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First Lady's Summit on Children's Mental Health in Carson City

The First Lady's Children's Mental Health Summit, held in Carson City on April 24, 2013, featured guest speakers from Northern, Rural, and Southern Nevada whose expertise lies in services available to children throughout the state of Nevada.

Nevada's First Lady Kathleen Sandoval has a background working with families and youth as the program director for *Children's Cabinet*. She has first hand experience dealing with the issues that face Nevada's children. A Review Journal article written about the First Lady indicated, at the time her husband Brian Sandoval was elected governor, she had been working for 11 years with the agency to improve the lives of children in the Reno area. Her passion for working with children has not diminished, as evidenced by the summit held to address the needs facing families and children throughout the state.

Among the invited speakers, Jacqueline Harris, Executive Director of Bridge Counseling, addressed issues that present in the Juvenile Justice System for adolescents. Ms. Harris focused on the "Living Clean" program designed in collaboration with Clark County Juvenile Justice Services, Bridge Counseling & Judge William Voy. This is a program that grew out of a need to address the multiple issues facing youth in the system and need for family involvement.

Students from Desert Oasis High Donate to Bridge



Principal Emil Wozniak, class sponsor Tina Fulks, and students from Desert Oasis High School present checks to five nonprofits through the Public Education Foundation. Bridge received a \$1000 award to enhance the meeting space for adolescents receiving treatment in our "Living Clean" program. Their generous donation will also provide snacks.

It's seven o'clock in the morning and Desert Oasis High students are quietly awaiting instruction from their instructor Tina Fulks. She will guide the We R Community class into the world of philanthropy. Ms. Fulks is training the next generation of community action leaders by showing them how to navigate through the world of non profits. She will help them understand their function in society and how they are funded. No easy task, as there are so many details to be covered and addressed before the class must decide who will receive an award based on very specific criteria.

Through an initiative of the Public Education Foundation and the generosity of the Southern Highlands Foundation, nine schools in the Clark County School District are each given \$5000 to disburse among invited non profits that are finalists in the selection process. It is a grueling process for the students to eliminate many worthy causes that are in need of funds for special projects.

The We R Community students choose non profits that focus on substance abuse treatment, homelessness, human trafficking/prostitution, child abuse, poverty, and suicide. The selection process begins in November 2012 with an invitation to selected non profits to submit a grant application. The process culminates with the Grant Awards Ceremony which was held on May 15, 2013.

Adolescent Living Clean Program

Bridge Counseling's "Living Clean" program has begun! This program provides direct services to the youth of Las Vegas who are involved in the Juvenile Justice System (JJS). In collaboration with the probation department of the JJS and Judge William Voy, Bridge provides outpatient substance abuse treatment services to adolescents under the age of 18.

The Department of Juvenile Justice Services (DJJS) provides a meeting room at their offices near Stewart and Lamb for Bridge counselors to see adolescent clients. With Bridge clinicians onsite at DJJS, clients aren't faced with the challenge of finding transportation to meet treatment requirements. Transportation issues are often a barrier to successful treatment.

"Living Clean" ties together the collaborative efforts of probation officers, clinicians and the court system to provide case management for adolescents in the program. An additional goal of the program is to address the multiple issues facing youth (see bulleted list below) in the system and need for family involvement.

- Legal Problems possession, under the influence, burglary, domestic violence, truancy, school expulsion, & larceny
- Family Issues parent/child conflict, parental substance abuse, parental incarceration, divorce, single parents, poverty
- Bullying, depression, anxiety, PTSD, behavioral problems
- Past history of abuse sexual, physical & neglect

Bridge treats 1500 clients every month. Individuals and families seeking treatment can access services through court programs, referral agencies and self-referral.

Nevada's Big Give is a Success

Headquartered at Planet Hollywood's Miracle Mile Shops on the Las Vegas Strip, on April 25, 2013, Nevada's Big Give hosted several celebrities and entertainers who endorsed and supported the second annual, one-day, online, "Give Where You Live" donation drive for Nevada nonprofits. Although the one million dollar goal was not reached, generous Nevadans donated \$551,142 to local and state-wide agencies. This amount exceeds donations received during the first Big Give in 2011.

According to NV Big Give website, "Nevadans came together on Nevada's Big Give to make donations to as many nonprofits as possible in 24 hours. On April 25th, 2013, from 12:00 a.m. to 11:59 p.m., supporters of Nevada nonprofits went to the Nevada's Big Give website, connected with causes they care about, discovered new causes, and made tax-deductible donations. The donations are staying local and helping our Nevada nonprofits provide much needed services throughout The Silver State."

Thank you to all the donors who contributed to Bridge. We received \$1025 in donations from our generous supporters. These funds will provide treatment services to clients unable to pay for counseling services and for their children as well. With a focus on family treatment, Bridge's goal is family preservation and child abuse prevention.
