 10 x 16 x 6-inch basket. To get a length measurement, add the base length (16 inches) and each side depth (6 inches on each side or 12 inches), and then add 6 inches (3 inches on each side) to tuck in at the top: 16 + 12 (2 sides) + 6 (tucking) = 34 inches.

To get the width measurement, add the base width (10 inches) and each side depth (6 inches) with the same 6 inches for tucking: 10 + 12 (two sides) + 6 = 28 inches.

The only thing left to determine is what size reed to use, and therefore, how many of each to cut. Draw off the area and use a ruler to figure out how many pieces of each to use. Don't forget to add spaces between stakes (figure 4).

How to Measure Spokes for a Round Basket



Simple! Determine the diameter of the base, 8 inches in this case. Add to that the height you want, 4 inches in this case, and then add the 6 inches for tucking in: 8 + 8 (4 inches for each side) + 6 = 22 inches. How many stakes to be cut will be determined by the size reed you use and how close together you want the spokes. You can use more stakes and start weaving closer in to the center if you taper the center, as in the drawing (figure 5).

Coming in September



Apple in the Pine (Material fee—\$85)

Level: Intermediate / Advanced

The base begins with a vintage spigot handle, threaded with Cedar bark. Twine the base with waxed cotton cord and iris leaves to upright. Using thinner Cedar and wider Willow bark learn the fun and challenging Japanese knot weave. A basic braid track border completes the piece. (4" x 4")





Fluted Constellation (Material fee—\$75)


Level: Intermediate / Advanced

Beginning with a unique threaded base of Willow and Cedar barks; weave this sweet and functional basket with an interesting twist. The fluted sides and rim are resultant of a weave change to the basket. The braided Cedar rim enhances the overall flow. $(6'' \times 6'' \times 2'')$

Double Helix (Material fee—\$85)

Level: Intermediate

Students will heat fold and stitch a hexagonal Birch bowl with split Spruce roots. Next a spiraling liner of hexagonal to bias woven Willow or Cedar bark (or a combination) will be added. The braided rim of Cedar bark was taught to me by Dawn Walden. (6" x 3")







Barks on the Bias (Material fee-\$100)

Level: Intermediate

Students will learn to weave this non-traditional basket with thin Birch bark. Overlays of Poplar and Hemlock barks will be added for color and textural notes. The faux braided rim was taught to me by master basket maker Dawn Walden and is executed with Cedar bark. A hanger handle is sewn and installed with fine brass washers to secure the stitching. $(7" \times 6" \times 5")$
