\$10 Million Plan to Assist Homeless OK'd

The Alameda County Board of Supervisors has approved a threeyear "homelessness action plan" for Castro Valley and other unincorporated areas, including San Lorenzo, Cherryland and Ashland, The plan would include dedicated parking sites for people living in their cars, the construction of

tiny homes, a mobile hygiene unit, two winter shelters, a downtown street litter team, and more. The \$10.5-million plan begins

n January on services for the estimated 440 homeless people living in the unincorporated area, said Chris Bazar, director of the agency at a Board of Supervisors meeting last week. The plan's basic goal is to meet

immediate needs of the homeless by linking them to services including temporary shelter, food, and showers. The overall goal is to reduce the number of people living on the streets, Bazar said.



Castro Valley resident Dr. Harry Carter made a special encore appearance last month at a 40th anniversary gala for the San Francisco Bay Area Chamber Choir, which he founded in 1978


Carter and the choir's subsequent three directors each took a turn conducting at the event, inviting past choir members to join in the final two pieces

The choir, which has traveled the world and also gives local performances, practices at Faith Lutheran Church in Castro Valley. They sing a cappella and accompanied masterworks from the 15th through the 21st centuries.

"It all started when my wife Ellen and I went to Europe to teach at the U.S. Army dependents' school in Karlsruhe, Germany. This was we sang in a German chamber choir," says Carter.



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

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Q&A: Charitable Gifts Under New Tax Law?

1. Bunch Your Deductions and Make Them in Alternate Years.

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For example, if you are single and you normally make up to \$10,000 per year in charitable deductions consider, instead, making \$20,000 per year in charitable deductions in alternating years.

2. Consider a Donor Advised www.LawyerForSeniors.com. Fund ("DAF") Offered By a Public Charity.

Many charities offer DAF's to their contributors. A DAF allows you to contribute what would normally be several years' worth of charitable donations into the fund in one year, and receive a charitable deduction immediately.

Your contribution would then typically be invested and grow taxfree. Meanwhile, you could make donations to charities from that account as time goes on, whether in the year of gift or in following years. Additional contributions to the DAF in later years would also be tax-deductible.

Note: the charity must receive the contribution and cash the check before the end of the tax year to make this work. Although you will then receive a Form 1099-R, it is up to you - not your brokerage company – to properly report the contribution as a nontaxable Qualified Charitable Donation.

Castro Valley Science Expanding the Universe for Our Kids Editor:

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Two weeks ago, I was riveted to SpaceFlightNow.com, watching a livestream of the Mars mission InSight as it parachuted and retrofired rockets to touch down in a sandy Mars crater.

We had just sponsored NASA scientist Pascal Lee earlier in the year to come to Castro Valley to talk to our students and community about life on Mars and the challenges of interplanetary travel, and many of these students went on to participate in our first-ever CV Elementary Science Olympiad competition, which included a test on Mars and the challenge of landing an egg safely from a 2.4 meter fall.

This year, we launched our 6th exciting year of Science Olympiad in Castro Valley. Our Elementary students will be building catapults and egg racers in the second Science Olympiad competition, our middle school students are studying thermodynamics, glaciers, game coding, and heredity, and our high school students are learning cryptography, water ecosystems, and building cantilevered beams that weigh slightly more than a quarter but support more than 30 pounds.

We have more teams than ever before, and have engaged a wonderful army of parents and volunteers (you!) to teach our students curiosity and perseverance.

In addition to our competitions, we are hosting a free screening of the movie Science Fair at the Castro Valley Center for the Arts on January 10th and a lecture by entomologist Dr. Vernard Lewis at CVHS on March 12th.

In all of this, Castro Valley Science, the non-profit that funds Science Olympiad in Castro Valley, seeks to expand the universe for our kids, to help them master basic science, and connect those fundamental ideas to engineering innovation.

One day very soon, our children will be the ones to take on the new challenges in medicine, energy, technology, and yes, perhaps even spaceflight.

May the bright lights of this holiday season illuminate new discoveries, both personal and educational, as we work together to create new and better worlds. I thank you for being part of our amazing journey. -Garland Dughi




