Title: A Beginner's Guide to the Fund Balance with Treasury (FBWT) Problem

The Department of Defense's (DoD's) struggle with auditability is well documented. Among the many problems, one material weakness continues to stand out: DoD's Fund Balance with Treasury (FBWT) issues. The obvious question being, if the U.S. Treasury is providing an agency an exact and finite amount of money to spend, then how could the agency not know how or where it expended its funds? If a department is given \$500 (or \$500 billion; the only difference is a few extra zeros), at the end of the year it should have spent... \$500. So how do these FBWT differences keep occurring year after year? That is the rhetorical question we will briefly explore.

As financial managers in DoD, we field these questions a lot. We have had to explain the problem to multiple new administration officials and new hires over the years. I'd like to share the anecdote we use to explain it for any of the new ASMC members we have coming into the fold.

Picture yourself throwing a birthday party for 10 six-year olds at a massive arcade. There's pinball, skeeball, and hotshot basketball. A huge cafeteria with pizza and burgers and french fries and chicken tenders and all the most unhealthy food children love. There's video games with joysticks, games with steering wheels, games with hammers... and of course a massive ticket redemption area with every type of prize and candy imaginable, where the partygoers can redeem any tickets won. You give each six-year old \$10 and tell them they have an hour to eat anything they want, play anything they want and redeem any tickets they win for any prize. The only requirement, you tell the children, is they have to tell you exactly what they spent the \$10 on and what they got in return.

At the end of the hour, all the children line up to see you. Partygoers #1 and #2 tell you they spent all \$10 on a quarter-pusher machine, which does not give tickets. Child #2 and #3 tell you they spent \$4 on pizza and \$4 on a milkshake. Partiers #4 and #5 say they spent \$2 on pretzels, \$8 on pinball, won 20 tickets, and redeemed the tickets for two secret decoder rings. Child #6 and #7 spent all \$10 on a two-player game winning 40 tickets, but wanted to save the tickets for next time they visit the arcade to get a better prize. Partygoer #8 spent \$4 on pizza, \$2 on a quarter pusher with no tickets, and \$3 on pinball to get 10 tickets, then gave their last dollar to #9 who needed an extra dollar for one more "Continue" while playing Dance Dance Revolution. Then #9 shows up lugging a massive remote-controlled airplane worth 75,000 tickets that you know they couldn't possibly have earned in an hour.

The anecdote of the kids-in-an-arcade tale is simply that in today's world, you are the U.S. Treasury and the children are the DoD and its Military Departments and Defense Agencies. There are so many mitigating factors including the different types of purchases, the sharing and exchanging of dollars, the second and third order effects of dollars-to-tickets-to-decoder rings, etc. that it makes it nearly impossible to reconcile your \$100. Without a centralized source of control requiring the purchase details and purchaser identity, the difference between what you handed out and what came back will always be irreconcilable.

It's for this reason that the agencies using Treasury-Direct Disbursing (TDD), or report daily to Treasury (vice monthly), have almost no FBWT differences. With the TDD model applied to the arcade anecdote, you are still the U.S. Treasury, but now the partygoers have Rewards Cards that link directly to your account. In near real-time you can see how much is being spent at what games and which individual Rewards Card is doing the spending. How the Treasury disbursing model works and how it differs from the DoD disbursing model is fodder for another anecdote and article. However, the key takeaway remains: DoD is less than 10% TDD and its FBWT audit issues will continue to be a problem for the foreseeable future.

In summary, disbursing auditability and financial reporting in the DoD, as in life, gets more and more difficult the farther it gets away from the source. It's much easier to get back the \$50 you loaned your neighbor than it is to find and recoup it from your neighbor's daughter's niece's babysitter's second cousin. And if you made it this far and are still wondering what happened to partygoer #10... here he comes! Six months after the party he shows up saying he can't really remember what he spent it on, but he thinks it was probably on broccoli and brussel sprouts and a book on mindfulness. Sounds completely reasonable for a six-year old. Good luck with that reconciliation!

Using the Coast Guard's current Business Process Re-Engineering initiative as an example, Admiral Allan shared how the organization is leveraging metrics for actual performance to make decisions and address anecdotes which may not be accurate. This includes reduced processing times, hours saved, dollars saved, and survey results. A multi-year initiative, the Coast Guard continues to refine and enhance its financial business processes to meet operational demands.

RDML Allan provided an engaging overview of Financial Management operations and initiatives at the US Coast Guard. He highlighted their system modernization challenges, audit status and budget/fiscal outlook.

Mr. Constable is the principal advisor to the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Readiness on the readiness of U.S Armed Forces. He manages the policies and programs designed to assure the preparedness of the United States Military, to engage the missions assigned by the President and the Secretary of Defense. He oversees the Defense Readiness Reporting System and the Readiness Recovery Framework, used to enable the Military Services' readiness recovery planning and inform future readiness requirements. Mr. Constable also shares responsibility for the policy and oversight of force training and education, Defense language programs, operational safety, and the Occupational Health of over 2.7 million Department of Defense Military and civilian employees.

Mr. Constable entered the Senior Executive Service in 2015 as the Associate Director for Military Operations in the Office of the Under Secretary of Defense (Comptroller), where he served as a senior representative and principle advisor for the Services' operation and Maintenance activities to include military readiness, Combatant Commands, Working Capital Fund operations, and all DoD civilian pay. In 2018, he returned to his Army roots as the Senior Advisor for Army Intelligence Resources, including the Military and National Intelligence Programs (MIP and NIP). Previously, Mr. Constable served as the Assistant Chief of Staff (G8) for the United States Army, Africa, in Vicenza, Italy, where he was the senior financial manager and primary resource integrator for Army military and theater security cooperation objectives in Africa.

Mr. Constable is a retired Soldier, having enlisted in the Army in 1987 and later commissioned as an officer in the Field Artillery; he retired from active duty in 2008. He received Master's Degrees in Business Administration and Public Administration from Syracuse University, and a Graduate Certificate in Conflict Resolution from The Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs. His awards include the Legion of Merit and the Superior Civilian Service Award, and he is a proud recipient of the Leonard F. Keenan Award for Distinguished Service.



While most candidates in the CDFM program are civilian or military/reserve members of the Department of Defense, U.S. Coast Guard, U.S. Army, U.S. Air Force, U.S. Navy, U.S. Marine Corps or employees of defense contractors or suppliers, the CDFM program is open to <u>all candidates</u> who have a high school diploma (or equivalent) and meet the following work experience qualifications:

Have the required number of years of defense-related financial management experience outlined below:

- Two (2) years if you hold an Associate's degree or higher; or
- Three (3) years if you do not have a degree.

Do not have defense-related financial management experience, but can meet the following criteria outlined below:

- Four (4) years of Federal government-related financial management experience; and
- An Associate's degree or higher.

There are three steps involved with earning your CDFM:

- 1. Enroll in the CDFM Program. Your enrollment is valid for two (2) years, during which time you must take, and successfully pass, the three CDFM module examinations.
- 2. Submit Your Verification of Financial Management Experience Form. This form, which must be signed by a supervisor who can verify your work experience, must be returned to ASMC after enrolling in the CDFM program. You do not have to submit this form prior to taking a CDFM examination, but it is <u>required</u> prior to the awarding of the CDFM designation.
- 3. Purchase and Schedule the CDFM Examinations. Be sure to carefully and completely read the criteria associated with each testing option for the CDFM examinations. Failure to do so can result in the purchase of the wrong CDFM examination and/or the inability to test at your preferred location
