## Abandoned Bee Hive Found; Pea-size Limes Drop Off

Honey and bumble bees, along with wasps, are weather. But, if disturbed, they will fly around and sting. On the other hand, a yellow jacket hive is empty or abandoned.

In late November, the worker and male yellow jackets, after mating with the queen(s), die. Shortly thereafter the queen(s) abandons the old hive and hibernates in the bark of trees and/or logs. So, I believe you had a yellow jacket hive.

It maybe a bit early, but the queens should emerge from hibernation and start looking to establish new nesting areas within the next three weeks. Also, there is almost no chance of a queen reoccupying an old site.

Yellow Jackets establish hives under the ground in abandoned gopher or other rodent holes. The above-ground nests are close to structures, like under the eves of a house or in ornamental bushes

continued from previous page tomatoes. It's best to stake or cage these tall plants and grow them in a 24-inch-diameter pot.

Paste and sauce tomatoes have meatier fruit, making them perfect for sauces, soups and preserving. Roma is the traditional favorite. The egg-shaped fruit has thick walls and few seeds.

Grow a few slicing tomatoes. Look for large, juicy tomatoes to enjoy on sandwiches and salads. Solar Flare and Creole are heat-tolerant and keep producing despite high summer temperatures.

So, gather your favorite recipes and create a list of both longtime favorites and new tomato varieties to include in this year's garden.

It operates a ferry service across the Tagus River in Lisbon, has a daily carrying capacity of 100,000 to 150,000 commuters and has increased needs in safe craft maneuverability at high speeds in narrow channels where excessive wash is also a problem. It can be done.

Urban development should have long term goals and be inclusive for all stakeholders. After all, don't we have enough dense housing developments?
