RON BUHLMANN (210

Monarch) was born in Rochester, New York in 1938. When Ron was 12, he heard a Theatre Pipe Organ, otherwise known as a Wurlitzer, for



the first time and Ron was hooked for life! A Wurlitzer organ is a type of theater pipe organ known for their ability to reproduce the sounds of an entire orchestra, making them ideal for accompanying silent films and vaudeville shows. They can mimic the sounds of various instruments like strings, brass, woodwinds, and percussion and sound effects; such as sirens, castanets, sleigh bells, chimes, and even bird whistles, train whistles, and horse's hooves. Ron was so taken with this instrument he joined the American Theatre Organ Society in his 20's. While he never really learned to play this extremely complex instrument, he learned how to rebuild and repair them.

After graduating high school, Ron worked in the printing industry which he did for two years before being drafted into the Army where he worked as a baker from 1961-1963. Upon his return to civilian life, Ron continued to work in the printing industry and was in charge of machinery that die cut boxes and added scoring lines for folding for products such as Kraft Mac & Cheese, Kleenex, toothpaste, etc. On one of his vacations, he visited California and absolutely loved it.

Changing jobs when he got back from vacation, he became night supervisor at another printing company who printed Gourmet Magazine, automobile catalogs, and the like. Pressure from the job caused Ron to have a nervous breakdown and he took a leave of absence and visited California for a second time. Once again, he loved it. Upon his return to Rochester, Ron sold his house and took a job at a fishing resort in northern Wisconsin as a bartender and maintenance man for two years. Around that time, in the early 70's, Ron produced a record album for a Wurlitzer organ player named Rob Calcaterra who played at Radio City Music Hall for many years. Ron still has copies of that album.

As happenstance would have it, Ron had a friend, Ernie Wilson, who had moved to San Francisco earlier and owned a Wurlitzer. Ernie had purchased a rank of pipes from a company on the east coast for his own organ and needed help getting them delivered. Ron jumped in his car, picked up the pipes, and drove across country to San Francisco and never looked back! He and Ernie took two years to rebuild the organ which they then installed in the Grand Lake Theatre in Oakland in time for the American Theatre Organ Society convention in San Francisco that year.

In 1985, Ron moved from San Francisco to Forestville and bought a house on the Russian River. He worked for Santa Rosa Plaza and Coddington Shopping Centers and the Sheraton Hotel in the maintenance departments. He also worked at Zumwalt-Magrini Chrysler dealership installing phones and computers.

In 2003, Ron retired and moved to Valle Vista. Ron served on the Board as A&B Director for five years. When Ron had surgery for spinal stenosis, it ended any physical work he could do for the Board but he kept active publishing the Peacock Press and running Bunco for 12 years. He currently runs Bingo and does such a great job, more people keep showing up each month. Blackout jackpots are getting close to \$100!

A man of many talents, Ron is a fantastic photographer, and latch hook rug maker. He's made so many rugs and given them away to friends, he has lost count but he kept the one he designed and made of the Wurlitzer keyboard. This rug alone took 58,000 pieces of yarn! Ingredients:

1 green pepper
1 red pepper
8 oz cream cheese, softened
to room temperature
½ onion, finely chopped
½ tsp salt
2 flour or gluten-free tortillas
Tomato salsa for garnish



Directions:

Chop bell peppers into very small chunks. You can put these in a food processor but make sure they still retain their shape and don't become mushy. Chop onions. Blend peppers, onions, and salt with the cream cheese. (I also like to add jalapeño peppers for some heat.)

Once all the ingredients are blended, spread the mixture evenly on a tortilla. Roll the tortilla to form a tight log. Wrap the tortilla in plastic wrap and put it in the freezer for about four hours.

Preparing For An Emergency

Valle Vista Emergency Preparedness Committee

This month the focus is on caring for your furry friends during an emergency and earthquake safety tips.

Emergency Preparedness For Pets provides information for evacuating with your pets and sheltering in place. The second page touches on earthquake safety, knowing when to evacuate, what to do when you can't evacuate your animals, and important emergency numbers – even an animal helpline. These tips are provided by the HALTER Project.

The third and fourth pages focus on Earthquake Safety providing preparedness recommendations.

Preparing in advance—whether you shelter in place or evacuate—helps lower stress. Act now.

EVACUATING with YOUR PET

- STAY CALM SO YOUR PETS STAY CALM
- Have go-bag supplies for 3-7 days.
- Have enough special diet food & parasite control, and meds for 2 weeks – 1 month.
- Ask your vet for “For Emergency Use Only” prescription for necessary medications.
- Keep vet contacts, health, and vaccination records with your important papers.
- Good idea to also keep copy of pets’ health record with your pet.
- Include treats, toys, grooming supplies, and calming products.
- Identification: Microchip and visible identification on animal(s).
- Write OWNER and FACILITY names AND PHONE numbers on pet carrier.
- Make sure microchip registration is current.
- Have extra collar with tag, leash, harness.
- Have a crate for transport & containment, & larger one for destination. (Stage bigger items at destination, when possible).
- Include cozy bed or bedding.
- Use pet-safe hygiene and cleaning products.
- Create a pet evac buddy networks with neighbors, friends, relatives.
- Practice crate & car loading when things are calm, & quiet, & at night.
- Practice your evacuation routine on red flag and storm warning days.
- Practice with your evac buddies and pets.

SHELTERING IN PLACE (SIP) When it’s not safe, or possible, to evacuate:

You need SIP Supplies for at least 2 weeks. In weather and rodent-proof crate: Food, meds, litter, poop bags, pee pads, newspapers, trash bags, treats, toys, grooming, solar lantern can opener.

- Bring outdoor pets inside for their health and security.
- Keep emergency supplies where you can find them easily with your flashlight / headlamp.
- If the power is out, you need an emergency light, and a manual can opener.
- On smokey or bad air quality days: watch for signs of eye irritation or respiratory distress. Keep outdoor exercise to a minimum.
- Emergency supplies should include your pets’ favorite treats, toys, games.
- Pet-safe sanitation and cleaning products, including baby wipes, cat litter, newspapers, pee pads, poop bags, doggie diapers, trash bags.
- Rubber gloves, sanitizer, and mask for you.

EARTHQUAKE SAFETY

- Do not try to hold on to your pet.
- AFTER: Sweep up glass and debris, wipe up or cover spills if you are able.
- Talk to your pet in a calm voice even if you cannot see him/her.
- Secure pet with collar, harness, leash, if possible.

KNOW WHEN TO GO

When you receive an alert from Sheriff, Police, SoCo Alert, Civic Ready, NOAA Radio:

- Evacuation **WARNING!** Be ready.
NOW is the best time to go.
- Evacuation **ORDER!** GO IMMEDIATELY!!

WHAT IF YOU CAN'T EVACUATE YOUR ANIMALS?

- Don't spend precious minutes searching for your pet or luring her out of hiding. If you can't evacuate your pet for any reason, stay calm, breathe, and get yourself to safety.
- Then call the Animal Disaster Helpline or Call 2-1-1.
- Be ready to give calm, clear answers about your address, pet descriptions, and other information the call-taker will ask you.

WHO HELPS THE ANIMALS?

- Trained, authorized Animal Responders will check on your pets, care for them, evacuate them if needed, and provide veterinary care, if needed.
- Responders will be in contact you with updates.

EXTRAS – BUT IMPORTANT TO HAVE, WHETHER AT HOME OR EVACUATED

- Extra bedding.
- Sheet or towel for pet privacy and security.
- Cold pack or water bottle for cooling.
- “Pet Inside” signs.
- Crate or kennel large enough for pet to stand up, turn around, lie down.
- Photos of you with your pet.
- Practice with your pets. Make Sunday FUNday!

Key Earthquake Safety Accessibility Tips



When You Feel Shaking or Get an Alert, Protect Yourself from Falling Objects

If Possible

DROP where you are, onto your hands and knees. This position protects you from being knocked down by shaking and reduces your chance of being hit by falling or flying objects.



COVER your head and neck with one arm and hand.

- If a sturdy table or desk is nearby, crawl underneath for shelter
- If no shelter is nearby, crawl next to an interior wall
- Stay on your knees; bend over to protect vital organs



HOLD ON until the shaking stops.

- Under shelter: hold on to it with one hand; be ready to move with your shelter if it shifts
- No shelter: hold on to your head and neck with both arms and hands.



Or Adapt to Your Situation

If you have difficulty getting onto the ground, or cannot get back up again without help, then follow these recommendations:

- If you are in a recliner or bed: Cover your head and neck with your arms or a pillow until the shaking stops.
- If you use a cane: Drop, Cover, and Hold On or sit on a chair, bed, etc. and cover your head and neck with both hands. Keep your cane near you so it can be used when the shaking stops.
- If you use a walker or wheelchair: **LOCK** your wheels (if applicable). If using a walker carefully get as low as possible. Bend over and **COVER** your head/neck with your arms, a book, or a pillow. Then **HOLD ON** until the shaking stops.

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People who are Deaf or Hard of Hearing

Prior to an earthquake, identify and test multiple ways to receive warnings and evacuation information.

People who are Blind or have Low Vision

Earthquakes can cause items to fall and furniture to shift. Regular sound clues may not be available afterwards. Move with caution.

People with Developmental/Cognitive/Intellectual Disabilities

If you have difficulty understanding, remembering, or learning, keep a simple list of what to do and important information with you and in your kits. Practice your plan in advance. If you need help with your communication or use assistive technology, be sure to include this in your plan.

Additional Preparedness Recommendations

- Develop or update your individual and family plans, including your communication plans and important contacts.
- Make emergency go kits – one that you take with you, and perhaps other kits at home and work. Be sure to include batteries, lighting, water, essential personal supplies, and items for service animals and pets too. Your home kit might have more items.
- Label adaptive equipment or other devices with your contact information, and how to handle each item, in case they are separated from you.
- Create safe spaces by securing heavy furniture and other items that could fall, injure you, or block your way out.
- Build a Personal Support Team (PST) to check on you in case you need assistance. Include them in all phases of your planning.
- Get involved! Volunteer with your local Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) or similar organizations in your area.
- If you live near or visit the beach, be aware of tsunami evacuation routes and learn what to do to protect yourself. Practice tsunami evacuations with your care provider or support team.
- Hold drills at home, work, and in your community regularly. Invite your PST and care providers to join you.
