Civic Leader Dave Knudsen Dies

Dave Knudsen, a longtime, highly respected business and civic leader in Castro Valley, passed away on Friday, Feb. 10 while at sea aboard a cruise ship with his wife, Kathy. He was 84.

Knudsen is best known to Castro Valley residents as the familiar figure at the popular Ice Creamery in the center of town, a business he and his wife took over some 14 years ago, after a long career in the grocery and candy business.

The Ice Creamery became the popular place for hundreds of birthday celebrations and fund-raising pancake breakfasts for community organizations.

Knudsen served in many local charitable organizations including the Castro Valley Rotary Club and the Eden Area Chamber of Com-

Rotary President and former longtime school superintendent Jim Negri called Knudsen "a great human being - one of a kind who was committed to his family and community.

"He always was willing to assist our schools with their fundraising activities to support students,

Janet Everson has stepped down from her position as a member of the Castro Valley Municipal Advisory Council (more commonly known as the MAC). leaving a vacancy that Alameda County Supervisor Nate Miley must now fill.

Everson, a legal malpractice attorney, was originally appointed to the MAC in May of 2015 to replace a member who had quit. She then was reappointed in 2016 to a term that would have ended in July of 2020.

Everson resigned earlier this month and the Board of Supervisors accepted her resignation last Thursday. She didn't respond to a request for comment.





An Apology from EBMUD Director on Golf Course Flood

I want to apologize to the community and to the people who recently needed to be rescued from the Redwood Canyon Golf Course at midday because of the flooding of the access road.

You know the recent rains have been relentless and EBMUD's Upper San Leandro Reservoir drains through Redwood Canyon Golf Course into Lake Chabot. While efforts are made to coordinate water flows with the Operator of Redwood Canyon, the ferocity of the rains have frustrated EBMUD's efforts and causing water to go through the spillway. These spillway flows that affected the access road to Redwood Canyon are unfortunate and a result of the weather conditions.

We are rapidly reaching volumes of rain that surpass anything on record. The discussion of "normal" rainfall says that we, in our area, have reached over 335% of "normal" just for February.

The real problem here is that California is a boom and bust rainfall environment. Crazy rains after years of drought are really the norm. But the crazy rains last for a short time. Our climate is really drought interrupted by periods of rain.

Currently, all of EBMUD's reservoirs are full, spilling and releasing water. It looks like that will be the case until this rainy period ends. We will have plenty of water for this year and next – but who knows after that?

I pledge to stay on top of conditions and have directed EBMUD to be as accurate as they can when coordinating with the Redwood Canyon operator so as to not have a repeat of the incident of two weeks ago. But, there will be flooding again as long as this relentless rainy season continues.

I want to thank the Castro Valley Forum for its excellent reporting of the conditions at Redwood Canyon.

Again, I apologize to all those who were affected by the access road flooding.




