Kindergarten Reading Readiness Program

It has been said that a child's overall success in school, and later in life, is directly related to his or her success in reading. This group of skills includes: basic vocabulary, verbal expression, awareness of letters, sentence sense, story comprehension and story telling, awareness of books and printed words, and related writing readiness skills, all of which contribute to a successful start in reading.

Our Kindergarten program is designed to develop basic skills which prepare a child to be ready to learn to read. It is a program based on a complete scope and sequence of concepts and skills needed to prepare a child to be ready to read.

One of the tools we will be using in Kindergarten is the PACE system. PACES are workbooks which cover three different core subjects: Math, English, and Science. (Social Studies is covered in thematic units throughout the year.) Through these PACES, the program uses basic sounds, familiar tunes, and animal friends to bring the child to a desired level of preparedness. Children will also use iPads and computers to enhance their learning experience. The foundation of a child's formal education begins in Kindergarten.



Students must be 5 years old by September 1 to enroll in Kindergarten.

Getting Ready for School

The early years are a wonderful time—a special time for parents and children. It is a time that invites the sharing of meaningful experiences in a warm, supportive environment. It is a time to prepare your child for the exciting experience that is to come.

By planning ahead, using your imagination, creativity, and spending a small amount of time each day, you can open the door to the joy of learning and to a special relationship with your child.

Developing physical skills will help your child's readiness for reading. Large muscle development is needed for such things as holding a book; smaller muscle development is needed for holding a pencil or focusing the eyes on the printed page.

Listed below are some important skills you can work on with your child before Kindergarten begins to give them a significant advantage:

- Button
- Tie their shoes
- · Dressing themselves independently
- Feeding themselves independently
- Complete bathroom routine with no help from adults
- Recognizes colors
- Recognizes shapes
- Can count up to 20
- Recognizes numerals 0–20
- Recognizes letters (uppercase and lowercase)
- Write their first name
- · Cut on the lines
- Color in lines

Reading requires a high degree of visual skill, and you have many easy opportunities to help your child develop the ability to remember and differentiate between similar appearing objects. As your child learns to tell the difference among pictures, shapes, colors, and specific details of objects, skills later useful in telling the difference between letters and shapes are being developed. As your child becomes older you can help him or her tell the difference between letters and words which reappear constantly.

We offer a Kindergarten Screening in the spring for all children entering our kindergarten program. This standardized test will give parents and preschool teachers some ideas for things to work on in preparation for kindergarten. The screening is designed "not to label", but rather provide information that might be used for the prevention of later problems.

^{*}A 5% prepayment discount is given if annual tuition is paid in advance.

*Tuition is due monthly on the 25th of each month for the upcoming month. (Ex. June tuition is due on May 25th)

Each student receives one week of vacation credit during the school year after four months of continuous enrollment. (Ex. if you attend two days a week, you are eligible for two days of vacation credit.) Once continuous enrollment ceases, any vacation credit accrued will be lost. Vacation credit can only be used when your child is absent. For an extended leave of absence, full tuition will be due in order to maintain your child's spot. Please email us four weeks in advance at schedule@qrcp.org with requests for vacation credits, schedule changes or withdrawls.

^{*}A 10% discount is given for the second child on regularly scheduled tuition only.

^{*}Regular tuition is due for weeks with holidays.

^{*}If your child is absent, full tuition will still be charged.

^{*}A 3% convenience fee will apply to credit card payments.

^{*}A 2% convenience fee will apply to bank withdrawals.














Our Mission Statement to you...
