

Fr. Al's Ramblings...

Happy New Year! It's hard to believe we have just celebrated the liturgical seasons of Advent and Christmas and officially have entered the beautiful season of Ordinary Time. Let me explain what Ordinary Time really means in liturgical lingo.

Ordinary Time is called "ordinary" not because it is common but because the weeks of Ordinary Time are numbered or ordered. The Latin word *ordinalis*, refers to numbers in a series, stems from the Latin word ordo, from which we get the English word order. Thus, the numbered weeks of Ordinary Time in fact represent the ordered life of the Church—the period in which we live our lives neither in feasting (as in the Christmas and Easter seasons) or in more severe penance (as in Advent and Lent), but in watchfulness and expectation of the Second Coming of Christ. So, you see, for Catholics, Ordinary Time is the part of the year in which Christ, the Lamb of God, walks among us and transforms our lives. There's nothing "ordinary" about that!

The normal liturgical color for Ordinary Time is green. Green vestments and altar cloths have traditionally been associated with the time period in which the Church founded by the risen Christ and enlivened by the Holy Spirit began to grow and to spread the Gospel to all nations.

The Church year begins with Advent, followed immediately by the Christmas season. Ordinary Time begins on the Monday after the first Sunday after January 6. This first period of Ordinary Time runs until Ash Wednesday, when the liturgical season of Lent begins. The second period of Ordinary Time runs from the end of Easter until the First Sunday in Advent, when the liturgical year begins again.

If you think that was confusing; try and decipher this one. In most years, the Sunday after January 6 is the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. In countries such as the United States, however, where the celebration of Epiphany is transferred to Sunday, and if that Sunday is January 7 or 8, Epiphany is celebrated instead. As feasts of our Lord, both the Baptism of the Lord and Epiphany displace a Sunday in Ordinary Time. Thus, the first Sunday in the period of Ordinary Time is the Sunday that falls after the first week of Ordinary Time, which makes it the Second Sunday of Ordinary Time. WHEW, I think I got it.

Finally, in any given year, there are either 33 or 34 Sundays in Ordinary Time. Because Easter is a moveable feast, and thus the Lent and Easter seasons "float" from year to year, the number of Sundays in each period of Ordinary Time varies from the other period as well as from year to year.

I pray I haven't confused you too much with all this but, I think after an Aspirin and a little nap you'll feel much better about all that green in church.
