

Dr Funkenstein is George Clinton, of course. Bassist Bootsy's music is far more Soul-oriented than Parliament's or Funkadelic's. This cover uses a P-Funk style comic drawing of Bootsy, with "Me" badge and lascivious tongue. The artwork seems crammed into too small a space, hinting at Bootsy's "stretchin" music. Collins's sound is all up front, sliding, stretching Funk, falsetto choruses and bleeding edges, hence his head busting out of the side of the frame, the neck of his bass needing to fit in shot, the title curling back at the gaping mouth.

Inside are four pages of brilliantly drawn comics. Most packaging of album sleeves up to this point had some kind of relevance to the music – even Zappa's Weasels was obviously a satire on advertising. Gloryhallastoopid was unique in that it seemed to dare anyone to buy it. That thing on the cover is an ass. "Do you identify with an ass in ridiculous clothes? Then buy this record," seems to be the message.
