I THESSALONIANS

Part Twenty Four: "The Christian and Affliction"

I Thessalonians 3:3-4

That no man should be moved by these afflictions: for yourselves know that we are appointed thereunto. For verily, when we were with you, we told you before that we should suffer tribulation; even as it came to pass, and ye know.

Lessons on Affliction

- a. The potential of affliction.
 - The word *affliction* is the word $\theta \lambda \iota \psi \iota \zeta$ (thlipsis), meaning "pressure." It's first use in the New Testament is in Matthew 13:21, referring to the **tribulation** that arises in the life of the believer because of the Word.
 - 1) Affliction has the potential to <u>shake</u> the child of God. *That no man should* be moved by these afflictions
 - 2) Growth in <u>faith</u> protects you against being shaken by affliction. 3:2.
- b. Our predisposition for affliction.
 - The believer is appointed for afflictions, and afflictions are appointed for the believer. The word *appointed* is the word $\kappa \epsilon \iota \mu \alpha \iota$ (keimai), meaning "to lie outstretched." It's usage throughout the New Testament gives enlightenment regarding its meaning.

Matthew 5:14 - A city that is **set** on an hill cannot be hid.

<u>Luke 2:16</u> - And they came with haste, and found Mary, and Joseph, and the babe **lying** in a manger.

<u>Luke 2:34</u> - And Simeon blessed them, and said unto Mary his mother, Behold, this child is **set** for the fall and rising again of many in Israel; and for a sign which shall be spoken against.

<u>Matthew 28:6</u> - He is not here: for he is risen, as he said. Come, see the place where the Lord **lay**.

Each of these uses of the word "keimai," and many others, refer to Someone/something that is in place where it is supposed to be. This helps us to understand how the believer is *appointed* to affliction.



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- c. Preparation for affliction.
 - 1) It is our duty to <u>warn</u> new believers that affliction is tied to living for God. For verily, when we were with you, we told you before that we should suffer tribulation
 - 2) It is our duty to <u>prepare</u> younger believers to grow to be ready for that affliction. 3:2.
- d. Perspective through affliction. even as it came to pass, and ye know
 - 1) Enduring affliction increases your confidence in godly teachers.
 - 2) Enduring affliction increases your <u>understanding</u> of God's <u>kingdom</u>.
 - 3) Enduring affliction increases your <u>faith</u> in God's <u>sovereignty</u>.
