GOLDEN CHARMS IS BACK!



With Fall upon us, it is time to energetically reengage our shared-life as The People of GOD in Christ-Jesus. Of, course, we make a push to do this every year at this time (rallying together for "Back -To" Sunday and reigniting standard "program year" activities such as Adult Discussion Groups).

But for 2019/2020, this renewal of commitment to regular church activity takes on special significance (and power, we pray). This year, throughout Autumn, we will be focusing on our recently adopted Mission and Vision Statements. In worship, committee meetings, Bible Study, and elsewhere, we will be exploring what these statements mean, what their biblical justification is, and how we might utilize them, operationally, to both assess our ministry and chart a course for the future of RUCC.

"Those who fail to plan, plan to fail."

Collectively meditating upon these new statements and seeking to shape our ministry according to them, is one way we can actively pursue our **Purpose** as a congregation (and as the individuals which make-up this local faith-family). And doing so is vitally important for the day, age, and cultural climate we live in. Churches who have no reason for being -no common and driving point and/or goal(s) for their existence are statistically far more likely to close. Research indicates that those religious communities which are vibrant, stable, and/or growing have a commitment to a clear, central (and Scripturally-informed) understanding of why they exist.

To illustrate these points, I want to share the following excerpts from an article by Thom Rainer (president & CEO of Lifeway Christian Resources, and a noted church vitality/redevelopment-&-revitalization expert)...

"Churches in the United States have entered a new season of ministry. Gone are the days when church attendance was a societal norm. For most of our American history, cultural and technological change was gradual, sufficiently paced for churches to lag only five to 10 years. Now churches are lagging 20 and 30 years as the speed of change increases dramatically. To



many people, the church seems irrelevant (...) Between 6,000 and 10,000 churches in the U.S. are dying each year. That means around 100-200 churches will close this week. The pace will accelerate unless our congregations make some dramatic changes (...) So, what can churches do to bring about much-needed revitalization? We must remember our purpose. Many of the people in our churches have lost the biblical understanding of what it means to be part of the body of Christ. Church members need to be reminded that God placed us in churches to pray for and love one another, to proclaim and teach God's Word, and to take the gospel to our neighbors and the nations. We must become houses of prayer. Stated simply, we are doing too much in our own power. Our churches are often busy, but we are not doing the business of God. Revitalized churches have a desperate and prayerful dependence on God. We must cease seeing the church as a place of comfort and stability in the midst of rapid change. Certainly, God's truth is unchanging. We do find comfort and stability in that reality. But your church may need to change methods and approaches to better meet the needs of those you are trying to reach. Church programs and human traditions often become places of misdirected comfort. "We've never done it that way before" is a death declaration. We must learn to be uncomfortable in the world if we are to make a difference. We must emphasize evangelism and discipleship. We have been given the Great Commission to make disciples and build God's kingdom. To fulfill God's mission, Christians must go out into the community, love their neighbors, and reach the lost with the Gospel..."

Now, I'm fairly confident that none of the above sounds surprising to anyone who has heard me rant and rave over the years, but, hopefully, reading it from a nationally-renowned leader in the field adds some import and respectability to what I've conveyed previously. And, I pray, that this newsletter entry serves as a bit of encouragement for the year(s) ahead: that in reflecting on these things, we might all come to accept some of the challenging realities all churches are facing, while also having passionate confidence in the roadmap The LORD has been outlining for us.

CONSISTORY JULY 1, 2019, MEETING

FINANCIAL: Debbie Ciesielczyk reported that finances for the Church had a shortfall in the budget of \$10,000. A discussion was held regarding this shortfall, and it was decided to wait until the next month and look at the budget again.

Because of the shortfall it was mentioned that we may look at some fundraising. Another suggestion was to possibly look at endowments. The UCC Headquarters has some good materials on how to go about making suggestions to the congregation regarding endowment funds.

Another idea was to look at our Church Parking lot as a designated area for campers and trailers of relatives, friends, etc. who may be staying in the area with family or relatives to be able to use the lot for parking the vehicles. A fee would be charged to park in the lot. The problem that we would encounter now is that there is no electricity in the garage for the hook ups. This idea will be further investigated and discussed.

MAINTENANCE: Larry Bates. There are several concerns for the Maintenance Committee to consider:

- 1. It has been discussed about the unsanitary conditions of water fountains. Approval was given to the Maintenance Committee to take out the water fountain in the Church.
- 2. The water at the Church needs to be tested to make sure it is free of any harmful materials. The Maintenance Committee was asked to contact the Stark County Health Dept. to set up an appointment to have the water tested.
- 3. The subject of electricity in the garage was discussed. The Maintenance Committee was asked to list what needs to be done, and report back to Consistory next month as to what the needs are.



FINANCE AND STEWARDSHIP UPDATE



As you can see from the graph, our available balance in our general fund account continues to decrease. As of the end of July we are down to a balance in the general fund of \$17,274.53. The Finance and Stewardship Committee thanks everyone for their faithful and generous donations, but as you can see we are not keeping up with our expenses. We are continually trying to find ways to generate additional funds with fundraising ideas, but this is only a temporary fix to the problem. Do you have a good idea for a fundraiser? Are you promoting our church space to friends and neighbors for rentals? Do you know anyone who is looking for outside space to hold a swap meet or an outdoor event? We have the perfect place. The committee is also taking a serious look at our budgeted expenses. We need to have a budget that we can maintain in the future and yet still serve our Core Values, Mission and Vision Statements.

In order to keep the congregation informed, actual monthly giving totals will be printed in the Messenger the first Sunday of the month for general fund and capital improvement funds. Actual totals will be compared with monthly amounts needed to meet the budget. Keep in mind these totals will be for the previous month (example: September's Messenger will show the actual giving for August).
