get the contact information for every ham in your area. What would it take to drop an invitation in the mail? How many lessactive hams could you encourage to show up?

There are all sorts of ways to build interest. Demonstrating the art of antenna building and placement will show newcomers that antenna work is not beyond them. In fact, wire antennas work well, and can be constructed easily and designed for almost any property. One group I know has even offered to teach soldering and basic connections during the Field Day prep time.

Don't overlook an important Field Day rule, designed specifically with newcomers in mind. That is the Get On the Air (GOTA) station. Look over that section carefully. Your club can add to its total contacts by having such a station. Even new techs qualify. There are ways to use control operators and call sign arrangements that allow a GOTA station to participate fully in Field Day.

You can also add a station without changing your class if that station is dedicated to 50 MHz and higher. Should we happen to get a nice six-meter opening, you can rack up lots of contacts and points just by putting that sort of station in your operating plans. It gives you an extra station to operate, so there won't be a shortage of stations for all those new operators you plan to get out there!

And youth count! Your club can get bonus points for contacts made by young people under the age of 18. There are lots of other bonus points available. One in particular your club may wish to use is Social Media.

You could attract attention (see getting new hams involved, above) and get bonus points while doing it.

In this case, reading the rules is less a matter of following regulations, and more of a matter of finding new ways operate at Field Day. Use your imagination for what you can accomplish. And have fun! 73. Tom W8WTD

ASUS Moves Its Tinker Board Into Raspberry Pi's SBC Domain

ASUS, the Taiwanese hardware and electronics company known for their desktops, laptops, monitors, graphics cards, and more has decided they're going to delve into the micro-PC market.

Raspberry Pi has been the most publicly prominent player in the SBC (singleboard computer) market. But as the Raspberry Pi Foundation sets its sights on new goals, is it giving up some space to new competitors?

Raspberry Pi's Shift towards Software

Raspberry Pi changed the world back in 2012 when they released their first generation of credit-card-sized SBCs. The company knew they hit something huge when they sold over 100,000 units within the first 24 hours of being released.

more than 10 million units of their five different microcomputers. Just recently, the Raspberry Pi Foundation released the Raspberry Pi Zero W (which includes onboard wireless capabilities). In an interview with Wired, Raspberry Pi Foundation founder **Eben Upton** has made it clear that he plans on focusing on the development of the software that the Pi devices can be run on. Essentially, Upton is gearing towards software as it's what he assumes a majority of users want.

In late September of 2016, Raspberry Pi introduced a brand new desktop for their devices named PIXEL (which stands for 'Pi Improved Xwindow Environment, Lightweight'). This is a huge software update to the Pi's desktop environment. PIXEL includes a refined interface, as well as quite a few new programs and features. Oh, did I forget to mention that there are experimental versions of PIXEL for x86 platforms?

But as the Raspberry Pi Foundation perfects its other products and moves in new directions, ASUS is looking to edge into the Raspberry Pi 3's territory.

Room for ASUS to Rise?

ASUS has now stepped into the SBC realm. ASUS's competitor to the Raspberry Pi is called the Tinker Board. For starters, it has a quad-core Rockchip System on Chip (SoC) that's 50% faster than the Broadcom SoC in the Raspberry Pi. It measures at the same 3.4" x 2.1" size as the Pi 3, but it also supports 4K via the HDMI 2.0 port.

Notably, however, these advantages come at a higher price: \$60 compared to the \$40 Raspberry Pi 3.

This isn't ASUS's first step in small personal computers. The VivoPC is a mini PC that measures slightly larger than a DVD jewel case. Powered by Intel with 4K/2K visuals, integrated speakers, and 802.11ac Wi-Fi, it has all the functionalities of a traditional desktop, but is much more versatile. The VivoPC shows that ASUS is experimenting on multiple fronts when it comes to computing hardware.

ASUS isn't going to release its hold on the markets it's known for, but it also seems to be expanding its purview towards who they clearly think of as "tinkerers".

Expanding Markets

With the Tinker Board, ASUS might be

trying to get a piece of the Maker Movement, which is comprised of inventors, designers, and tinkerers that are all working on the latest hardware to advance technology. This movement, according to USA Today, is a \$29 billion community as of 2014.

At maker faires (events focused on usually DIY robotics, crafts, gadgets, contraptions, and even legos) this year, ASUS provided their Labs DIY, where they shared their knowledge and expertise for people of all ages to create a PC. With exposing their name and providing great experiences for consumers, ASUS is slowly making a name for themselves in the vast Makers Market.

So how will this new interest in the maker community affect professional engineers? We've seen that hardware designed for tinkerers can actually be very useful to practicing designers, especially in prototyping. Perhaps this shift is one of the best industry moves EEs could ask for.

IBM Up Against Moore's Law with 5nm Chip

Moore's Law will be relevant for a few more years with recent news that IBM, GlobalFoundries, and Samsung succeeded in fitting 30 billion transistors onto a single, 5nm chip.

With concerns that the trend Moore's Law predicted, which states that the number of transistors fitted on a single chip would double every two years, was slowing down or becoming obsolete, research into High Performance and Parallel Computing has begun to gain traction as one of the solutions for ensuring that computation power continues to expand, while decreasing power and resource requirements.

IBM managed this feat by using a new type of gate: the Gate All Around Field-Effect Transistor (GAAFET). This is similar to transistors found in 7nm chips, which are Fin Field-Effect Transistors (FINFET). Both are "3-dimensional," extending a fin upward to allow for more silicon, but in the case of GAAFET, there are three nanosheet layers of silicon.

Manufacturing chips this small is a complicated task. However, by using ultraviolet laser etching the process becomes more precise and manageable, which is part of the breakthrough allowing IBM to create 5nm chips.

Currently, 10nm is the smallest chip available on the market, with smartphones typically utilizing 14nm Qualcomm chips. The 5nm chip is promised to be significantly faster and power efficient (up to 40 and 75 percent more efficient, respectively) compared to its 10nm predecessor; IBM believes days could be added to the battery life of phones.


There has been speculation that the GAAFET could be scaled down to as small as 3nm. However, the more a chip is scaled down, the higher the potential for problems with physical limitations of transistors that small, including added complexity in manufacturing.

10nm and 14nm Production and Performance

Talking about 3nm chips may be getting ahead of ourselves, since 7nm chips have yet to enter the market, and 10nm chips have just begun to appear.

Samsung only started manufacturing 10nm chips last October, which were reported to have a 27 percent increase in performance and a 40 percent increase in power efficiency compared to 14nm chips.

Coffee Lake, Intel's codename for its 8th-generation Core processors, is the successor of the Kaby Lake 14nm microarchitecture. Reportedly, it refines the manufacturing process with up to a

30% increase in performance compared to Kaby Lake. The recently announced Intel i9 chip will also utilize a 14nm chip.

However, Intel claims that chip size is not the best way to describe the actual improvements of a chip's density and that Samsung's 10nm chips are still equivalent to Intel's 14nm chip before its refinement. An alternative method of addressing performance involves the use of a formula which focuses on standard logic cell density and weighted based on typical chip design. \blacklozenge

Federal Register Publishes New MF/LF Rules – Bands Still Not Legal

"The ARRL Letter," June 15, 2017

The FCC Report and Order (R&O) spelling out operational rules to allow secondary Amateur Radio access to 630 meters and 2,200 meters now has appeared in the *Federal Register*, but radio amateurs still may not access the new bands. That's because specific procedures now under development, to detail how radio amateurs will notify the Utilities Technology Council (UTC) of their proposed station location prior to commencing operation, still must undergo approval. The FCC said the notification requirement is necessary to confirm that a station is not located within one kilometer of an active power line communication (PLC) system.

"While the R&O has been published in the Federal Register, amateurs may not begin using the new bands until after the FCC's Wireless Telecommunications Bureau issues a Public Notice outlining necessary procedures to notify UTC of pending operation, as the new rules require," ARRL Regulatory Information Manager **Dan Henderson**, **N1ND**, said. "There is no timetable for that Public Notice to be released. Amateurs need to practice patience."

The FCC said the notification requirements it adopted "seek to strike a balance between amateur operations used for experimental purposes and PLC operation used by electric utilities for the reliability and security of electric service to the public." Once notification procedures are in place, radio amateurs intending to operate on either band will notify UTC of their geographical location. If UTC does not object within 30 days, amateur operation may commence. ◆

FCC to Require "Felony" Question on NCVEC 605

This is what the FCC sent to the VECs earlier today.

There is no immediate action required by anyone at this time,

We are providing notification that the form 605 will be changing on approximately August 3, 2017. The Commission is adding a basic qualifications section to the form which includes a question regarding whether an applicant has been convicted of a felony in any state or federal court. Applicants, answering yes must provide an explanation. This item enables the FCC to determine whether an Applicant is eligible under §§ 310(d) and 308(b) of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended, to hold or have ownership interest in a station license. This change makes the 605 consistent with other Commission licensing forms.

VEC Batch File Update:

There will be an additional field position 37 (Felony Question) added to the end of the existing file making the overall file length 37 fields.

For all NE, AM, MD and RM a Y or N will be required in this position.

If the answer is Y, a Y in position 25 is required.

Applicants responding yes to felony question must provide an explanation, which they can submit via e-mail to Discussion in "Amateur Radio News" started by **William J Neill/NE1LL**, Tuesday, June 27, 2017

attach605@fcc.gov or via postal mail at: 1270 Fairfield Rd. Gettysburg, PA 17325-7245.

The applicant may request that the explanation be treated as confidential. In order to seek confidential treatment, the applicant must include a separate request that the material not be made available for public inspection. The request must contain a statement of the reasons for the request, and identify the portion(s) of the response for which confidential treatment is requested. It is not sufficient to simply mark a document as "Confidential." If the applicant does not request confidential treatment, the response will be publicly viewable in ULS.
