Spring is Here

To me Spring comes when the forsythia blooms. We know there will chilly weather with possible frost, but now the flowering trees are showing off for us as well as the daffodils and other bulbs. The trees are showing their various hues of green. Some of us have been cutting willow for use now or later.

Recently I have read a book I would recommend to you. <u>Braiding Sweetgrass</u> by Robin Wall Kimmerer. Kimmerer is a Indigenous American from the Potawatomi Nation who has a PHD in ecology and environmental science. She thinks that plants and animals are our oldest teachers. Particularly of interest to basketry makers are her chapters on the cattails, tule, black ash, red cedar and of course sweetgrass. She is a sensitive writer about the reverence the Indigenous people have for the earth and the relationship all of us have to the earth and the environment. Kimmerer believes we have a reciprocal relationship with the plants and animals.

We hope you will join us at the Masonic Center in Sparks on May 6 from 10-noon. It will be a homecoming of meeting in person with masks and social distancing. Note: there will be NO lunch period, but there will an opportunity to return your books to our library & pick up a new one; a time to sign up for classes so bring your checkbooks. At 11:00 Neil Bertrando from the Reno Food Systems will share with us his ideas of planting basketry plants on their project.

Coming in November



All classes are \$45 for members and \$55 for non-members and are limited to 12 students—there will be a waiting list once the class fills. Priority registration for members begins May 6, 2021 on a first come first serve basis. If you are a non-member and are taking more than one class, please consider becoming a member @ \$25 for priority registration. After August 1st, class vacancies will be open to non-members. November 3, 2021 #1 Apple in the Pine (Material fee—\$85)

Level: Intermediate / Advanced (8 hours)

The base begins with a vintage spigot handle, threaded with Cedar bark. Twine the base with waxed cotton cord and iris leaves to upright. Using thinner Cedar and wider Willow bark learn the fun and challenging Japanese knot weave. A basic braid track border completes the piece. (4" x 4")





November 4, 2021 #2 Fluted Constellation (Material fee—\$75) Level: Intermediate / Advanced (8 hours)

Beginning with a unique threaded base of Willow and Cedar barks; weave this sweet and functional basket with an interesting twist. The fluted sides and rim are resultant of a weave change to the basket. The braided Cedar rim enhances the overall flow. (6" x 6" x 2")

November 5, 2021 #3 Double Helix (Material fee—\$85)

Level: Intermediate (8 hours) Students will heat fold and stitch a hexagonal Birch bowl with split Spruce

roots. Next a spiraling liner of hexagonal to bias woven Willow or Cedar bark (or a combination) will be added. The braided rim of Cedar bark was taught to me by Dawn Walden. (6" x 3")





November 6, 2021 #4 Barks on the Bias (Material fee-\$100) Level: Intermediate (6 hours)

Students will learn to weave this non-traditional basket with thin Birch bark. Overlays of Poplar and Hemlock barks will be added for color and textural notes. The faux braided rim was taught to me by master basketmaker Dawn Walden and is executed with Cedar bark. A hanger handle is sewn and installed with fine brass washers to secure the stitching. (7" x 6" x 5")


Vendor Application

Great Basin Basketmakers General Membership Meeting, April 1, 2021 Minutes

Betty Hulse convened the April 1, 2021 general membership meeting shortly after 10:30 a.m. The meeting was held via Zoom because of the continuing COVID-19 pandemic. There were 13 members joining the meeting. Betty summarized the GBB board meeting, which was held yesterday, and made the following announcements:

- Betty thanked Pam Wilcox for taking the minutes of the meeting, and asked for a volunteer to take minutes for future meetings. (Later in the meeting, Sandy Zoerner volunteered for the next meeting.)
- Susan Lester volunteered to update the GBB website. Members are encouraged to look at the revised website. Members should call Susan with items for the website, especially photographs. The board is very grateful for her help with this.
- As reported at the last meeting, Margo Duarte, who has been in charge of the GBB Facebook page, will be moving to Henderson. She is discontinuing the GBB page today. The board is asking for a volunteer who is knowledgeable about Facebook to resume the GBB page. Many thanks to Margo for her work on this. Peggy Camp volunteered to contact Margo about continuing Facebook.

As announced at the last GBB meeting, we plan to resume in-person meetings at the Masonic lodge in May. The May meeting will be at **10:00 on May 6**. Please wear masks and be prepared for social distancing. At 11:00 there will be a presentation by Neil Bertrando of Reno Food Systems about their urban gardening project and their invitation to us to help them plant basket materials. There will be no break for lunch at our meetings as long as masks are recommended. **PLEASE remember to bring back any library books you have at home!!**

Betty has been contacted by the group that will sponsor the Truckee River Festival during the entire month of May. They are inviting GBB to participate. Please let Betty know if you are interested. Betty thinks the Idlewild Park Sensory Garden may be available to us.

The next board meeting will be held as a Zoom meeting at 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, May 5.

The May newsletter editor will be Sue Ann Monteleone.

Karen announced that Margaret Mathewson is willing to come to Reno the last week in June to teach willow classes for four days. Margaret is a popular teacher, and has taught at our retreats. Karen expects her to arrive on June 28 or 29, and stay for the entire week, offering two 2-day classes: a fancy wavy willow basket, and a basket with a tension base. Each class will probably cost \$100, including materials. Pictures of these baskets were sent out with the announcement for today's meeting. Karen plans to go to Margaret's home and bring back the willow needed for the classes, including some in different colors, so it can be ready for the classes. Those interested in attending should let Karen know as soon as possible, and pay for the classes at our May meeting. Thanks to Karen for arranging for Margaret to come.

Betty announced that there are currently no other classes planned for the summer, and encouraged members to contact her with ideas.

As announced at the last meeting and in the Newsletter, Karen Tembreull will be visiting us in November to teach several basket classes. She will be teaching for four days, November 3-6 (Wednesday-Saturday). Classes are planned to be held at the Masonic Lodge. Photos of her baskets have already been made available, and will be available again at the May meeting, when members are encouraged to sign up. If some of the classes are not full by summer, members of other nearby Guilds may be invited to join us to fill the classes. Costs will be similar to our local classes, probably about \$45/day plus materials.

It is hoped that we will now be able to resume regular Guild meetings on the first Thursday of every month at the Masonic Lodge. Exact times will be announced and will depend to some extent on medical advice re COVID-19. The August meeting has sometimes been cancelled in the past, but this year it may be perfect for a field trip or some other special opportunity. Betty pointed out that the July and November meeting days are already planned for classes (see above), and asked for input about these meetings; they could be moved to another day. Seven members shared current projects for Show and Tell. All were beautiful. Thanks for sharing. The meeting was adjourned at 12:07.


