





# 'Cue Tips

long Memorial Day weekend reignites our annual love affair with barbe-

Never mind that you put away the grill last fall without properly cleaning it. And you might as well brush aside those reports about carcinogens in grilled foods. It's the unofficial start of summer and grill we must!

If you're new to the grill, or if you just want some brush-up advice, here are some pointers.

Always grill foods on a clean, oiled rack. Preheat the barbecue with the rack in place. Once the rack is very hot, use a metal brush to scrape the rack clean. Then wipe off the rack with an old towel dipped in cooking oil.

on a hot rack.

Direct and indirect cooking are the two ways to grill food properly. The direct method, similar to broiling, means the food is cooked directly over the heat source. For even cooking, food should be 2 pounds boneless beef turned, with tongs, once halfway through the grilling time.

The indirect, covered method is similar to roasting, but with the added benefits of that grilled tex- 1 cup ketchup ture, flavor and appearance.

Always cook burgers to 160°F, 1/2 cup water turning occasionally with a spatula, 3 tablespoons packed brown but no pressing!



Always place foods to be grilled medium rare, 160°F for medium doneness; for chicken, 180°F.

### WESTERN **GRILLED STEAKS**

chuck shoulder steaks or top round steaks, cut 1-inch thick Barbecue Sauce:

1/2 cup cider vinegar

sugar

For steaks, cook to 145°F for 1 tablespoon Worcestershire

teaspoon hot pepper sauce

In a small saucepan, combine all sauce ingredients; bring to boil. Reduce heat; simmer 10 minutes. Reserve 1/2 cup sauce for brushing on steaks while grilling; cover and refrigerate. Cool remaining sauce for marinade.

Place beef steaks and marinade in plastic bag; turn to coat. Close bag securely: marinate in refrigerator 6 hours or overnight, turning 5 to 6 pounds assorted frying occasionally.

Remove beef from marinade; discard marinade. Place beef on hot grid over medium ash-covered Barbecue Sauce

coals. Grill chuck shoulder steaks 14 to 19 minutes (top round steaks 14 to 18 minutes) for medium-rare to medium done-ness, turning once. Brush both sides of steaks with reserved sauce during last 5 to 6 minutes of grilling.

Trim fat from steaks; carve meat 3 tablespoons soy sauce into thin slices. Makes six servings.

# NAR Settlement Rule Changes Slated for August 17, 2024

By Carl Medford, CRS Special to the Times

eginning on August 17, 2024\*, the settlement in the class action lawsuit against the National Association of Realtors (NAR) and major brokerages across the country will begin, ushering in key changes in the way Realtors are compensated. It is important to understand that NAR and the brokerages involved steadfastly deny any wrongdoing, but settled to prevent a string of lawsuits that could have gone on in perpetuity.

A fundamental change will be that, in the same way sellers must sign a listing agreement, buyers will be required to sign a brokerage agreement to have an agent represent them in a purchase.

Looking to get ahead of the curve, a local agent decided to start using the state Realtor Association's buyer-broker agreement before it became mandatory in August. After a preliminary meeting, the agent forwarded the documents for signature. The buyer responded mere minutes later by texting, "There is no way I'm signing this – I will not agree to pay any kind of a commission – I'm going to work with a rebate brokerage that doesn't ing they will provide buyer

require me to sign or pay anything. In fact," he emphasized, "They give ME money back."

The agent began investigating and discovered that the brokerage in question did indeed provide a rebate but had specific rules tied to the program. They would show one property with no commitment, but before showing a second home, required that an exclusive representation agreement be signed. He also discovered that they, like all other brokerages, were gearing up to use the state association's buyer broker agreement. "We will not only be using the required agreement," he was informed, "Along with our disclosures, the package we will require is

It is safe to say that there is significant confusion out there. Many buyers are oblivious to the impending changes, while others, aware that they might be required to pay a commission, are scrambling to buy before the August deadline. Some sellers, smelling blood in the water, are slashing cooperative commissions now. Confusing things even more, some listing agents believe they will get more immediate market share by adopting low flat fees paid to buyer agents while others are announc-

Margaret Halland would be the first person to say that she lived a charmed life. Born in Porterville, CA, she grew up in Castro Valley, graduated from Hayward High School, and earned a BA in English from UC Berkeley. Margaret enjoyed a long and fulfilling career teaching English in San Leandro, CA, first at Pacific High School, and when that campus closed, at San Leandro High School. She was a gifted teacher and coach who loved her students and inspired them to become more than they thought they could be. Many former students reached out to her over the years to share the impact she had on their lives.

Margaret cared deeply about politics, especially at the local level, working tirelessly for progressive candidates and issues.

Upon retiring after 30 years of teaching, Margaret pursued myriad interests: she traveled in Europe; she did volunteer work at numerous businesses; she played bridge, traveling to tournaments throughout the US and becoming a Life Master; she mastered the internet and became an online collector of children's alphabet books (at one point her collection exceeded 4,000); she read voraciously, especially mysteries, memorized and recited poetry, and enjoyed book club discussions with her English department colleagues and friends.

Margaret had a sharp wit and a whimsical sense of humor. She loved Miss Piggy and Kermit the Frog, Calvin and Hobbes, Rocky and Bullwinkle, The Princess Bride, and everything Edward Gorey.

Margaret was perhaps most content when she was working in a garden. She created beautiful spaces everywhere she lived, but was most proud of her backyard garden on Broadmoor Blvd. in San Leandro, beneath the towering redwood trees. There she laid neandering brick and stone paths, built small wood fences, decks, and trellises, planted scores of trees, shrubs, and flowers; there were birdhouses and water features (she loved that she had a working well), and signs of her creativity in unexpected places: a mosaic here, a driftwood sculpture there—little surprises in every "room" of paradise. Margaret's yard and home was a favorite gathering spot for family and friends for the entire 22 years she resided there.

In the fall of 2020, Margaret and her partner moved to Tacoma to be closer to family. the new house Margaret immediately set to work creating a Pacific Northwest garden sanctuary. When she wasn't puttering in the garden, she was building puzzles, playing Scrabble, and doing the NYT daily crossword puzzle. She died peacefully at home surrounded by the love of Colleen, her partner of 27 years, and her daughter, Kathy.
